### **Elsie Village Proceedings**

ELSIE – The Elsie Village Council held the last meeting of 2020, Tuesday, December 08, 2020, virtually to adhere to the guidelines outlined by the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services. Officials were not excited about the new venue.

Shane Grinnell, village manager, introduced Christin Collom, Director of Clinton County Central Dispatch, reported on the status of the radio infrastructure upgrade for Elsie Police, Fire and Rescue and Department of Public works. The county will be replacing mobile and portable radios throughout the county. Officials were presented lease agreements for the DPW and the Police Department. Clinton County is requesting a 10% match with 1.6 million dollars provided by the bond by the County, and approximately by the municipal governments \$126,000. Clinton County will maintain the lease on equipment for the ten years of the bond. The investment by the Village is approximately \$5,500. The new system aligns with the State system. Officials approved the lease agreements. On a related issues officials were presented a second agreement that is required by the State of Michigan for access to the system, the agreement outlines the rules and regulations for use.

Tom Frink, Village President, made committee appointments: most will remain the same with Sam Frink replacing Jim Hyland. Budget and Finance – Dorothy Ornelas, Sam Frink and Joe Ondrusek; Personnel: Todd Carroll, Joe Cory Witt and Jason Freeman; Park & Cemetery: Todd Carroll Sam Frink, and Dorothy Ornelas; Police: Todd Carroll, Joe Ondrusek, and Jason Freeman; Streets/Sidewalks: Joe Ondrusek, Sam Frink, and Kory Witt; Budget: Sam Frink, Joe Ondrusek, and Dorothy Ornelas; Elsie Fire/Rescue: Tom Frink and Clinton Area EMS representative Kory Witt. Appointments were approved unanimously.

Ann Trierweiler, village clerk, presented the 2020-2021 calendar for approved. After a brief discussion officials approved the meeting calendar.

Shane Grinnell, Village Manager, reported that the office is currently closed due to current COVID restrictions for the next 12 days. It was noted that workshop meetings can be held but cannot be public. DPW employees are working every other day unless there is a village emergency. The Village is to develop a COVID response plan so that if there is an employee outbreak that results in a quarantine there is a contingency plan. The Village has been receiving complaints that the Christmas lights were not up. Part of the problem is the work schedule and the new lights were back ordered but have been shipped.

Grinnell noted that three code violations have been addressed and letters sent. Also, the new police car is in and equipment is being installed and lettering is being completed, should be in service in a few weeks.

An electrician has been looking at the Elsie Area Food Pantry and will be installing a few GFI's and emergency lighting. It was noted that the lease agreement is still in progress. The Food Pantry lease agreement was added as an action step to the agenda.

Officials discussed the need for a number of committees to meet to prepare for the business of the Village and what are the options with the current limited gathering orders from the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services. The committees that need to meet include Budget and the Ordinance committees. Officials discussed the definition of a workshop or committee, when can a quorum be present or not. Committee meetings are less than four council members present, a workshop as defined in the Open Meetings Act Handbook is as follows. "A board quorum also may meet for a workshop, seminar, informational gathering, or professional conference designed to convey, to the conference participants, information about areas of professional interest common to all conference participants.36 These kinds of meetings involve a conference designed primarily to provide training or background information and involve a relatively broad focus upon issues of general concern, rather than a more limited focus on matters or issues of particular interest to a single public body.37 However, when gatherings are designed to receive input from officers or employees of the public body, the OMA requires that the gathering be held at a public meeting. 38"

It should be noted that many municipalities are dealing with this issue to insure that no violations take place and to insure that the functions of the municipalities can continue during the pandemic. One possibility is to open the meetings to the public through a virtual venue.

Ann Trierweiler, clerk, notified officials that no in-person council meetings can be scheduled until April 2021, due to the current COVID restrictions. Officials will look into a ZOOM venue for the next meeting.

Monthly action was taken to approve the meeting agenda with the addition of Clinton County Central Dispatch, the November 10, 2020 minutes, monthly financial reports, and the Elsie Police Department report. Action was taken to approve expenditures totaling \$39,621.37.

#### **Duplain Township**

DUPLAIN - 2020 is coming to a close and the DuPlain Township Board held their meeting Wednesday, December 9, 2020, with a virtual meeting format.

