



Ammunition Shortage Update

Last week's column about the ongoing ammunition shortage in our country contained an error and the Weekly Sportsman always gets frustrated when facts and figures are falsely reported and not corrected when they should be. The column stated that in the United States there were 5 million new gun owners in 2020. Recently updated figures actually exceed 7million new gun owners. An extra 2 million people purchasing at least a couple 20 or 50 round boxes of ammo certainly adds to the supply and demand conundrum.

A few days ago the Ammunition President for Vista Outdoors, Jason Vanderbrink, posted a video on Youtube to set the record straight on the current production of Federal, CCI, Speer, and Remington lines of ammunition. He couldn't have been any clearer that their facilities are producing more ammunition than ever before and that the demand simply exceeds the supply

He went on to ask for the hate mail to stop and for unwelcome visitors to stop showing up at production facilities. As for the rumors of secret warehouses and sales to only select vendors he emphatically denied such claims. In fact, Vanderbrink mentioned the hiring of several hundred new employees to help assist with production. In closing, he simply asked for patience as they are doing their best to bring an American product made by American workers to the market as quickly as they can.

The Weekly Sportsman still recommends buying what you can find and trading with friends for desired ammunition. Remember there is a difference between hoarding and being prepared.

COVID-19 Vaccinations in Michigan Skilled Nursing Home Facilities

submitted by Bob Wheaton LANSING - Skilled nursing home residents and staff began receiving the safe and effective COVID-19 vaccine made by Moderna today through the Pharmacy Partnership for Longterm Care Program.

The pharmacy partnership is a national initiative to provide COVID-19 vaccine to the Phase 1A priority groups of longterm care facility residents and staff. The Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) is partnering with CVS and Walgreens through the program to manage and facilitate safe vaccination of this patient population, while reducing burden on long-term care facilities and local health depart-

"We know the residents of these facilities are at high-risk for severe illness and death from the virus, and early vaccination of both residents and those caring for them is critical to help protect this population," said Dr. Joneigh Khaldun, MDHHS chief medical executive and chief deputy for health. "We are pleased that more than 5,000 long-term care facilities - including more than 400 skilled nursing facilities - have been enrolled in the program in Michigan to receive the safe and effective COVID-19 vaccine."

There are about 91,000 people including residents and staff at nursing facilities, and it is expected to take about three weeks to complete vaccinations. Additional eligible facilities will soon begin receiving vaccinations including assisted living, personal care homes, residential care, adult family home, adult foster home, HUD supportive housing for the elderly and veterans' homes. The list of sites enrolled in the program is available at Michigan.gov/COVIDvaccine.

To ensure the safety of residents and staff, vaccinators are required to adhere to all applicable Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services COVID-19 testing requirements for longterm care facility staff. In addition, the pharmacists themselves will be vaccinated with the COVID-19 vaccine as part of this program.

"Nursing facility providers are eager to begin the process of vaccinating residents and staff," said Health Care Association of Michigan President/CEO Melissa Samuel. "The coronavirus has been most unmerciful to the residents we care for. We are very hopeful this vaccine will not only be a lifesaver for residents and staff, but also expedite the reopening of our facilities to family members and loved ones.

'We want all our residents and staff vaccinated," Samuel said. "Until we reach those levels, we will all need to remain vigilant in our efforts to mitigate further spread of the virus. I want to thank everyone that has made this day possible.'

MDHHS is following the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention recommendations for prioritization of distribution and administration of COVID-19 vaccines. CDC recommendations are based on input from the Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices, the federal advisory committee made up of medical and public health experts who develop recommendations on the use of vaccines in the United States. Phase 1A includes paid and unpaid persons serving in healthcare set-

tings who have the potential for direct or indirect exposure to patients or infectious materials and are unable to work from home as well as residents in long facilities. term care Additional information on the state's vaccination phases is available in the prioritization guidance.

Vaccine prioritizations may change as more information on

vaccine effectiveness and additional vaccination products become available. MDHHS has provided additional prioritization guidance within these categories. It is important to note that vaccination in one phase may not be complete before vaccination in another phase begins. There may be vaccination of individuals in different phases that occur simultaneously. The timing of the start of vaccination in a phase is dependent on the supply of vaccine from the manufacturer, how vaccine is allocated from the federal level to Michigan and the capacity to administer the vaccine to populations. Decisions on moving to the next phase will be made at the state level.




Michigan health officials have set a goal of vaccinating 70% of Michiganders over age 16, about 5.6 million people, by the end of 2021. There will be no out-of-pocket costs to individuals for the vaccine, however, healthcare providers may bill insurance for administrative costs. The COVID-19 vaccine will require two doses, separated by three or four weeks depending on the manufacturer. Michiganders should receive both doses in order to have full protection from the virus. Individuals who receive the vaccine may experience

mild side effects such as lowgrade fever, sore arm and general discomfort, which indicate that the vaccine is working. There is a robust state and national process for tracking vaccines and reporting side

OWOSSO -- Both Ovid-Elsie and Laingsburg showcased some young talent -- and some veteran leadership, too -- in carrying their respective football teams to the 2020 post-season.

Local football fans -- and media -- took notice.

Five players from coach Travis Long's Marauders, and four from coach Brian Borgman's Wolfpack, have been honored on the 2020 All-Shiawassee Area Football Team, as named by the Owosso Argus-Press.

The O-E honor contingent included Eddy Evans, Keighan Ormes, Landon Stoneman, Kevin Ley and Max Spiess.

Laingsburg's honorees were Doug Matthews, Zach Hawes, DayShawn Bowman and Taylor Zdenahlik.

The Shiawassee Area Player of the Year is Cam Orr, quarterback for the New Lothrop Hornets. The senior led the Hornets to an 8-0 record entering a regional matchup with Detroit Loyola. Orr, to date, has passed for 1,529 yards and 22 touchdowns with only two interceptions. He has also rushed for 450 yards and 14 TDs while averaging 8.5 yards per carry and completed just over 76 percent of his passes. Orr has also been a standout at defensive end, delivering 41 tackles with nine sacks, 14 tackles for loss and several forced fumbles. He plans to play football at Ferris State University, which recruited him as a defensive player.


