First Golf Cart License Issued

On Wednesday, March 10th, Elsie resident David Craig had his golf cart inspected by Village Manager, Shane Grinnell. Craig was issued a license to use his cart on Village of Elsie streets. The issued license does not include streets, roads or trails outside of Village of Elsie limits. To obtain a license from the Village of Elsie, golf carts must have functioning headlights on the front and rear of the cart. Registration stickers will be valid April 1st and expire on March 31st the following year. Carts can be registered at the village office located at 125 W. Main Street in Elsie. Applicants must show proof of insurance as a rider to a homeowner's or renter's policy or any other form of policy, for coverage of personal injury and property damage resulting from operation of the subject golf cart. A registration sticker will not be issued unless proof of insurance is provided at the time of the inspection.

Elsie Village Council Proceedings

ELSIE - The regular meeting of the Elsie Village council was held Tuesday, March 9,

2021. The evening agenda addressed a wide variety of topics and actions.

Prior to the regular meeting public hearings were held regarding the 2021-2022 budgets and the golf cart ordinance. Officials voiced optimism regarding the budget; addition-

al grant funding for roads is anticipated.

Golf carts will be on the landscape in the Village of Elsie with the adoption of ordinance 174 Chapter Section 12-1. Details of the ordinance can be found on the website and at the Village of Elsie business office. Related action was taken with the adoption of resolution 2021-04 regarding golf carts was approved, as well.

The Granger Refuse contract was presented for approval including pricing for a community clean-up in one location and/or a curb side cleanup which does cost more. Most communities take advantage of a community clean-up. Scott Truman representative was present to address questions. The costs \$8.84 per household per month, adding the community clean-up \$10.02, or \$10.94 for curbside cleanup day. Discussion followed regarding increasing the monthly fee from \$10 to \$15 monthly with an annual curbside cleanup. The later was approved and will be effective April 1, 2021.

Officials took action to accept the ten year contract with an annual curbside clean-up day. It was noted that monthly recycling will continue and most residents will be encouraged to utilize the carts provided by Granger.

Next, the personnel committee made the following recommendations regarding the Elsie Police Department. First, the department maintain a part-time police chief with a salary of \$32,500 annually, 50 hours per pay period, with 120 hours PTO annually, and one full-time police officer, \$16.00 per hour, 40 hours per week, 80 PTO hours annually, paid holidays and overtime if needed. Further discussion followed. It was noted that a random rotational schedule be encouraged, but scheduling will be completed by the police chief. Officials were in agreement with the recommendation.

Action was taken to adopt Resolution 2021-05 for the gaming license for the Elsie Area Fire Fighters Association; this is the branch of the department that takes care of fund raising for the department. The Association is a 501c3. This action will allow the association to apply for a gaming license through the Michigan Lottery Commission.

Gene Nethaway, Elsie American Legion, was present to request council permission to begin planning the May 31 Memorial Day remembrance with the assistance of the Village and use of resources. The request was approved.

Officials took formal action to adopt the 2021-2022 regular and special budgets. The action was approved.

Annual action was taken to take approve the annual donation to the Tri-County Office on Aging in the amount of \$1,000. The funds will be utilized for Meals on Wheels. In addition the annual Riverside Cemetery cleanup was slated for April 12, 2021

Ann Trierweiler, village clerk, recommended that the clerk's position become an appointed position similar to the treasurer. These are challenging times and with COVID if something were to happen to the current clerk a special election would be required. If no one opted to run for the position and if a qualified nonresident were interested in the position they would not be permitted to fill it. Trierweiler was directed to research the possibility further.

It was announced that in person meetings will resume April 13, 2021, it was recommended that the meetings be held at the Elsie Public Library. It was noted that social distancing and masks will be a requirement.

Shane Grinnell, village manager, reported that Chris Ormes is now part of the DPW team; Jim Hyland donated funds for new flags for the Village in the amount of approximately \$800, they will be installed before Memorial Day. In the past the Village of Elsie has borrowed a street sweeper for the Village of Maple Rapids to sweep gutters. Maple Rapids has since replaced the equipment is considering selling it. Grinnell recommended that the sweeper and mower be purchased for the village of Elsie; he was directed to make an offer for up to \$700.

