



The Michigan House today overwhelmingly approved state Rep. Graham Filler's plan to protect Michigan seniors from

Filler, of DeWitt, said over 70,000 older adults in Michigan have experienced some form of abuse, but suspects the number is actually much higher due to instances being underreported. Filler became familiar with the issue of elder abuse during his tenure as an assistant attorney general and has continues addressing the problem as a member of the State's Elder Abuse



Filler's measure is part of an eight-bill package to add legal protections for adults age 80 and older and increase criminal penalties for individuals who financially or physically abuse elder adults.

"Right now in Michigan, there aren't enough protections in place for vulnerable seniors or strict enough penalties to ensure people think twice before targeting or taking advantage of Michigan's aging population," Filler said. "This is a very serious issue that needs to be addressed."

Under this assaulting a senior could result in up to 25 years in prison and up to \$25,000 in fines while embezzling could result in up to 20 years in prison and up to \$50,000 in fines, depending on the severity of the crime.

"By putting in place stronger protections for seniors and stricter criminal penalties for people who commit elder abuse, Michigan is sending the message that we protect our seniors," Filler said. "People who physically, verbally, psychologically or financially abuse members of our aging population will be held responsible for their actions.'

The plan now moves to the Senate for consideration.





God Doesn't Need You

God doesn't need you. You may have heard the phrase before- God doesn't need you.

This is a statement that is true on the surface, but becomes false if pressed too

far. Let me explain.

Yes, God doesn't need you or me or anything else. God is the only self-sufficient being in all of creation. God doesn't even need someone to love. Since God is a Trinity, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit have been in a loving relationship with each other since before time began.

As Paul writes in Ephesians, "For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith—and this is not from yourselves, it is the gift of God— 9 not by works, so that no one can boast. 10 For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do."- Ephesians 2:8-10

Another Snow Day? Are

these snow days. Seems like they could be in school. Safe and learning. My job and most jobs, parents are gone from 7:15 am when the bus picks them up until 5:30 in the afternoon. It's bad enough to have them home 2 hours after school, before I get there. I leave my work and come home to my other job. Last year I think we had 7 snow days. I already take days off when they are sick. I use up my vacation time and personal days so we only end up with long weekends in the summer. Why are there so many snow days and what can I do with them. I do not want the television to be their babysitter.

Frustrated Mom,

Dear Mom,

You do sound frustrated. I understand there is typically several days moms and dads need to take days off to care for their children. It's only a short time during you working career compared to the time when children can take care of themselves. You need to buck up...your week long vacations will come with time as you give more time to your company.

Might I suggest, first find or create a support group within your school of other moms in the same situation. Take turns on the days off. You take her kids along with your own on your day, and then rotate the days. You didn't say how old your children are, but I am assuming old enough to be left alone or they would be in a daycare or childcare after school program on snow

You need a solid plan of action by planning ahead for the "snow" days. If your kids are old enough to left at home, do something special for them. For example, order their favorite pizza to be delivered. Let the oldest be responsible to pay and tip. Give them ground rules for safety: No strangers or neighborhood kids in the house. Give them a list of jobs: Load the dishwasher, fold clothes, vacuum the living room, brush the dog, sweep their floors in their rooms. It's good to leave them with responsibilities. Take time to make them a "to do" list. Leave your phone or a gizmo to contact you for emergencies. Have an emergency plan. Know who is home in your neighborhood. Tell them only 1 movie and/or 2 hours of television. A day can be wasted fast by watching TV all day. High School students are also out of school and love parttime jobs. Find someone you know and trust and have them just be there with your kids on snow days or even the 2 hours after school.

Back in my day, we loved snow days. Even at 9 years old I can remember jumping for joy day at the local ice rink. The fire department would flood the baseball fields or tennis courts. There would be a fire glowing to dry our wet mittens and warm our bottoms. (Thank you to that person(s), back in the 50's and 60's, who always provided wood for the fires). Sometimes we would run home for lunch and come back for the afternoon. We were outside playing on snow days. Let's get our kids to play again. Send them outside to use their imagination. Make a plan: Sleds and hot cocoa with marshmallows, of course.

You would think we would want to be at school to learn but Snow Days and Saturdays were like holidays. Make it fun for your kids: Buy a board game, a puzzle or a color by number workbook – save just for snow days. Leave special notes and treats for each child for them to wake up to if you cannot be there. It's part of our lifestyle to raise self-sufficient, independent children.

Don't feel guilty. You're doing the best you can. Snow days are a fact of life. It may look ok outside for playing or driving to work but safety on the busses is #1 priority. Even with a heavy bus the ice can be slippery. Be a happy mom. It is what it is...sometimes.

One match point. That's how close Laingsburg wrestling came to a Division 4 team district wrestling championship February 13. Coach Shawn Baynes' Wolfpack fell 38-36 to Dansville, falling just short of a come-from-behind victory.

"There was a plan (going in)," Baynes said. "I knew how some of the matches would go. There was only one match that I thought would go the other way. But, in any case, I knew this was going to be a three- or four-point dual either way."

Down 23-6, the tide turned in favor of the Wolfpack as Devin Nash pinned his 152-pound opponent and kick-started not just a Wolfpack run but a streak of pins.

Laingsburg won four of the next five matches, all by fall, as the streak was only interrupted by a Dansville 11-second pin at 189.

With the score 36-35 in favor of Laingsburg, Gabby Motz stepped onto the mat to try and seal the win for the Wolfpack. But it just didn't fall into place. After a back-and-forth match which was 2-2 after one period and 8-7 after the second, Motz lost 12-11.

For coach Baynes the focus is now on the future of Wolfpack wrestling.

"This season was about putting in the work," Baynes said. "Next season is about trying to do something special and continue to move forward with our young group."







Have you ever been to a conservation/sportsman's banquet when following an invocation the crowd starts reciting the conservation pledge? Did you just stand there not knowing words like a newcomer at a church service? Were you feeling like you missed something during your younger school years? If I am speaking to you then please read on..

It all began with an announcement in the February 1946 issue of Outdoor Life calling for 30 word pledge submissions that would inspire all Americans, not just hunters and anglers, to safeguard natural resources. The deadline entry was set for July 31, 1946 and over \$5,000.00 in cash



awards would be given to winners. There were so many entries to be reviewed, over 15,000 in fact, that the winner was not announced for over two years and finally appeared in the December 1948 issue. L.L. Foreman from Santa Fe, New Mexico was chosen as the first prize winner. Foreman was once a jack of all trades and worked numerous jobs such as harvest hand, ranch cook, and mechanic. What once was a hobby, writing action stories, became his new profession around the time he entered the contest. He collected \$3,000 for his work which would be the equiva-

lent to just a little over \$32,00 today. Entries that placed between 5th and 12th received a check for \$50 and this included Saginaw's Mrs. J. D. Gilchrest who stated that she was "just a homemaker" to a family of trout fishing hobbyists.

Miichigan's connection to the newly created conservation pledge continued in 1950 when MUCC decided to have a wood carving of the pledge made to present to President Harry Truman. A state wide competition was held, although the details remain unclear, and Detroit zoologist Mrs. Janet Skillman (Ensign) was chosen to serve as the young conservationist courier along with Governor Williams for the plaque presentation in Washington, D.C. The Weekly Sportsman believes she is still alive today at the age of 95 and living in Florida.

Although the pledge was revised and shortened in 1993 the original pledge is what can commonly be found throughout Michigan hanging on the walls of clubhouses and often recited at dinner banquets. Take some time to not only memorize the pledge but also incorporate it in everyday life. -WS

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
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Senior Spotlight


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
