Ovid-Elsie Area Schools

ELSIE - Approximately thirty-five concerned citizens attended the regular meeting of the Ovid-Elsie Board of Education, Monday, May 17. Board President, Josh Miller, outlined the board policy regarding public participation in meetings. Individuals were allotted three minutes and one opportunity to speak and the board would not respond to comments.

First, action item was the designation of the CCRESA board representative and the adopting the CCRESA Resolution. A CCRESA Board meeting will be held June 7, 5 pm for the purpose of an election. Erin Bancroft was appointed to represent to O-E Board of Education and Josh Miller was designated as the alternate. The action was followed by a brief recess

The following teachers were recognized for completing the probationary period: Kate Draton and Flecia Gingrich, congratulations to both.

Honor students were recognized for both Ovid-Elsie High School and Ovid-Elsie Alternative High School. It was noted that a successful graduation ceremony took place Sunday. May 16, at the Ovid-Elsie Athletic Complex and the Ovid-Elsie Alternative High School Graduation is slated for Thursday, May 27, at the Donald G. Thayer Memorial Auditorium at the high school.

Dr. Ryan Cunningham, superintendent and Mr. Randy Barton, assistant superintendent, presented the Return to Learn plan update. It was noted that 26 students are currently in quarantine with 3 positive COVID cases. The district averages 90% in regards to two-way communication; The plan will remain the same with changes to the Return to Learn Plan. Action was taken to reconfirm as presented.

Officials were presented building reports and proposals to amend the student handbooks for the 2021-2022

Ms. Rachel Parsons gave Leonard Elementary School update the Run for the Roar great success grossing over \$10,000. Field Day is scheduled for June 4 and in lieu of the kindergarten open house a signing day will be held with a letter of intent for each child. Finally, Leonard and EE Knight will work collaboratively to a Literacy Lau that will be a drive-in event with books for all. Standardized testing is wrapping up.

Mrs. Alicia Ormesbee, EE Knight principal, reported that state testing is underway and

that the staff is preparing for the June 1 Literacy Lua with 630 books purchased. Additional

year end activities include field day and summer school preparations.

Ovid-Elsie High School and Middle School are wrapping up the school year as well.

M-Step testing and benchmark testing is wrapping up and focused learning is taking place. The middle school staff presented a request for a year-end dance, like the prom, safety precautions are being taken to ensure a safe and festive event for the students. The request was

Ovid-Elsie High School had a successful prom and graduation, with tea and awards all during one week. It was a busy week but a wonderful time to celebrate with the 2021 Senior Class. In addition, all testing has been completed, AP testing as well. Other year end activities include the completion of dual enrollment classes, and virtual FFA competition.

Officials were invited to the Ovid-Elsie Alternative High School graduation set for May

27, there will be twelve graduates in the Class of 2021. In addition, a third ASVAB testing session was held recently for online students. Preparations and applications for summer school are being accepted.

Mr. Dan Davenport gave a brief technology update. Updated and additional cable is being installed, and student devices for fall have arrived. He noted that there maybe an opportunity for some reimbursement from grant funding.

AS stated there were a number of guests present to address the OE Area Schools Board of Education. A parent complained about a teacher encouraging students to get vaccinated, a topic she felt was not appropriate. Additional parents and community comments focused on opposition to the masking mandate for children. A bus driver from DeWitt presented opposition to masks, as well. Many speaking were not parents of Ovid-Elsie students.

It was stressed that they were present to be the voice for those who do not have a voice, the children. A few comments were made stating that constitutional freedoms were being compromised. Note approximately 35 individuals present. A Stand Up Michigan representative requested that studies be entered into the minutes.

Board members approved a number of minor changes to the individual building student handbooks. The changes included addressing truancy, bullying and updated cell-phone usage. The technology policy simplified the language for one-to-one devices, and the deposit per device will be \$20.

In other actions officials extended employee contracts to Jenny Wilcox, Special Education teachers at EE Knight Elementary School; Autumn Windsor, secondary counselor at the high school; and Courtney Loynes, first grade teacher at Leonard Elementary.

In addition, officials accepted with regrets the retirement of Roxanne Baumgras a educational support professional.

Finally, officials took action to change the regular board meeting in June, the meeting is slated for June 16, 2021, 6:30 pm.

Monthly action was taken to approve the meeting agenda, approval of the minutes of the April 19 regular board meeting, financial statements and payment of bills. In addition action was taken to renew board policy 5113 to offer schools of choice at Ovid-Elsie Area Schools, and approval of the MHSAA membership resolution.

We would love to be able to recycle so much more and in the future we're planning we will, but for now the decisions are made by our

Clinton County Veterans Memorial Roll Call

The last roll call for two Clinton County veterans who died in defense of their country have been added to the Clinton County Veterans Memorial. Veterans on the roll made the supreme sacrifice in the war effort they were part of, and will be remembered and memorialized forever.