Currently the DPW is working on patching pot holes, and gravel on the edge of the roads. A street repair bid of approximately \$10,367 was received from Williams Asphalt, to repair the street near the Elsie Town Tub. Grinnell recommended approval so the repair could be scheduled this season. It was noted that the business owner is interested is assisting with the cost of the repair.

Under the topic of public comment Douglas Sturgis requested permission from officials to use Village street and properties for the Elsie Free Fall Festival with a tentative date of Saturday, October 2, 2021. The event is in the planning stages. Officials were very supportive and offered to assist as needed.

Monthly action was taken to approve the meeting agenda with additions - Gene Nethaway representing the American Legion, Resolution 2021-04 golf carts, in-person meetings beginning in April, resolution to consider making the clerk an appointed position, and street repair bid. Also, approval the minutes of the February 9, 2021 regular meeting and public hearings, the financial reports, and the monthly Elsie Police Department report. In addition, officials approved the expenditures totaling \$47,580.79.

ORDINANCE #174 CHAPTER 12: TRAFFIC AND MOTOR VEHICLES: SECTION 12-1 OPERATIONS OF GOLF CARTS IN THE VILLAGE OF ELSIE.

Village of Elsie Golf Carts - Rules and Regulations Definitions

Village means the Village of Elsie in County of Clinton, State of Michigan. Decal means the sticker displayed on the left rear of every registered golf cart within the Village, which are obtained by completing and submitting the proper registration form to the Village of Elsie

Driver license means an operator's or chauffeur's license or permit issued to an individual by the Secretary of State under Chapter III of the Michigan Vehicle Code, 1949 PA 300, MCL 257.301 to MCL 257.329, as amended, for that individual to operate a vehicle, whether or not conditions are attached to the license or permit.

Golf cart means a vehicle designed for transportation while playing the game of golf

Maintained portion means that portion of a road improved, designated or ordinarily used for vehicular traffic.

Operate means to ride in or on, or be in actual physical control of the operation of the oolf cart.

Operator means a person who operates or is in actual physical control of the operation of a golf cart.

Registration means the authorization through which every person intending to operate a golf cart on roads or streets within the Village must follow. Street means a road, roadway, street or right-of-way within the Village of Elsie street system, but does not include a private road. The terms road, roadway, street and right-of-way are interchangeable.

Sunset and sunrise mean that time determined by the National Weather Service on any given day.

Operation of golf carts on Village streets - A person may operate a golf cart on Village streets, subject to the following restrictions:

(1) A person shall not operate a golf cart on any street unless he or she is at least 16 years old and is licensed to operate a motor vehicle.(2) The operator of a golf cart shall comply with the signal requirements of

MCL 257.648, as amended, that apply to the operation of a vehicle.
(3) All golf carts are required to have permanently attached functioning head lights on the front and permanently attached function taillights on the rear of

the golf cart that shall be visible from all distances up to 500 feet.
(4) The operator of a golf cart shall obey by all sections pertaining to traffic in

the Michigan Vehicle Code and the Uniform Traffic Code.

(5) A person operating a golf cart upon a roadway shall ride as near to the right side of the roadway as practicable, exercising due care when passing a standing vehicle or one proceeding in the same direction.

(6) A person shall not operate a golf cart on a state trunk line highway. This subsection does not prohibit a person from crossing a state trunk line highway when operating a golf cart on a street of the Village, using the most direct line of crossing.

(8) A person operating a golf cart shall not pass between lines of traffic, but may pass on the left of traffic moving in his or her direction in the case of a two-way street, or on the left or right of traffic, in an unoccupied lane, in the case of a one-way street.

(9) A golf cart shall be operated at a speed not to exceed 25 miles per hour and shall not be operated on a roadway or street with a speed limit of more than 35 miles per hour except to cross that roadway or street. The Village may designate roads or classifications of roads for use by golf carts.

(10) Golf carts can be operated one-half hour after sunrise until one-half hour prior to sunset.

(11) $\dot{\rm A}$ person operating a golf cart or who is a passenger in a golf cart is not required to wear a crash helmet.

(12) A golf cart shall not be used to carry more persons at one time than the number for which it is designed and equipped.