Officials were updated on the transition to new clerk, Sandra Frink, the paperwork to be established has been submitted and she is currently waiting for necessary paperwork from Burnham & Flowers Insurance Company. The transition is continuing smoothly.

Bruce Levey, supervisor, reported that after speaking with the Michigan Township Association regarding the survey and boundary issues in Rochester Colony. It was determined that this is a matter between the homeowner and DuPlain Church Christ and the scope of township involvement is very limited.

Annual action was taken was to approve the 2021 Poverty Exemption guidelines. Dr. Mark Holley, assessor, noted that the Federal numbers reflect a slight increase. In addition, Holley reported that the December Board of Review is slated for Tuesday, December 15, 9 am., presently one action item will be addressed.

Due to the cancellation of the board meeting there was no Elsie Area Fire/Rescue report. A Clinton Area Ambulance update was presented it is projected that the per capita service request will be \$6.00 and a request for a \$2,000 contribution from each municipality for cot purchases thus reducing the strain on capital outlay, noting that the infrastructure is in need of equipment replacement. The next meeting of CAAS is Thursday, December 17, 2020.

Levey, reported on the proposed tomb stone repair at the DuPlain Township Cemetery in Elsie. Mid-Michigan Monument of Owosso, evaluated the six stones damaged when tree fell on them earlier in the year. The estimated repair is \$575 which will be sent to the insurance company. The representative from Mid-Michigan Monument also did a walkthrough of the cemetery and other stones that were damaged and in need of repair as general maintenance. The estimated cost for five additional stones is \$75 each with a cost of \$375. Officials approved the quotes.

Officials were presented a proposal and an agreement from Tri County Electric for the installation of high-speed fiber internet access. After reviewing the documents a roll the proposal was approved.

If you've missed having the opportunity to recycle in Laingsburg, rest assured the Greater Laingsburg Recyclers have missed being able to offer that service. But you should also know that we haven't given up.

As we stated earlier, our hopes for continuing to offer recycling here depends on our being able to establish decent working conditions for our-



selves. After 31 years our aging volunteers wanted a little shelter from the elements with access to bathroom facilities. Unfortunately, the pandemic forced us to close long before we could get that ball rolling. But the chance to win a grant from the state to establish a permanent recycling site in Laingsburg, one that could expand to meet the needs of the wider community and provide additional recycling possibilities, is still within our reach, and we've continued to work towards

We've been selected by the state as having a project worthy of a grant but it hinges on our fulfilling certain additional requirements beyond what we've already established, like secure funding for ongoing operations. And since they wouldn't be able to grant us as much money as initially requested we'll have to raise additional funds to build the facility. So we will continue to explore ways to meet these challenges, but we believe it can be done. You should know that this hoped-for recycling facility would actually be operated by a partnership of the city of Laingsburg, Laingsburg Schools and the GLR. If only Santa could come to our rescue! We hope 2021 will bring us good news, so stay tuned.

In the meantime, recycling at other centers has undergone several changes as well. MSU Recycling has shortened its hours and, for plastics, now only takes #1 and 2 bottles and jugs; check their web site for times and other materials. East Lansing has temporarily closed its recycling site. Granger Recycling on Wood Rd. continues to operate 24/7 but does have some restric-



tions on materials. The Haslett recycling site at 5976 E. Lake Drive is open to all, Mon-Fri with varying hours. If you have any questions or if you feel physically unable to take your materials elsewhere, call us for assistance (Ellen or Terry Link, 517-651-2005). ### **Memorial Hospital Will Serve as Sole COVID-19 Vaccination Distributor in Shiawassee County**

OWOSSO — When the vaccine for COVID-19 rolls out, Memorial Healthcare will serve as the sole administrator for Shiawassee County, and hospital officials said they are ready for the

Memorial has obtained ultra-cold storage for the vaccines and a detailed plan to administer the vaccines for those who choose to take it and meet eligibility requirements, according to a statement released by the hospital Wednesday.

Vaccines from Pfizer and Moderna require specialized storage, handling and administration protocols, and state officials expect COVID-19 vaccines to be made available as early as this month, pending federal Food and Drug Administration approval.

At the same time, the Shiawassee County Health Department will lead the massive countywide effort to ensure residents have access to the vaccine.

