



#### **COVID-19 Vaccine is Still in Short Supply**

Ithaca, Stanton, St. Johns- The COVID-19 vaccines are our best hope for ending the pandemic and we have now vaccinated more Michiganders than we have cases of COVID! Progress is being made, although not as fast as most of us would like.

We know many of our community members are waiting to get their COVID-19 vaccinations and many are frustrated because they are having a difficult time getting an appointment. Local public health departments across the State of



Michigan, including Mid-Michigan District Health Department, are moving as quickly as possible to vaccinate those who are eligible. Unfortunately, efforts are being hampered because there simply is not enough vaccine to meet the high demand.

Mid-Michigan District Health Department is administering around 600 first doses every week and holding second dose clinics. We are also working with area hospitals and Meijer Pharmacies to vaccinate as many people as possible. We wish we could vaccinate more people on a weekly basis, and are making plans to hold mass vaccination clinics, but can't follow through with these plans until the amount of vaccine we receive is increased.

When we have COVID-19 appointments available, we will send out a notice to those on our waiting list. If you would like to be placed on our waiting list, please visit our website: www.mmdhd.org/covid-vaccine-information/.

The good news is that more and more vaccination locations are opening up in our area and we recommend people explore all of these options to increase their chances of obtaining an appointment. These locations can be found on our website: www.mmdhd.org/covid-vaccineinformation/.

The biggest challenge every organization offering the vaccine faces right now is the limited Bath, 16945 Marsh Road supply of vaccine. We ask for patience as we work through this monumental task and want our communities to know that everyone who wants to be vaccinated will be vaccinated, but it will

We know that those without internet or our seniors might have an especially difficult time trying to schedule a COVID-19 vaccination appointment. We encourage these individuals to call 211 for assistance. A 211 operator will help callers register or sign up with clinic sites in their

Seniors over 65 who do not have internet or who struggle to use a computer may call their nearest office on aging. Clinton County seniors over 65 can call the Tri-County Office on Aging at 517-887-1440. Gratiot County seniors over 65 can call the Gratiot County Commission on Aging at 989-875-5246. Montcalm County seniors over 65 can call the Montcalm County Commission on Aging at 989-831-7476.

As a reminder, we all need to continue preventative measures such as wearing masks properly, social distancing, and hand washing to reduce the spread of COVID in our communities, even as the vaccine is being administered.

We've come so far since the start of the pandemic, and hope is on the horizon. This is a difficult time for us all, but we will get through this, one vaccination at a time.

### The Average Timelines for Popular Renovation Projects

Home renovation projects are significant undertakings. Working with skilled and experienced contractors can ensure projects go smoothly and are completed promptly. Timing is a big consideration for homeowners as they begin renovating their homes, and the home improvement experts at HomeAdvisor note that the following are some general timelines for popular renovation projects.





- Kitchen remodel: Scale is a big factor to consider when estimating the time it takes to complete various home improvement projects, and kitchen remodels are no exception. 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

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#### Treasury: Working Families. **Individuals Eligible for** Michigan Earned Income Tax Credit

submitted by Ron Leix LANSING, Mich. – Working families and individuals with low to moderate income may be Michigan's Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC), according to the Michigan Department of Treasury.

To qualify, individuals must meet certain requirements and file a federal income tax return, even if no tax is owed or there is no requirement to file a return. If a federal EITC is granted, the state

of Michigan will provide a 6% supplemental EITC when the taxpayer files his or her state income tax return.

The Earned Income Tax Credit is a very important tax credit that all eligible Michiganders should seek out," State Treasurer Rachael Eubanks said. "The extra income this tax credit provides can be really helpful to working, low to moderate income families. Please don't hesitate to seek out assistance so you can claim it on both your federal and state individual income tax returns.'

The amount of the federal EITC depends on income, filing status and number of qualifying children claimed as dependents on the taxpayer's federal income tax return. The EITC reduces the amount of tax owed and may provide a refund.

During the 2019 tax year, approximately 738,400 claimants received the Michigan EITC, totaling almost \$110.6 million with an average credit amount of \$150.

The state Treasury Department estimates there are thousands of eligible Michiganders who are eligible for both the federal and state EITCs and do not claim them each year.