(13) Golf carts shall not be operated on a road or street in a negligent manner, endangering any person or property, or obstructing, hindering, or impeding the lawful course of travel of any motor vehicle or the lawful use by any pedestrian of public streets, sidewalks, paths, trails, walkways or parks.

(14) Off-road vehicles, such as Gators, quads, dirt bikes, all-terrain vehicles

(ATVs), a multitrack or multi-wheel drive vehicle, dune buggy, or like-vehicles are not considered golf carts.

(15) This section does not apply to a police officer, Village officials, employees, contractors or volunteers in the performance of Village duties.

(16) The operator of the golf cart involved in an accident resulting in injury to or death of any person, or property damage or some person acting for him/her, or the owner of the golf cart having knowledge of the accident shall immediately by the quickest means of communication notify 911 and or the Clinton County Central Dispatch.

Parking Regulations - The parking, stopping, and standing regulations provided in the Village Code, shall also apply to golf carts operated in the Village, as if they are motor vehicles under those provisions.

Registration and Decals-

(a) Prior to operating a golf cart on Village streets, the owner of a golf cart shall register the golf cart annually by making application to the Village of Elsie. Such application shall include proof of insurance as a rider to a homeowner's or renter's policy, or in any other form of policy selected by the applicant, for coverage of personal injury or property damage resulting from operation of the subject golf cart. The Village of Elsie shall review and approve or deny each application, and provide a list of registered golf carts to the Elsie Police and the Code Enforcement departments.

(b) There shall be a \$10.00 charge for the registration of a golf cart, and each approved golf cart shall be issued a registration decal. The golf cart owner shall affix each decal provided by the Village of Elsie Department on a clearly visible place on the left rear of the golf cart near the taillight. The decal shall be valid for one year. Effective for 1 year beginning April 1st and expiring

(c) Operating a golf cart on a Village street without registering or with an expired registration is prohibited.

(d) The Village of Elsie retains the right to refuse to issue and/or revoke any registration decal from any golf cart for any reason that is felt appropriate to ensure the safety and well-being of the citizens of Village.

(e) Any Elsie police officer or Elsie code enforcement officer or designee may temporarily suspend any registration decal, and ban further access on any public street or public property by any golf cart, when in the opinion of that officer the golf cart is being used in a manner to cause damage to public property or members of the public.

(f) The Village Council reserves the right to waive the registration requirements of this ordinance for special events that utilize golf carts. Violations and Penalties-

Any person violating any provisions of this article shall be responsible for a civil infraction and a fine in the amount in accordance with the Civil infraction and fine chart specified in section 7.5-3 in the Village of Elsie Ordinance

EFFECTIVE DATE:

This ordinance will become effective on April 1, 2021. (Effective date must be not less than 20 days after adoption and after publication as required by law.) THE VILLAGE OF ELSIE AT A REGULAR MEETING HELD THE NINTH (9) DAY OF MARCH. A.D., 2021.


Dan Edward Acre



SOS Temporarily Unavailable DuPlain Township Proceedings

DUPLAIN – The monthly meeting of DuPlain Township was held Wednesday, March 10, 2021. The evening was highlighted by the announcement of the DuPlain Township Annual meeting slated for March 27, 2021, 10 am.

Dennis Baese, trustee and representative to the Elsie Area Fire, presented the monthly report 1 fire run and 2 mutual aids; rescue run 12 in Duplain, 1 in Fairfield, 2 mutual aides. To date 42 rescue runs and 15 fire runs. Baese noted that the fire budget will not change for 2020-2021 with Duplain committed to \$71,740,86.

Bruce Levey, supervisor, noted upcoming annual meetings. The DuPlain Township annual meeting is slated for March 27, 2021, 10 am with the major action item approval of the 2021-2022 budget. The annual meeting with Clinton County Road Commission is Wednesday, March 17, 8 am, this is a ZOOM meeting, the purpose is to identify recommended road projects.

DuPlain Township received a PA116 application request from Moore Seed Farm, which was approved and will be forwarded to Clinton County. It was noted that it involves the purchase of the Hanachek farm.

Kam Washburn, Clinton County Commissioner, presented the monthly report. The Commission voted to continue the remounumentation identifying and setting corners of the county and now the townships. In other action they are reviewing the Comprehensive Plan, for land use planning. Noting that the process may be slowed down because of COVID, many of these meeting must be in-person. Washburn recommended that townships should note changes they would like to see.

