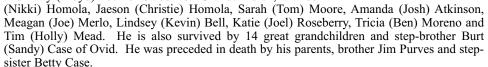

A Pastor's Perspective

"Jig-saw Puzzles and Life"

I hate jig-saw puzzles. I would, on my own, never seek to put a jig-saw puzzle together. It always seemed like such a waste of time. You can spend hours looking at the individual pieces and trying to fit them together. Then after all this effort and you're finally finished – what do you do? You tear it apart and put it back in the box.

Having said that, I have put a few together since God blessed Carol and I with the girls in our lives. There are a few things that I've learned about jig-saw puzzles. First, it really helps if you have a picture to go by; something to show you what it's supposed to look like when it's done. (By the way, I've found from experience it becomes even more confusing if someone put the pieces in the wrong box so that I'm looking at the wrong picture.) Second, I have been known to take pieces that don't quite fit, they almost fit, and seek to force them. I can hammer them into place, and if that doesn't quite do it, then I get a bigger hammer. The problem with forcing them is that as the picture goes along it becomes nothing but a group of random shapes and the picture doesn't make sense; something like abstract art. I become frustrated, confused, and want to give up. The third thing that has been helpful is to have someone working with me, helping me to see how things are supposed to fit. So, I've discovered that if I know what things are supposed to look like, if I don't seek to force them into my preconceived ideas of what's quicker and easier, and if I have someone like the girls who patiently work with me then it takes much of the confusion and frustration out of the process.

I think that in some ways a jig-saw puzzle is analogous to life. The pieces may look like financial problems, relationship problems, illness, loss of a loved one, self-esteem issues, guilt, etc. etc. Sometimes life hands us a piece and if we have no idea what life is supposed to look like, we're confused, frustrated, or discouraged as to what's happening to us. It all seems so pointless, fruitless, confusing. When we can't make sense of it, we tend to want to give up.

Regrettably, many who face these problems and losses become so frustrated and confused about the meaning and purpose of life that they do give up. Some turn to alcohol and drug abuse in their effort to salve the hurts and disappointments. These attempts to find peace tend only to make the situations worse. (Statistics indicate that there were 64,000 Americans who lost their lives through opioid abuse in 2015 alone.) Sadly, too many others make the irreversible choice to purposely end their life. According to the American Psychological Association there were 47,173 suicides during 2017. As further indication of how serious the problem is; it is believed that there are 24 attempted suicides for each one that is successful. This frustration and confusion is even prevalent among our young people. Statistics indicate that suicide is the 2nd leading cause of death of those between 10 and 34 years of age. One report stated that there are 3,041 attempted suicides among high school students each day. We are surrounded by many confused and hurting people! Too many of them are our youth.

I am not seeking to oversimplify a complex problem, but sometimes we need an overview; "The Big Picture" so that we can see how life is supposed to look, what its meaning and purpose are. Sometimes we find we've even been looking at the "wrong picture," and we may need someone to come along side and aid us in seeing what the "true picture" of life is supposed to be. When we get these things right, we reduce the frustration in fitting the pieces of life into place. In the weeks ahead I would like for us to look at the "Big Picture" of life, seeing what it should look like and perhaps why it hasn't fit together for us in the past.

Seems like good ideas but every year it turns out about the same. Gained weight, missed birthdays, stuff everywhere, never enough money to get through a vacation or holidays without going into debt. How can I make this a better year? What can I do to feel more accomplished? I am so frustrated of not keeping my resolutions!

Dear Patricia P.,

The Webster's paraphrased definition of Resolution is... 'making a firm decision with a promise of being determined about changing a behavior or situation.' 'or Something that we perceive as not acceptable as is, or not good enough.' Most resolutions are enormous or unrealistic, we set ourselves up for being unsuccessful or feeling like a failure.

My recommendation is to NOT make 'Resolutions', but to 'Set Goals." Achievable goals. When first setting new goals, it is imperative to acknowledge, reward or recognize previous accomplishments. Congratulate yourself. List your achievements at home and at work. I bet you will find something in every category you listed. Write it down and don't say you didn't accomplish anything....plezzzzz, give yourself a little credit.

Did you plan a special birthday party for grandma? Did you go for a bike ride? Did you count the 4 pounds you lost when you cut out ice cream for 2 months? Did you count the credit card you got paid off? Did you count the meals you put on the table? Did you count how many times you cut the grass? Did you count how many times you helped a neighbor with a project? Count your blessing, then you will be ready to make 2020 goals.

