In the late afternoon of Saturday, June 12th, a powerful storm with golf ball size hail moved slowly thru the Meridian Weekly distribution area, causing much damage and leaving thousands without power for several hours in the Elsie, Laingsburg and Ovid areas.

The aftermath of the storm left homeowners with hail damage to their vehicles, roofs of their homes and outbuildings, siding and windows. RV's were also damaged due to the pelting of the hail during the storm. Trees were down across roadways and power lines due to high winds.

DPW crews, local fire departments and Consumers Power worked quickly to remove the down trees and restore power. On Sunday and Monday, tree service crews were out attending to the aftermath of the storm.







State Rep. Graham Filler of DeWitt is spearheading a plan to honor a Clinton County native who was killed in 1967 while deployed with the U.S. Marine Corps in Vietnam.

Pfc. Ronald James Fitch was born on Feb. 10, 1947 and grew up in St. Johns. He enlisted in the Marines after he turned 18 and was deployed to Vietnam as part of the 3rd Motor Transport Battalion. Pfc. Fitch was tragically killed just shortly after his 20th birthday on April 5, 1967,

during a resupply run in Thua Thien Province.

Filler's plan would designate a portion of US-127 in Clinton County as the "PFC Ronald James Fitch Memorial Highway.

Naming the portion of U.S.-127 that runs by Pfc. Fitch's hometown in his honor will ensure that his life will never be forgotten," Filler said. "It is my hope that everyone who drives this stretch of road will pause and reflect on the ultimate sacrifice Pfc. Fitch gave for our country."

If enacted, House Bill 4735 will name the portion of highway US-127 between Wildcat Road and Livingston Road in Pfc. Fitch's honor.



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


Laingsburg came out stinging the ball and didn't let up during an entire hot, steamy Saturday afternoon here June 12.

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## **Governor Whitmer Proclaims June as Michigan Dairy Month**



LANSING — Governor Gretchen Whitmer has proclaimed June as Michigan Dairy Month, coinciding with National Dairy Month, to celebrate the state's dairy farmers and dairy processors; to recognize the dairy industry's contribution to the state's economy; and to promote the health and nutrition benefits of dairy products.

National Dairy Month is traditionally celebrated in June to encourage Americans to reduce the risks of osteoporosis, high blood pressure, obesity, and colon cancer through consumption of dairy products, and to help parents and caregivers teach the children in their care the importance of healthy eating habits, good nutrition and physical activity, and how dairy fits into a well-balanced, healthy meal plan. Dairy foods provide about 52 percent of the calcium, 51 percent of the vitamin D, and 17 percent of the protein consumed by Americans.

There are 440,000 dairy cows on 1,153 dairy farms of all sizes in our state, which produced 11.56 billion pounds of milk in 2020, ranking Michigan 6th in the nation for milk production. For the first time, in January 2021, Michigan dairy farmers produced more than one billion pounds of milk in a single month, joining an elite group of five other states to reach this production level. That production trend is expected to continue and has led to an expansion of dairy processing facilities and the use of new technologies.





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#### **Avoid Drowsy Driving Incidents**

Driving offers a sense of freedom that is hard to replicate. Is it any wonder young drivers are so eager to get their licenses while older drivers aim to hold on to them as long as they

Certain hazards come with getting behind the wheel, though most are largely preventable — including drowsy driving. As more people take to the roadways this spring and summer, it is important to remember that drowsy driving is a major problem.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration estimates that as many as 6,000 fatal crashes each year may be attributed to drowsy drivers. The National Sleep Foundation found about half of adult drivers in the United States admit to consistently getting behind the wheel while feeling drowsy. In addition, more than 40 percent of survey respondents say they have fallen asleep behind the wheel at least once.

The impact of drowsiness on driving is just as dangerous as driving while intoxicated, distracted or under the influence of both legal and illegal drugs.

• Reaction times are greatly reduced and worsen the drowsier the driver becomes. • Awareness of hazards and the ability to sustain attention are diminished. Driving after being awake more than 20 hours without sleep is the equivalent of driving with a blood-alcohol concentration of 0.08 percent. The National Safety Council warns that fatigued drivers are three more times more likely to be in a car crash than drivers who are not fatigued. • Insufficient sleep is tied to poor decision-making, which can lead to risk-taking behind the wheel.

Some drivers may not recognize they are driving while drowsy. Drivers with certain sleep disorders, such as obstructive sleep apnea, may not recognize that their interrupted, less restorative sleep can adversely affect their safety behind the wheel. Addressing sleep disorders can help drivers be more safe. Other people may be sleep deprived from working shift hours or taking care of young children. Asking for help to catch up on sleep can alleviate drowsiness when behind the wheel.

