The Show Must Go On...the "Hello Girls"

LAINGSBURG - On a sunny afternoon, Saturday, May 8, 2021 the first performance in the recently built McClintock Park Amphitheater was none other than the Laingsburg High School Drama Club. An outstanding performance on a perfect day in the new well-designed structure. Students exclaimed how honored they were to be a part of history of the Amphitheater by performing the musical "Hello Girls." Directed by Dr. Jennifer Strickland, Language Arts & Drama teacher at Laingsburg High School, who recently won the People's Choice Award and the Innovation Award at the Online State Theatre Festival for 2020-2021.

The "Hello Girls" was the name of the group of women who served in World War I as telephone operators. The females were a unit formed in 1917 to improve the communication, which helped win the war. The applicants were bi-lingual in French, English, and some German. They wore Army regulation uniforms, and some assignment took them to the front line of the fighting. The 223 women were not given an honorable discharge due to Army regulation specified as male gender only. Sixty years after the end of World War I, the U.S. Congress approved their Veterans status and Honorable discharges for the remaining seven living women who served. This play is a recognition of their heroic contribution to winning the war by translating strategies of the enemy and relaying orders to the field.

The inspiring performances of the play, "Hello Girls" with a cast of singers and outstanding actors which included Regan Yates (21), Brianne Jones (21), Kylie Carlson (21), Tabitha McDowell (21), Caitlyn Sanders (21), Tyler Scanlan (21), Nichole Steffens (22), Mason Bartly (23), Libby Zukatis (23), Olivia Weston (24), Evan Hamilton-Eakin (21).

Grace Matthews (21), Student Director & Choreographer; Tabitha McDowell (21) and Riley Freeman (22) showed excellent student leadership as the Co-Stage Managers. Set Crew and artists included Emily Arthur (24), Makayla Guenther (22), Kaitlyn Kingsbury (24), Piper Seguin (24), Samantha Walker (24).

The Costume crew included Rachael Lalonde (23), Riley Walker (23). Autumn Brown (23) styled the hair and makeup for the actors. Pops and set building included Livia Gauthier (24), Jaylei Kramer (24), and Dan Miller (21). Light & Sound crew included Liam Doyle (21), Ethan Mohney (23), Claire Sanderlin (22). The major cost of the move would involve moving the electrical. Discussion followed. Action was taken to purchase the new shed from BC Barns and to repair the door on the old shed which is not to exceed \$1,000.

Paving bids were presented for consideration, noting \$10,000 was originally approved, office parking lot \$1,459.; along the park the gravel street (State Street) paving would cost \$11,225 (Island Road to the porta bathrooms); 5 areas damaged by water main breaks \$9.982. After intense discussion it was determined to accept the bids for everything except the stretch at the park but will have chloride treatment applied to that section.

Monthly action was taken to approve the meeting agenda with the addition of the Dorman Gallery, approval of the April 13, 2021 regular meeting minutes, the monthly police department and financial reports. Next, officials approved expenditures totaling \$46,782.55.

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Duplain Township May Meeting

DUPLAIN – The regular meeting of the DuPlain Township Board was held Wednesday, May 12, 2021 at the township hall located at 145 W Main Street, Elsie. The township once again held a blended meeting providing teleconferencing as well as face-to-face adhering to masking and social distancing recommendations.

Bruce Levey, supervisor, reported under the topic of roads, bridges, and mill pond that the door at the bridge continues to be unlocked. Officials discussed options to addressing the problem. 2021 road contracts have been signed and the work has started.

Levey also addressed questions that arose regarding the type of support for the youth leagues. In the past is was unclear regarding the purchase of equipment. After consulting with the Michigan Township Association (MTA) it was understood that because the equipment and fields are used by the township residents and available to all it is allowable to utilized township funds.

Bruce Levey, supervisor, also updated officials on the cleanup at the cemetery, though lightly attended very thankful for the help. Those helping included Alexandrea Ladiski, Alyse Ladiski, Jaxon Ladiski, and Kaden McKern.

Denny Baese, Duplain Township representative to EAFD, reported that the fire department was bored last month responding to only one mutual aid run. Fire Rescue responded to 13 rescue calls. To date the department has responded to 28 fire emergencies and 80 rescue runs.

Baese further reported that a number area departments are becoming authorities including Ithaca and Ashley; the details of the contracts will be available for officials to review. It was noted that EAFD is considering reorganizing the governance of the department a process that has been in progress for two years. The Supervisor Levey was directed to seek information from the Michigan Township Association regarding the pros and cons of an association, authority and a district. More information will be available in the future.

There was a brief discussion on the American Rescue Plan and the funds the township will receive. Officials are still waiting for guidance on how the funds can be spent.

Mark Holley, assessor, thanked Supervisor Levey for his recommendation to a neighboring township and has been contracted with Chapin Township. Clinton County has unlocked the property assessment information, and 30 farms will be visited for the purpose of auditing of the assessment.

Kam Washburn, County Commissioner, presented his monthly report. A new Clinton County Circuit Court judge was appointed by Governor Gretchen Whitmer, Judge Cori Barkman of DeWitt. Capital City Airport a new CEO, Nichole Noll Williams, the airport cannot survive with only public usage the airport needs UPS, the Michigan National Guard and others to sustain the facility. The new CEO is the one to expand and encourage companies to locate and utilize Capital City Airport. The he was also happy to report that the 911 project is on schedule and budget despite the COVID-19 virus issues. Commissioners voted officially to allow the fair grounds to be utilized for the 4-H fair, though the fair will be different from the past, safety precautions will be adhered to. Smith Hall will not be utilized as it is being utilized the by the county court system and health department. Jury trials will be beginning as well. The local state of emergency is voted on monthly, it was once again approved, this allows local municipalities to continue virtual meetings. Motz Park will also be opened this year. Finally, it was reported that Clinton County will receive 15.4 million dollars over two years from the American Rescue Act, officials are still waiting for guidance on how the funds can be spent.