Some were KIA's, some died of wounds, some died of non-battle causes, some died in training accidents, some died in prison, some died in friendly fire accidents and some lived long enough to make it home before they died. But, they all died because of the war effort they served in, and made the supreme sacri-



Sometimes records on some veterans are mistaken or information is missed that should have been included. After some additional research, tow veterans names that were missed will be added to the Clinton County Veterans Memorial Roll Call, Marcus Bentley and Joseph Mason, will be added to the Civil War list.

Marcus Bentley, Fifth Michigan Calvalry Bentley, Marcus, Essex. Enlisted in company G, Fifth Calvalry, Aug 18, 1862, for three years, age 19. Mustered Aug. 28, 1862. Honorable discharged on Surgeon's certificate of disability at Washington DC, Sept. 24, 1864. He was missed because there was no date on record what disability was or why he was discharged. Family relation stated he died of disease that he came home with on Dec. 27, 1864 at Essex Township.

Joseph Mason, Third Michigan Infantry Mason, Joseph, Lansing. Enlisted in company G, Third Infantry, as First Sergeant, May 10, 1861 at Grand Rapids for three years, age 37. Mustered June 10, 1861. Commissioned Second Lieutenant Aug 1, 1861. Wounded in action at Fair Oaks, VA, May 31, 1862. Commissioned First Lieutenant June 9, 1862. Mustered Jan 25, 1863. Commissioned Captain Jan 1, 1863. Mustered Jan 1, 1863, killed in action at Chancellorsville, Va on May 3, 1863. Was missed because Lansing was listed as his address. He lived in DeWitt Township, Clinton County with a rural route address in Lansing

Religious Thoughts

Mark's record here in chapter 11 is one of the two times that Jesus destroyed something in nature (the other was the demons He cast out into a herd of pigs that ran over a cliff). This fig tree had no fruit, "nothing but leaves," and He cursed it. Seems extreme, but it was symbolic of what He had found in Israel...no spiritual fruit on the tree of Israel.

With days before His death and the New Covenant, Jesus was done with their lip service (Mark 7:6), and wanted a heart change that He did not find (Mark's next section is the second time He threw out the moneychangers from the Temple, which Israel's leaders had turned from a worship center into big profits). They had drifted too far from God.

Religious hypocrites are nothing new. Good riddance to fakers with green leaves and no real value, but it's also a good reminder...one day Jesus will inspect your life for fruit too. "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ (2 Corinthians 5:10).

Not "fruit" like being good or going to church (Isaiah 64:6, Titus 3:5), but real repentance as Jesus' baptizing cousin said in Matthew 3:8, "bring forth fruit in keeping with repentance." He wants a change of heart, a surrender of your rebellious attitude of indifference to your sin and His love for you. Jesus wants you back, but your sin separates you from God (Isaiah 59:2).

So who cares about fruit and repentance? Well, you should care because you are going to meet Jesus and He won't care a fig about church or being good. His standard is perfection, absolute holiness, and the absence of sin (Habakkuk 1:13, Matthew 5:48). It makes sense since Heaven has no sin, but no one is that pure, so is it even possible?

"Nobody's perfect, and He can't really expect me to be holy? If I'm honest, I've lied, cheated, stolen, lusted, and busted just about every commandment in thought, word, or deed. So if He wants to have an impossible standard, I don't care. I'm guilty, so be it, and if I'm honest, not really very good either...if 'good' means holy, then I'm lost.

God knew our broken-helplessness, His responsibility to be just and punish lawbreakers, and so He provided Himself...a lamb. Only God can meet His holy standard, and that's why God became a man. Jesus, the sinless man, was that perfect payment for us. God loved us, reconciled us, and remained just by having His Son die in our place. His sacrifice made us as righteous as God (2 Corinthians 5:21). This good news is free, but you must choose it. Fall seems a long way off, but October is coming (Hebrews 9:27).

Moral Hunting Season Advice

Dear Andy,

I have walked all over my county and in upper Michigan over the years and I have never found a Morel Mushroom. It there a trick to finding them? Any tips? The Huntress



Dear Huntress,

There are some great tips that have been shared with me over the years. It's not too late in the year, but most serious hunters are out the end of April and into May. The best time is after a night or early morning Spring rain at about 40-50 degrees. Followed by sunshine. It is tricky. Morels will not grow if it is too cold or too hot. The best temperature I have seen this fungi "pop up" was in the low 60"s. Some hunters use a soil thermometer.

Once you find a spot, do not tell anyone the exact location. Most patches will come back in the same area for a few years. The natural deterioration of the mushroom can take up to 2 weeks before it decays. Mushrooms are just waiting for someone to find them. It takes morel mushroom up to 3 weeks to fully extend their heads. Many are found under leaves near old Elm tree trunks that have decayed naturally. In a warm sunny area, usually on the sunny side of a hill.