Individuals can take additional steps to make them less susceptible to drowsy driving.

- Avoid driving between midnight and 6 a.m. or in the mid-afternoon when sleepiness peaks, according to the Sleep Foundation.
- Ask to change medications if they cause drowsiness. Check to see if supplements list drowsiness as reactions and avoid those that do.



### **How to Protect Your Car from** Sun Damage

People know to protect their skin and eyes from the sun. Sun exposure can be dangerous for the body, but the sun's rays also can damage automobiles.

Leaving a vehicle exposed to sunlight for extended periods of time increases the risk of damage to its interior and exterior. It's important that car and truck owners recognize this so they can mitigate the potential problems sun and heat may cause. Testing conducted at the State Farm® Vehicle Research Facility found interior vehicle air temperatures have been recorded well in excess of 145 F. Interior surfaces exposed to direct sunlight have been recorded at temperatures in excess of 195 F.

The automotive repair service Fix Auto says the sun's ultraviolet rays can cause the vehicle's paint to peel and fade over time. UV rays break down the molecules in the paint and make it appear dull. The company says red paint is particularly susceptible because red paint molecules deteriorate faster in the sun than other paint colors.

To prevent potential sun-related damage, take these precau-

- · Avoid direct sunlight. Park in the shade as much as possi-
- · Crack a window. If it is safe to do so, lower interior air temperature and equalize air pressure by opening up car windows a little.
- Use a windshield protector. Reflect sunlight away and keep the vehicle cool with a windshield sun protector that unfolds and slides into place.
- · Use a protectant wax. A layer of wax can offer another layer of protection against the sun's ultraviolet rays.
- Wash the car frequently. Washing and hand-drying the vehicle helps to remove dirt and other debris which can cause micro-scratches in the paint.
- Install seat covers. Seat covers can protect leather and fabric upholstery. A leather conditioner can help prevent cracks and tears from sunlight and heat.

These easy steps are simple preventative measures that protect vehicles against sun damage.

I don't remember reading this verse in the Book of Acts. I know I have, it's underlined in my Bible, but it never hit me like it did until today. It's the whole Bible, in just 13 words.

At 60, I'm more forgetful, waxing nostalgic more and more, especially kid memories—building forts, rock fights, baseball games every day, trees climbed to scary heights, or playing Three Wishes...get a million bucks, meet Al Kaline, and become an astronaut.

But now, as an adult, if we're honest, what we really want is to cheat death, to be able to say, "Hey, remember when...I was dead?" Our death in the past tense (was dead). Doubt it? I'll prove it with your own Yes and No, respectively, to my next two questions.

First, think you'll die someday? And, knowing that you will die, do you think about it much? That's odd. You know you'll die, but you avoid considering the afterlife. Why?

Solomon said, "It's better to go to funerals than parties because death is the end of every man and the living take it to heart (Ecclesiastes 7:2)." Funerals force you to ponder what you won't think about...a kind of warning light. And Jesus, who cheated death, proving He was God in the flesh, is also something we avoid giving any serious consideration. See a weird pattern here? We ignore our biggest problem and Jesus, the only solution.

For some reason, we do not want to think about our death, or consider the one person who ended death when "God raised Him up again." Can you explain that avoidance? There are a lot of answers, but I'll throw one out from my own childhood. Fear!

One day, I got caught stealing some pretty significant items and I hid from my Father, knowing full well he'd punish me (and rightfully so). I hid in the basement under our pool table. I had to return the items, and it was embarrassing, but I cannot remember him punishing me. My fear was unfounded. The next day I was still his son! Nothing changed, and for 70 years he was my Dad. He never mentioned it ever, and loved a thief.

I submit that you know you're guilty too, fear your Heavenly Father will punish you, and so you avoid facing Him...ignorance is bliss, but if your car's brakes are broken you can be ignorant, in bliss, and dead. Your brake light, like a funeral, is a warning to respond.

I further submit that you're wrong about our Heavenly Father, just as I was about my Dad. "For God so loved the world (that's you, guilty), that He gave His only begotten Son, that whoever (you again) believes in Him should not perish, but have eternal life." Twenty-five words to say He loves you, almost twice those in Acts 2:24, which should make you think twice about responding. Repent, believe and He'll forgive you, and then 150 years from now you can wax nostalgic with, "Hey, remember when...I was dead?"

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