"There is hope on the horizon with the upcoming vaccine. We are embarking on what will become the largest mass vaccination campaign the world has ever seen, even larger than the polio campaign of the 1950s," Shiawassee County Health Director Larry Johnson said Wednesday in an email. "The health department will be leading the effort working with multiple local partners, including Memorial Hospital. Frontline health care workers and residents and staff of long-term care facilities will be among the first to receive the vaccine.

"Daily meetings are occurring for the planning of this monumental logistical effort. The first doses could arrive before the end of the year. We hope to be vaccinating the general public by March with the vaccine being widely available to all who want it by June," Johnson continued.

We need to vaccinate 70 percent of the population to achieve herd immunity and eradicate this virus. We all need to do our part by practicing social distancing and wearing masks. There is much to be hopeful for and I truly believe we are closer to the end than the beginning of this

According to Michigan's vaccine distribution plans, health care workers will receive priority voluntary access to the limited supply of the vaccines in the state. Memorial Healthcare employees and other health care workers, and long-term care residents will be among the first in the county to be eligible.

The arrival of this vaccine is a long-awaited turning point in our ability to manage COVID-19 in the community and to protect the health and safety of our valued providers and staff," said Brian Long, president/CEO of Memorial Healthcare. "Preparing for this moment has been a massive undertaking, from procuring equipment to developing new strategies and procedures to educating our workforce. I'm incredibly proud of the way our team has mobilized to meet this moment.

Memorial is one of a few dozen hospitals in the state with the ability to store and administer both Pfizer and Moderna vaccines, the release states. The Pfizer vaccine must be stored at a temperature of minus-90 degrees, requiring a specialized ultra-cold freezer or dry ice. With the specialized equipment, Memorial has the capacity to store up to 6,000 doses of the vaccine.

The number of doses that will be distributed to Memorial hasn't been determined. Once received, the hospital will be able to begin administering vaccines to high-priority health care workers within 24 hours.

In addition to storage, Memorial has made plans for the handling and administration required for the vaccine while maintaining social distancing and restrictions on indoor gatherings for those eligible in the first phase of vaccinations. For example, the Pfizer vaccine must be reconstituted and administered within four hours or discarded. Appointments for priority vaccine recipients will be required to ensure every dose prepared can be administered per the established time frame.

The vaccine is available on a voluntary basis, and it will be provided at no cost to any eligible individual.

#### Don't Miss a Beat During a Power Outage

Short-term power outages can be a minor inconvenience. A long-term power outage can cause a major disruption to daily

The U.S. Energy Information Administration's Annual Electric Power Industry Report says interruptions in electric service vary by frequency and duration across the many electric distribution systems that serve the country. In 2016, the most recent year for data, customers experienced an average of 1.3 interruptions and went without power for around four hours.

When a storm strikes or an accident knocks out electric power lines or other infrastructure, it may take much longer for power to be restored. During Superstorm Sandy in 2012, more than eight million people lost power and outages lasted for days in some major cities. Outlying areas were without power for weeks, according to National Geographic. It's important to know how to handle a power outage to keep everyone safe and comfortable until power can be restored.

Invest in a generator

If you live in an area that is affected by frequent power outages, a power generator may prove a worthwhile investment. Generators come in two basic types. A portable generator can be rolled into place and uses gasoline as fuel. Plug in a set number of household items, depending on the amount of power the appliance can accommodate. A whole-house generator can be hard-wired to a home's electrical system and automatically

engage should a power outage occur.

Prepare in advance

In anticipation of a power outage, stock up on battery-powered devices like flashlights, lanterns and radios. Charge mobile phones and other devices so they're at 100 percent

Keep a cache of nonperishable food available and plan to use any perishable items that are in the refrigerator first. A refrigerator can keep food cold for about four hours after power has ceased, states Ready.gov, while a freezer can keep the temperature for about 48 hours if full. Packing these appliances with ice or frozen bottles of water can help.

Purchase books, board games and puzzles to have activities pass the time until power resumes.

During a power outage

Report the power outage to the power company if it seems localized; otherwise, wait for updates to see who is affected.

Try to remain cool or warm if the HVAC system is not functioning. Pool resources by having everyone in the family gather in one room of the house. Older adults and children are especially vulnerable to extreme temperatures.

Maintain food supplies that do not require refrigeration, including two gallons of bottled water per individual. People who take refrigerated medications should only ingest drugs that have been at room temperature until a new supply is available, advises the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Power outages routinely occur and require planning and safety precautions until power is restored.