Instead of Resolution's – I recommend to "Set Goals"... First step in setting goals is to determine if they are short term or long term. Then, write down your goals... writing makes you more accountable. It also is a good way to know when you have achieved them. Shouting them into the Universe at midnight on New Year's Eve might help; but write them down. Remember Alice in Wonderland when the Cheshire cat told her, "If you knew where you were going, you will know when you got there." However, he also told her, "If you don't know where you are going, every road will take you there." Think about direction...ie Goals.

Next, achievable goals need a plan of action. Write it down! Lose weight: Give yourself an exact time frame. Instead of a resolution to lose weight, set a goal to lose 4 pounds a month, that is only 1 pound per week and 52 for a year. Sounds achievable. Right? Check with your doctor if you need a specific plan or accommodations, but definitely exercising 2 times a week or walking for 15 minutes 3 times a week could help achieve the weight loss goals. I challenge you to increase your time by a few minutes every week. I have challenge myself...I will get back with you in 6 months. My goal is to lose 1 pound a week by June 10, 2020. 26 weeks away. This scares me a little, but I think I can do it... how about you?

Making positive changes can be a challenge but recognizing changes will improve your confidence and perception of your accomplishments. Many of us fail to reach our dreams or goals, due to our misguided perceptions and self-negativity. I must confess, I am guilty of what I coined as a "procrastination-perfectionisms." We need to accept that it' ok not to be perfect and it's ok to succeed. Get rid of the feeling that "this

could be better" or that "it's not good enough"; As a writer I have posted to my lap top..."The worst words your ever write are better than the best words you never write." That quote could apply to anything.

Set your goals, write them down; when you meet your goal, highlight with your favorite marker to still be able to view what you accomplished. View it daily, post where you can see them. Try daily goals or monthly goals. Make it a todo list if that works better for you. My list includes walking 15 minutes a day, doing an act of kindness every day, keep a box in the closet for goodwill, purge monthly. On the 1st when I pay my bills, list all the birthday's I want to remember. It can cost less than a dollar to bring someone joy on their birthday.

Finally, NEVER GIVE UP! Keep trying. Change your goals or add new ones as needed. Be realistic about your goals and what you want. Did I say write them down? I would say good luck in 2020 but it just takes self-confidence and courage. Be a lion and bring in the New Year with a roar...Andy

Calming the Monkey Mind

random ideas, which eventually begins spinning out of control in our minds. It's that continuous chatter in our heads that's known as the Monkey Mind. It's the reason many people have

Most people believe they can't stop their thoughts or clear their mind in order to meditate, therefore they believe they can't meditate at all. Well that's a misunderstood concept of what is

It's sometimes hard to explain what something is or how it's done because it's more about an experience than the thing itself, so people simplify it by saying things like "you just let it go", "you just clear your mind" or "you just quiet your brain". But that's not really what happens in meditation, although it is how things are misunderstood.

Meditation is a fantastic way to slow down and feel the peacefulness of a quiet moment in time. However, it does take practice to achieve a mastery skill level of this wonderful self-healing process but anyone can do it. Yes, even you.

Meditation takes an understanding and a breakdown of the process itself. By accomplishing these tasks, meditation sessions will become easier to do and more enjoyable as the practice increases step by step.

One of the main understandings and breakdowns are the slight differences between thinking a thought and being aware of the thought. Knowing this is an important step to understanding the process of what most people call quieting the mind.

An example of the two will be helpful to figure out and understand the subtle differences.

Being aware of thoughts would go like this;

(I call them running thoughts)

- the oil in the vehicle needs changed - my child has practice tonight - did I turn off the coffee pot -

A structure of thoughts like this is an awareness of thoughts. Thoughts that simply run by. Now let's use those same thoughts as thinking thoughts;

(I call them dwelling thoughts)

- the oil in the vehicle needs changed, oh I'll have to get money from the bank to pay for it because I don't have my checkbook and don't have enough cash on me... - my child has practice tonight, I'll need to wash their uniform and pack a snack... - did I turn off the coffee pot? Oh yeah, I remember putting my cup next to the pot when I flipped the switch so I know I shut

Those are thinking of thoughts. Thoughts that are dwelled upon. But do you see the slight changes or differences in each?

Awareness of a thought is basically acknowledging that a particular thought came to surface and then it floats off as the next thought appears. Whereas the thinking of a thought stops at that particular thought and begins to dwell on it by turning it into a thinking process.

There is definitely more to meditation than sitting on a pillow and clearing your mind. This is only one aspect of meditation but it is a good start on trying to meditate. Practice this and see how well you do. It does take time to achieve it fully so don't get discouraged. Just keep practicing and before you know it, you'll be ready for the next stage in meditating.