Next he presented the COVID update, 364 days the of EOC instituted, the county has handled the situation as well as possible. Clinton will continue to implement the Local State of Emergency which is updated monthly addressing current issues. Clinton County makes decisions regarding events and property uses like the 4-H Fair, the Mint Festival and park uses. These uses are currently under consideration. Smith Hall, located at the Clinton County Fairgrounds is being used for jury selection and will be utilized every Friday for Health Department COVID vaccinations. The availability of vaccine is increasing, but are received in random amounts. The funds coming from the newly approved RELIEF package will be approximately 15 million available for county governments over two years; county commissioners are considering the uses of those funds. On a down note, there has been a spike in COVID within the county offices, and the county March 10 it was reported a 6% positivity rate, a week ago it was 1.3%. The cause of the spike is unclear.

Clinton County Commission is considering face-to-face meetings May 1, 2021. Going forward they may maintain a virtual platform. It was noted that there is more public awareness and participation.

Monthly action was taken to approve the meeting agenda, the minutes of the February 10, 2021 meeting, minutes of the special meeting held March 4, and the financial reports. Action was taken to approve expenditures totaling \$2441.56. Related actions included amending the budget: \$5.00 446-956 Roads, Street and Bridges; and \$305.00 253-702 Treasurer, Salary



Those skills can ensure projects are completed quickly and correctly. Labor may seem costly, but such costs may ultimately prove to be a bargain compared to the cost of fixing DIY mistakes. Projects that are minor in scope and don't require the use of potentially costly specialty tools may be better suited for weekend warriors than more complicated renovations.

2. Do I have the time?

Homeowners must determine how much time they have to complete a project before deciding to do it themselves. No one wants to spend months staring at an unfinished renovation project. Homeowners who are already pressed for time may not be able to complete projects in a timely fashion, which can make homes less comfortable and even less safe.

3. Can I pull this off?

DIY projects can instill homeowners with a sense of pride in their homes, but it's imperative that homeowners considering the DIY option conduct an honest assessment of their skills. A lack of renovation experience does not necessarily mean a homeowner cannot successfully complete

a DIY project. But in such instances, it may be best to start with small, straightforward projects and then gradually move up to bigger, more complicated projects as skills are fine tuned. And homeowners who have never been at their best with a hammer in hand should not be ashamed to leave the work to the professionals.

Television shows and online tutorials can make renovations appear easier than they actually are. Homeowners considering DIY renovations can ask themselves a handful of questions to determine if they're ready for the challenge of renovating their homes on their own.







Lawn Watering and Fertilizing Techniques

A lush, green lawn is a sight to behold. Many variables are involved in growing and maintaining grass, and water and fertilizer are among the most important components.

Knowing how much water and fertilizer to apply and when to apply it can make a big difference in the appearance and health of a lawn. That's because a well-fed and watered lawn will develop a better root system, which makes the lawn less vulnerable to stressors like drought, mowing, foot traffic, and heat.

Fertilize: There is no magic formula governing when to fertilize a lawn. The type of grass and how well-established a lawn is must be considered. Experts suggest having the soil tested to determine its pH levels and if any nutrients are lacking. A fertilizing schedule can then be developed after testing.

Keep in mind that overfeeding a lawn will not make it grow any better and actually can damage the turf. Several small applications of fertilizer during the lawn's most active growing period may be helpful, advises the home improvement resource Tools Around the House. An

annual application (late spring for warm-season grass or fall for cool-season grass) may be all that's needed.

Certain fertilizers need to be applied and watered in. Others may be combined with weed-control products and must be set on top of damp grass. Read packaging to determine the right application.

Water: The right watering schedule and techniques can help a lawn thrive. Scotts® says adjusting for climate and nature can help grass to grow strongly. A lawn that has a grayish cast or appears dull green is telling an owner that it needs water. Another test is to step on the lawn. If footprints disappear quickly, the grass blades have enough moisture to spring back.

Water the lawn in the morning before 10 a.m. when it's cooler and the winds tend to be calm so that the water can soak in. For those who must water at night, do so in early evening so that the water can dry before nightfall and will not contribute to disease.
