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

Health Department Shortens Quarantine

Ithaca, Stanton, St. Johns- Nearly one month ago a dramatic rise in COVID-19 cases prompted the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services to reinstate a 14-day quarantine for close contacts of those with COVID-19.

Throughout this surge the Mid-Michigan District Health Department (MMDHD) has exercised the highest level of caution by maintaining the gold standard of a 14-day quarantine for close contacts as it provides the lowest risk of transmission of COVID-19 to others.

A review of local data shows case rates and test positivity rates are trending downward, which is welcome news. These findings, along with the knowledge that quarantining for two weeks causes a disruption in education and a hardship for some families has led MMDHD to reduce the number of required quarantine days

While a 14-day quarantine period is still recommended, it may be shortened to 10 days if the person remains symptom free and continues to monitor themselves for any sign of COVID-19 illness. This change goes into effect Wednesday, May 5, 2021. Anyone who is in a 14-day quarantine on or after May 5 can reduce it to 10 days.

MMDHD has notified Traceforce, the contact tracing program for the State of Michigan, of the quarantine change. However, errors are expected for several days as the quarantine change is implemented in the Traceforce system. We apologize in advance if you receive a letter or message from Traceforce stating that your quarantine period is 14 days instead of 10.

As a reminder, proof of antibodies or a negative COVID-19 test result during quarantine will not reduce or end quarantine. The only people excluded from quarantine are those who have been infected with COVID-19 within the last 90 days or are fully vaccinated for two or more weeks prior to exposure.

MMDHD is asking community members to continue efforts to slow the spread of COVID-19. Washing your hands frequently, staying at least six feet away from others not in your household, not attending large gatherings, and wearing a mask can make a big difference. And, if you have not been vaccinated, be sure to visit our website, www.mmdhd.org, to make an appoint-

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

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the City of Laingsburg Council (the "City Council") has amended the City of Laingsburg Zoning Ordinance, as provided for in Resolution No. 2104 and Resolution No. 2105, with the following

Amendments to Sections 515, 601, 837 – To eliminate the marihuana microbusiness use as a permitted use within the City of Laingsburg as provided for in the Michigan Medical Marihuana Facilities Licensing Act, Public Act 281 of 2016 and the Michigan Regulation and Taxation of Marihuana Act. Initiated Law 1 of 2018, being MCL 333,27951 et seg.

Amendments to Sections 203 and 424 - To provide for the general use and location requirements of solar energy systems. The recommended changes establish requirements for associated placement, land development, installation and construction regulations of solar energy installations. These Zoning Ordinance amendments were adopted by the City Council on Monday, May 3, 2021, and shall become effective seven (30) days following the day of this publication. Before it is too late, have a younger neighbor "borrow" your ladder. Keep it stored in their garage or barn. If you have friend or family member to help, please ask! ...so you are not left holding the ladder. It is important to talk to him about your concerns, but it is just as important for him to feel useful even if he may not be as young as he acts. Remind him of easy jobs, such as the hedge trimming, raking, or picking up sticks, sweeping or weeding. Ask him to ease up on the heavy-duty jobs, such as cleaning the gutters, checking for missing shingles, getting chain saw out to trim trees, or moving patio furniture and putting in screens. Get someone to work with him or pay someone to do the Spring chores. He deserves it, after all the years of working to take care of your home, and so do you. Take him lemonade or a glass of iced water, several times during the day. Keep him hydrated and it will force him to take breaks often.

Not that men or even women think it could happen to them but according to the consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC) over 95,000 people receive emergency room treatment

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

every year from accidental falls. And, that does not include the accidents that are minor or unreported. The top three reasons accidents occur is due to a poor working condition of the ladder, using the wrong ladder for the job or when the ladder is improperly used. A high percentage of victims are often holding objects with one hand while climbing up or down the ladder. Wet or slippery shoes can cause serious problems.

The #1 reasons for falls occur when reaching too far to one side or the other of the ladder and lose their balance. It is important to have another person always secure the ladder, while someone is climbing. Keeping a body centered and always keep at least one hand on the rail. Move slowly. According to the CDC, 43% of accidental deaths have been caused by ladder falls. As we age, we often feel like we can still do everything but do not take the chance. Live to garden and drink iced tea, together. If your husband insists, show him the statistics, and call a younger friend or relative to help. It is ok to be aging. It is what we are meant to do when we have birthdays. Most importantly: Install gutter guards and hire a handyman or get a volunteer from your neighborhood church.

Learn the Right Ways to Clean Lawn and Patio Furniture

Once the days begin to grow a little bit longer and the numbers on the thermometer creep a tad higher, outdoor entertaining season is right around the corner. Homeowners may be anxious to once again return to the comforts of their backyards. However, their patio furniture may not be ready for lounging just yet.