The scientific name is Morchellaesculenta; ie Morel Mushrooms which can grow into many shades of tan and brown to almost white in the same patch. Take a photo of the Morel Mushroom with you. Making a mistake can get you extremely sick. There are a few look-alikes hidden in the woods, as well. Be patient in you search. Take a phone, secure your keys, and use a compass and a paring knife. Always cut the stem of the mushroom; do not pull it out of the ground. It needs the root to regrow. Use recycled onion bags to carry your harvest with you. It allows the spores to spread as you hike through the woods. Deer hunting trails are a great place to start. The further north you travel, the later the season....all the way in to mid-June.

Last time I went Morel hunting I lost me car keys and parked in an area I thought was a parking entrance where I have seen hunters by Sleepy Hollow Park. Turned out to be a off road jump for 4-wheelers and I was stuck. When I got towed out, my front bumper tore off. So advice... watch where you park, hunt, and walk. Bring the right tools and know exactly what you are looking for. If it sounds like too much work... Morels can be purchased at the tune of \$50 - \$60 a pound.

Cooking eating them is the best. Soak clean in cold water to get the sand out completely. Save up to 3 days or use a food drier for eating at another time. (follow food drier directions). The best way is to slice and sauté in butter, sliced onion, and garlic until tender for about 5 -7 minutes and serve over burgers or steaks. I think I will go out today to look again, after I get an estimate on my bumper. Last time I only found 1 big one so I am motivated to find more.



It's so exciting when a woman has their child. They nurture their little tiny miracle and teach them as they grow. Kissing their booboos, cleaning cuts, scraps, and tons of messes up. Teaching them right from wrong. Guiding them through school and sometimes even college. Helping them with tough rela-



tionships, life problems and choices, along the way. Watching them grow up so quickly and finding themselves wondering just where the time went.

Then out of nowhere, things change. That once close and loving relationship disappears. It's almost like, the now grown child, went to sleep one night and awoke a completely different person. Everything changes and you, the parent, is left in this whirlwind of confusion.

Your grown child is now behaving oddly, reacting strangely and not only going out of their way to ignore you but being extremely condescending and belligerent towards you.

Its mind blowing for sure and makes you start thinking that maybe it's all in your head. Until someone else notices it too and mentions it to you. Then the horrifying thoughts begin flooding your mind. Memories of a close blood relative who acted bizarre and now you're noticing the similarities. Scared to know yet needing to know, you work at talking them into seeing the doctor.

Finally, you begin to feel a little better after talking with the doctor and having some type of a plan on how to navigate this unknown territory. Even your frustrations have gone down because although the doctor told them the same things you've been telling them for months, they listened as though they've never heard those things before and they're going to work to find out what's wrong and get better. You're finally seeing light at the end of this dark tunnel and you're feeling relief.

Until things shatter again and hell's demons rear their nasty heads. Or at least that's how it feels to you when they simply decide that they don't need help and it's all your fault. They never finish seeing the doctor or have the testing done. In fact, they isolate themselves from everyone and turn against you even worse.

Then the next thing you know, they're packing their vehicle with their belongings. Thinking they're throwing a tantrum and not knowing at the time; it'll be the last time you'll ever see them. You just stand there in shock, with no words, wishing to just wake up from this enormous nightmare that seems to just continue on forever.

The next thing you hear is their vehicle driving away and the last words they said to you burns in your ears as you helplessly watch them drive away. Your heart all of a sudden crack and you're completely broken by the time their vehicle is out of sight.

The fear of your child needing help and being unable to do anything about it, haunts you. Your beautiful child that you created, raised, protected and cherished, has now turned against you. Blaming you for everything that ever went wrong in their life and you have no idea why.

You try calling and texting them but both only go unanswered and you know you're being ignored. At first you count the hours, then the days, which turns into weeks and then passes into months. Still hearing nothing from them. It's as if you no longer exist to them. The only thing giving you any comfort at this point are the little birdies letting you know that they're safe.

Even after all this time you still find yourself sitting and waiting for them to call or text. Getting hopefully every time a vehicle drives by until you realize it's not theirs. Your worries still continue because you know they need help and it's only going to get worse until they do.

The questions are still haunting your mind on a regular basis. What happened? Where did you go wrong? What could you have done differently? You shower yourself with guilt and blame but have no clue why or what you've done to cause or deserve this. There's no closure and only pain grows inside.

Sad, isn't it? Especially when you've actually done everything you could to help them. You took care of them, you raised them, set them up for a successful life, and even sought out medical care for them. The rest, unfortunately, is out of your hands. It's completely up to them to choose what they want for themselves, their life and their health. There's nothing to blame yourself for because you didn't do anything.