# **Duplain Township Property Owners Receive Second Winter Tax Bill**

DUPLAIN - To clarify the confusion in DuPlain Township regarding the Winter tax bill Supervisor Bruce Levey reported that due to an issue surrounding the Elsie Public Library filing of the L-4029 with Clinton County for the newly approved millage, an updated Winter tax bill was sent. Property owners are asked to disregard the first bill that is white in color.

Unfortunately, the misfiling will result in additional costs for reprinting, postage and time incurred, which the Library Board has agreed to reimburse. Also, approximately 96 property owners have paid their Winter taxes and now must draft a second check, and mortgage companies are going to have to make adjustments.

Kam Washburn, Clinton County Commissioner, commented that the millage issue regarding the Elsie Public Library, caused a lot of things that had to happen in a hurry. If the taxes had not gone out early, they could not have been sent out a second time. This was a very complex process to ensure that the millage could be collected in the Winter Taxes. A special meeting of the Clinton County Board of Commissioners, which involved legal counsel had to be held to ensure that the proper paper work was completed. Also, State Treasury forms had to be redone and resubmitted.

Amy Bowen, DuPlain Township Treasurer, handled the situation quickly and efficiently and had to do double duty and will now have to field calls as will the supervisor and the county commissioner to explain the situation. All of the amended tax bills have to been resent. All parties involved apologize for the confusion and inconvenience.

At the November 2020 General Election voters approved the 1.9 mill request which took immediate effect. The approved millage will generate approximately \$130,000 annually for the Elsie public Library.

DuPlain Township Treasurer will hold office hours for tax payments Thursday, December 31, 9am-5pm (closed from 12 pm-1pm for lunch) and Monday, March 1, 2021 9am-Noon and 1 pm-5pm. There is a drop box located on the west side of the DuPlain Township Hall, no cash please, and receipts will be mailed.



## **COVID-19 Quarantine Guidance Update**

Ithaca, Stanton, St. Johns- Mid-Michigan District Health Department is changing its COVID-19 quarantine guidelines to align with those made by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) on December 2, 2020.

The previous 14-day quarantine period was based on earlier data that estimated the COVID-19 incubation period. However, recent data found 90 to 99 percent of COVID-19 infections occur within 10 days of exposure.

While the 14-day quarantine period for those who have been exposed to COVID-19 is still standard, it can be reduced to 10 days if the following two conditions are met:

•The individual does not develop any symptoms or clinical evidence of COVID -19 infection during the 10 days after their last exposure

•The individual continues to monitor for symptoms for 14 days after their last exposure. If symptoms develop, they should get tested and self-isolate while waiting for their results.

Testing locations can be found at www.michigan.gov/coronavirustest or by calling 211. If you test positive for COVID-19 you should follow home isolation guidelines. If you test negative, you still need to complete the 14-day quarantine.

Individuals exiting quarantine should continue to social distance, wear a mask, and avoid crowds.

The shortened quarantine period should be considered with caution for those living or working in congregate living settings or those working with high-risk individuals due to the increased risk of transmission with the shortened quarantine. Refer to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) for information regarding these risks. There may be conflicts in the length of quarantine for employers who fall under Michigan Public Act 238 or Michigan Occupational Safety and Health Administration rules. Employers should refer to these sources when determining whether employees need to wait 14 days to return to work.

#### Ovid-Elsie 2020 All-MMAC Football







A partial three-week shutdown began Nov. 18 and was to extend through today, but Whitmer announced Monday the pause for high school sports would be extended at least 12 more days to Dec. 20. Whitmer cited concerns over hospital capacity and rising death rates.

New Lothrop (8-0) had been scheduled to face Loyola (8-1) Dec. 15 at Madison Heights Bishop Foley. The team was hoping practice could start Wednesday, but that plan will have to be pushed back.

MHSAA Executive Director Mark Uyl expressed disappointment in a statement released Monday afternoon, but also said there is still a plan to finish the fall season and start winter. The extension also affects the girls swimming and diving finals and volleyball. Each one week left to complete.

Uyl said in the statement the MHSAA Representative Council will meet Wednesday to plan a finish for fall and restarting winter. Winter sports practices, which were slated to begin Wednesday, will have to be put on hold until at least Dec. 21.