Some simple cleaning strategies make it easy to brighten outdoor furniture made of metal, glass, wood, and plastic. Before homeowners know it, their backyards will be ready for outdoor entertaining season.

Proper storage

Storing outdoor furniture during the colder months of the year is a great way to protect items from the elements. This may involve careful shrink-wrapping and keeping items outdoors, or by moving furniture indoors to a shed or garage. Cleaning the furniture one last time before storing it also can be handy.

Remove stuck-on debris

Inspect furniture and be prepared to remove any stuck-on debris, such as bird droppings, sticky food residue or even cobwebs and insect nests. Be sure to use a cleaning tool that is safe for the material you are cleaning. Test an inconspicuous area of the furniture first to ensure your tools don't damage the furniture. For example, many scrub brushes can scratch glass or aluminum.

Make a thorough cleanser

Clean stains off of furniture with a versatile cleanser. A mild cleaner can be made by mixing 1/2 cup baking soda with 1 gallon of warm water, according to the experts at Better Homes & Gardens. Regular dishwashing detergent also can be mixed with water, as it has a mild bleaching agent. This cleanser can be used on plastic resin furniture or metal furniture, which are popular patio furniture materials.

Patio fabrics

Check the cleaning instructions of outdoor fabrics, as there might be specific instructions on the tags. In some cases, fabric may be removed and washed in a washing machine on a gentle setting. A



solution of dish soap and warm water also is a gentle way to clean outdoor fabrics. Once items are clean, HGTV advises applying a water-repellent fabric protector to minimize staining and maintenance.

Strip or sand

Wood furniture may need specialized care. If stains cannot be removed with a mild cleanser, then hard woods like teak can be surface-sanded to restore items' original look.

Pressure washers can often do more harm than good to patio furniture, so it's best to look for an alternative way to clean them. Usually a bit of elbow grease and a cleanser is all that's needed. Give the cleaning product time to work. Wipe down and dry the furniture thoroughly to prevent the growth of mildew.









Did You Know?

Without pollinators, more than 100 crops grown in the United States would not be able to thrive. Plants, including various fruits, vegetables, nuts and more, rely on pollinators to ensure to transport pollen. Though many plants are self-pollinating and others are pollinated by the wind or water, many others rely on insects and animals to become pollinated. The Department of Agriculture says birds, bees, bats, butterflies, moths, flies, beetles, and small mammals all can work as pollinators. Examples of crops pollinated by pollinators include apples, squash and almonds. Animals and insects help pollinate more than 75 percent of the world's flowering plants, and nearly 75 percent of all crops, according to the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service. Unfortunately, pesticide use can diminish the number of natural pollinators. Natural gardening and pestcontrol can help protect the habitats of pollinators.

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How to Care for Perennials

Perennials can add color and vibrancy to any garden. One of the more desirable components of perennials is that they come back year after year, meaning homeowners do not have to invest in a gardenful of new flowers every year. That can add up to considerable savings. Perennials often form the foundation of beautiful gardens.

Annuals only grow for one season, produce seeds and then die. However, perennials die back to the ground every autumn and their roots survive the winter. So the plants reemerge in the spring, according to The Farmer's Almanac. Some perennials are short-lived, meaning they will come back a few consecutive years; others will last for decades.

Though planted perennials require less maintenance than annuals, they are not completely maintenance-free. Certain care is needed to help perennials thrive, and that starts with the soil. In fact, soil is the single most important factor for growing healthy plants. Penn State Extension says most perennials grow ideally in well drained, fertile soil with a pH of 6.0 to 7.0. In addition, organic matter can improve soil texture and waterholding ability.

When including perennials in the garden, make sure you wait for the right time to plant them. The ideal time is during the spring or fall. Perennials come as container-grown perennials, which already have been established in the soil. Bare-root perennials are just roots that are often packed in peat moss. In order to plant bare-root perennials, soak the roots in water for several minutes before gently planting in the ground, indicates the how-to resource Tip Bulletin.

Perennials should be watered deeply, especially during the first growing season. However, the soil should never be overly dry or wet. Most perennials do not need to be fertilized heavily. A single application in the spring typically is all that's needed

Care along the way can include deadheading spent flowers so that plants can use their energy on seed production and reblooming. Perennials should be divided when they grow large, every three to four years when the plants are not in bloom. Perennials produce fewer flowers or may look sickly when the time has passed to divide them. Early spring often is a good time to divide perennials, advises The Farmer's Almanac.

A thick layer of mulch can help perennials to overwinter successfully. Perennials planted in containers will need to be transplanted into the garden before it gets cold because most containers cannot thoroughly insulate perennial roots.

Apart from these strategies, perennials pretty much take care of themselves. As long as sunlight requirements match plant needs, the perennials should thrive.

The Lady Wolfpack also placed first in the 400 relay thanks to Ashley Bila, Hailey Bila, Grace Borgman and Kribs (53.48).

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

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