Monthly action was taken to approve the meeting agenda, the minutes of the April 14, 2021 meeting and the financial reports. In addition, officials approved expenditures totaling \$25.581.77.

2. God is in control. We see this in the detail of the prophecies, even to the point of saying that none of Jesus' bones were going to be broken. This shows us the intricacy and detail of some prophecies. This shows us that the prophecies came directly from God, who told people to write it down for the rest of humanity to know.

3. God's love for all of humanity. Through the gospel itself- God sending Jesus, fully God and fully human, to live a sinless life and then be crucified on the cross and raised bodily from the dead as full payment for all of our sins.

God's love motivated Him not only to provide the only way for people to enter into a personal relationship with Himself, but it also motivated Him to let humanity know about it. At times hundreds and even thousands of years before it happened.



We have a 2-income family, with a beautiful house with all the comforts of home, plenty of food, new cars, and plenty of amenities. Our sons are College bound and we have funding for them. We have both work from home since the beginning of the pandemic. I am ready for a vacation. We just cannot seem to save any money for a vacation. We now have 2 teenagers, and they are not only eating us out of house and home but are needing \$10 and \$20 every day and recently twice a day. We attend all of their sporting events since they were younger and that will continue to be costly. Then they wonder why we are not going on any big vacations. I would like to take them on some fun adventures before they get any older and

before they only want to be with their teen friends or go off to College. What can I do to save and plan? Endless budget family

Sounds like a BUDGET is exactly what you need. Most people do not live within their means and often cannot save enough for vacation and put it on their credit cards which gets you deeper in to debt. The first thing I advise in Budget Planning is to quit Smoking. Cigarettes cost the average smoker about \$2,000 and month. Over a few years that could help buy a first car for both of your sons. It's ok to drive a 4- or 5-year-old car that is paid for. Next, pay off all credit cards and do not use them for any reason!!!

Always be honest with your children regarding your money. Often children grow up with a distorted view of money and have no clue when they are out on their own. Give your children an allowance. My suggestion is 50 % less that what you are dishing out now. According to your inquiry, you are giving them both up to \$100 a week. Make them budget their money and work on increases if the need changes. They need to learn to prioritize. Are they spending their money to treat for friends, are they paying for lunch at school, are they going to every single school event and the movies, roller skating, paint ball, fast food every day? They need to make choices within their own budget

When my daughter was a teenager 35 years ago, I gave her a fixed amount. Sometimes I was borrowing \$10's from her. She is great at saving and spending as an adult. She can save and go on vacations with her children and purchase luxury items to increase her quality of life, and it is a credit to her that she can prioritize and budget. Depending on their expenses, some things should be saved for, such as a class ring, a car, hair, rom, Year books, PSAT test. You work for your money and it's your money you are giving them, so I also think they need to earn the money you give them. Daily Chores and expectations. They are part of the family and need to learn responsibility by contributing. Open a savings and get your kids one as well. Encourage them to put a percentage away towards a specific item. Such as a new set of skis, a trip to an amusement park with friends, or towards a camping trip. They want money to spend at the arcade and for entertainment or specialty snacks.

As for you, the first thing to do is quit any habit that is costly. Limit your coffee shop lattes. Put that \$5 a day into a jar at home. Get ice cream cone for 99cents. Limit the malts and sundaes. Put your \$100 per week into your vacation savings though an auto transfer on pay day. You will not miss it and you will get used to it not being there. You can do it. 



Wild Ramp Season

There are still a few weeks left to hit the local woods for wild ramps but the foraging season will be quickly drawing to a close. As

leaves begin to develop on deciduous trees and start to form a canopy this will hinder wild ramps from receiving sunlight and cause their leaves to die back.

These wild ramps have a bulb shaped root system much like a green onion and top leaves resembling lily of the valley plants.

Ramps can usually be found under deciduous stands of trees, like maples and oaks, on northward slopes with rich moist soil. They are often found in higher elevations (3,000 to 5,000 feet) in the Appalachian Mountains, however, they do grow quite commonly in Michigan. When walking through the woods in April and May they are often the only vegetation sprouting up through the leaf covered ground. Their strong pungent smell is a clear indication that you have found a patch. There are two methods of harvest; digging up the whole plant including the roots and bulb, or just harvesting the leaves. It takes a full seven years for a ramp to grow from seed to full maturity height of eight inches so many conservationists are only harvesting the tops as the root/bulb system can help shorten the maturity to four years. While the roots can multiply, most new plants germinate in the spring when the black seeds from the pink flower stalks are self seeded in the fall.

This wild allium can be substituted in any recipe calling for onions or garlic. The leaves can even replace basil for a fresh bright green spring pesto. Many festivals in the Applachains honor this wild plant and prepare it by boiling the entire plant in large containers much like other greens. The Weekly Sportsman has even sampled wild ramp wine from a winery in West Virginia. While some drink this fermented beverage straight others use it as a cooking wine.

The taste can only be described as something ten times more pungent than garlic wine if there even is such a thing.

If foraging isn't your cup of the tea then consider a backyard raised bed operation started from seeds or root transplants. If you can keep the solid moist but well drained and provide adequate shade and have the patience to wait seven years then maybe ramp farming is for you. Every spring Upscale restaurants in Chicago and New York pay foragers upwards of \$25/lb.