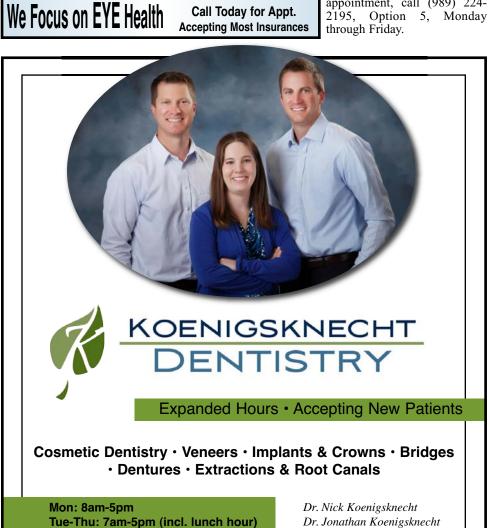
There are also guided meditation classes you can find to take. These sessions are very helpful for many people as there are so many different types of meditation available to do.

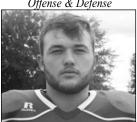

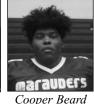

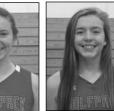

Mother Nature's Son

If American singer-songwriter John Denver were still alive today he'd be celebrating a 76th birthday this New Year's Eve. Born an U.S. Air Force brat in Roswell, New

Mexico, John Deutschendor Jr. arrived 3.5 years prior to the arrival of tiny green men and both have shared similar worldwide notoriety and fame that continues to this day. The early childhood years for Denver were often challenged with constant moves and a shy introvert personality; but solace was found in exploring nature, working on his grandparents Oklahoma wheat farm, and of course learning to sing and play the guitar. Little did his grandmother know that gifting her Gibson archtop guitar, made around 1910 and played in her childhood, would eventually help develop one of the best folk singers the world would ever come to know.



Many readers probably know of Denver's music accomplishments as a crossover artist who dominated both the country and pop rock charts for decades with songs like; Take Me Home Country Roads, Rocky Mountain High, Thank God I'm a Country Boy, Annies Song, Leaving on a Jet Plane, and the list goes on and on. During his musical career there were 300 songs recorded of which 200 were self composed. Television specials were commonplace and he often appeared alongside America's beloved muppet friends like Kermit, Miss Piggy and Fozzie Bear. His folksy laid back appearance and country charm made people feel relaxed when they listened to him entertain with songs about simple yet complex concepts like love and nature. His last song written and recorded was Yellow Stone Coming Home and was composed following a family trip rafting the mighty Colorado River.

John Denver received numerous awards for his musical work in the mid seventies and many considered this the peak or highpoint of his career but he continued to write, record, and perform. Two Grammys were awarded posthumously for his work on a children's album and a song being entered into the Hall of Fame. Even two states, Colorado and West Virginia, have adopted his songs as state anthems. But Denver's legacy is not the music nor awards received but instead efforts in politics and conservation. Some would claim that Denver was the first true political activist who used his celebrity status to fight for the environment and world peace. The Weekly Sportsman doesn't particularly care for the word activist as it often provokes the image of an unruly, irrational, and uninformed zealot. Denver may have leaned to the left a little and fought to end poverty, AIDS, hunger, destruction to nature, and the nuclear arms race but he did so with civility and grace. Not one to just speak out he also worked hard to raise awareness and funds by participating in many different benefit performances such as Farm Aid and the Wildlife Concert. Although Denver openly criticized some of President Reagan's policies he was still able to work with the administration to help establish the "Citizen in Space" program along with being awarded the Presidential World Without Hunger Award in 1987.

Denver worked hard to share his love of nature with the world and wasn't afraid to speak of his conservation minded approach. Often seen fly fishing or singing about hunting and farming he was never afraid to illustrate the wise and responsible use of natural resources. Denver even founded an organization in the mid 1970's to educate people on sustainable living. Clearly way ahead of his time. It took a special gifted artist like Denver to sing songs about people loving nature and actually getting high on experiencing Mother Nature herself. When Tipper Gore and politicians wanted to censor his song "Rocky Mountain High" he went straight to Washington to testify and set them straight about his music and what the lyrics meant.

Like most high profile celebrities, Denver was not immune to substance abuse, depression, domestic violence, and failed marriages. Amazingly enough, none of these issues cut his life short but instead it was his love of flying. On October 12, 1997 Denver parished when his small experimental aircraft crashed in Monterey Bay due to a fuel and mechanical failure. With his untimely death the world lost a great musician and conservation advocate way too soon. When you are celebrating the coming of the New Year take a few minutes to honor Denver on his birthday by playing a few songs and singing along.
