Delta Variant Identified in Shiawassee County

The Shiawassee County Health Department has been notified by the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services of a Shiawassee County resident who has tested positive for the COVID-19 Delta (B.1.617.2) variant.

The Delta variant surfaced in December 2020 in India and has spread rapidly throughout the world. "Due to the Delta variant being more contagious, county residents should remain vigilant in practicing public health mitigation measures." states Health Officer, Larry Johnson. The Shiawassee County Health Department encourages residents that have not yet been vaccinated to do so.

Public health strategies to help slow the spread of COVID-19 include:

- Getting vaccinated
- Wearing a mask around others who have not yet been vaccinated, especially in crowded indoor and outdoor areas
- Maintaining 6 feet from others who are not vaccinated
- Washing your hands frequently with soap and water
- Staying home when you feel ill, seek testing if you have COVID-19 symptoms
- Ventilating indoor spaces

The Shiawassee County Health Department will be offering COVID-19 vaccination clinics every Tuesday in August from 1pm-4pm at the Shiawassee County Health Department. Residents can either schedule an appointment online at http://health.shiawassee.net under the Coronavirus Vaccination tab or walk-in between 1pm-4pm on Tuesday afternoons. Pfizer (12+), Moderna (18+), and J&J (18+) are available. The COVID-19 vaccine is available at no cost.





OWOSSO — A quartet of Ovid-Elsie and Laingsburg softball players helped lead the 2021 edition of the All-Shiawassee Area Softball Team, as announced by the Owosso Argus-Press.

Macy Irelan, a junior right-hander who pitched every inning but one for the Division II state champion Owosso Trojans, was honored as the all-area Player of the Year. Irelan went 37-3 in the circle with 487 strikeouts, 42 walks and an earned run average of 0.78. In 249 innings pitched, she gave up only 28 earned runs. The junior also led Owosso in hitting with a .515 batting average.

For Laingsburg, Kailey Cataline compiled a 31-4 record and pitched 2011/3 innings. The junior right-hander struck out 139 and with an ERA of 3.69. Cataline also batted .384 with 11 doubles, four triples, two homers and 50 RBIs as a First Team All-Area honoree

Hailey Bila was also a First Team selection for coach Jeff Cheadle's Wolfpack. The junior, who is verbally committed to play softball at Michigan State University, set a school record with 70 RBIs and a state record with 20 triples. The center fielder, named Division 3 All-State honorable mention, batted .504 with 60 hits. She scored 77 runs and was walked 35 times, includ-

Her sister, Ashley Bila, was feted as an All-Area First Team shortstop. The freshman leadoff hitter set a state record by scoring 93 runs. She batted .620 with 85 hits in 137 at-bats. The first team All-CMAC, all-district and all-region player added 16 doubles, seven triples and one homer while stealing 36 bases. Jordan Langdon was honored as a First Team catcher. Langdon, a firstteam All-CMAC, all-district and all-region player, batted .460 with 57 hits including 11 doubles, four triples and four home runs. The senior drove in 68 runs. Her fielding percentage was .975 and threw out five runners trying to steal second base and had three other pickoff throws.

Rounding out the Second Team, Ovid-Elsie's Olivia Burt, a sophomore, crafted a 12-6 record and pitched 1091/3 innings during the regular season with a 5.4 ERA. She struck out 83 batters. Burt also batted .475 with 55 RBIs and seven homers.

The Marauders' Madisyn Miller, a freshman catcher/third baseman batted .492 with 59 hits and 49 RBIs. She jolted three homers, two triples and 14 doubles as an All-Area Second Teamer.

Laingsburg's Haley Konieczny batted .432 with eight doubles, five triples and four home runs for the Wolfpack. She drove in 43 runs and was named to the All-Area and All-CMAC second teams.

Wolfpack Athletes Dot All-Shiawassee Area **Girls Track and Field Team**

OWOSSO — Five of the top all-around athletes in the area -- from Laingsburg High School -- have been named to the 2021 All-Shiawassee Area Girls Track Team.

The team is named annually by the Owosso Argus-Press.

Emma Kribs, a junior, finished fourth at the MHSAA Lower Peninsula Division 3 finals in the 100-meter dash in personal-best time of 12.53 seconds. Kribs was first in the 100 at the Greater Lansing Honor Roll Meet of Champions (12.71) and also placed seventh in the 200 dash (27.01). She was third in the Central Michigan Athletic Conference Championships in both events. Kribs' best time in the 200 was 26.88 seconds. Kribs was also the All-Area first team sprinter as a freshman in 2019.

Ashley Bila, a freshman, clocked a season-best time of 13.25, placing fourth at the CMAC Championships in the 100-meter dash. She was third at the Jon Nugent Invitatonal at Bath in the same event. Bila was fifth in the 100 at regionals in 13.49.

Shaily Baynes, the LHS school record-holder, cleared 11 feet in the pole vault to place second in the state in Division 3. 
