

Ovid-Elsie Area Schools Preparing for the 2021-22 School Year

ELSIE – At the regular meeting of the Ovid-Elsie Area Schools Board of Education held Wednesday July 21 officials reviewed and approved the "Return to Learn" plan for the beginning of the 2021-22 school year.

All back to school open houses are slated for Monday, August 23, the individual buildings will post the times. Students will begin classes on Wednesday, August 25, and will be attending classes five days a week and the complete calendar is available at www.ovidelsie.org.

In addition, masks will be optional in the classroom and provided by parents. Note: as of today, masks are still required on public transportation including school buses. In addition, students will not be on cohorts and will be able to move around the building freely and multiple groups will gather on the playground.

Regarding testing, the athlete testing requirements was discontinued June 22, 2021. In addition, vaccinations are a personal choice.

To mitigate COVID-19 cleaning and disinfecting school spaces will continue with deeper cleaning after hours, physical distancing will be encouraged and the District will continue with increased ventilation and regular filter replacement. Universal precautions such as hand washing and personal hygiene will be encouraged.

The offering of a virtual option is still being evaluated, and it appears that there is little interest. Parents who are interested should contact the individual building.

Officials took action to approve the Ovid-Elsie Education Association ratified contract. The three-year contract will run 2021-2024.

Back to school "Project Connect" will once again be serving families across Clinton County with four drive up events. Backpacks, school supplies, new socks and underwear, food, community resource information, and hygiene kits will be provided for school age children in need. Drive up events are scheduled for Bath on Tuesday, August 10 from 9 to 11AM at Bath Middle School parking lot, Ovid & Elsie on Thursday, August 12 from 9 to 11AM at the Ovid-Elsie High School parking lot, Maple Rapids on Tuesday, August 17 from 6 to 8PM at the Maple Rapids Community Ball Field, and in St. Johns on Thursday, August 19 from 4 to 7PM at the Beacon of Hope Family Care Center. Families should choose the event that is most convenient for them and they MUST REGISTER AHEAD OF TIME by July 31st to participate in the event in their area. Last year Project Connect served 243 households with 680 children. 





The mirror tells me I have changed; sometimes it shouts. Time affects everything, except We call this attribute Immutability, and it's linked to His revealing Himself to us in a

stunning Creation (Romans 1:20), His Word (Matthew 5:18), and the Incarnation-when our Creator became flesh and blood as Jesus of Nazareth (John 1:1-4; Hebrews 13:8)

The weight of our differences from Him is not only that we change, but our opinions that are based on capricious authorities and influences fluctuate too, which affects how we see God's truth, or even care to. When discussing spiritual things, most folks have lots of opinions, so I like to ask, "What do you base that on?" Invariably it's, "But I think....

We, the fallible, become the authority, but can you trust yourself? Truth varies with cultures. Ancient Rome and Greece allowed sex with children and goats, Aztecs ate their heartless human sacrifices, Canaanites burnt babies, and scientists err (Copernicus critics, bleeding as a cure, Lister and sterile surgeries, Darwin's theory as fact, or Pluto as our ninth planet). Truth and authority are in flux because we are always changing.

So what you base your opinion on, especially in spiritual matters, matters a great deal. God (Jesus) should not be based on opinion. So God gave us an absolute true north; an immutable authority that confirms what is objective, unchanging Truth, the Bible.

John's Gospel, chapters 18-19, discusses this truth and authority. Pontius Pilate, Rome's authority in Jerusalem, asked Jesus, "What is truth?" Later, Jesus told Pilate, "You would have no authority over Me unless it had been given to you from above." These were critical moments that revealed God's absolute Truth, and the Authority behind it.

Your eternal destiny should not dangle on the thread of an opinion, but you can be sure, and have "true north" on this journey and not get lost, forever (1 John 5:13). Is the Bible supernatural, God-inspired words to know Him? Was Jesus God? Did He rise from the dead to prove these claims? Why won't being good make you righteous (just knowing, without repentance, is not a saving faith, James 2:19)? The Bible explains all of this.

A friend told me, "My philosophy is to do good to people." I replied, "That's great, but what about your sins?" The Bible says that goodness won't save you (James 2:10). For God to be unchanging, He cannot ignore sin and must stay righteous in His immutability (or He'd be like a bribed judge). So, He provided Himself, became sin to save us, and took the judgment we deserved. Love and Justice met at the cross (2 Corinthians 5:21).

Truth came into History and conquered Death as proof of His absolute Authority. Jesus ended "but I think" opinions when He said, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life; no man comes to the Father, but through Me (John 14:6)." Or maybe Jesus lied, but I'm human, been wrong before, so I'll take His Immutability over what I think, every time.

As named by the Owosso Argus-Press, Laingsburg's Zach Hawes and Ovid-Elsie's Jackson Thornton were recognized as two of the top cage talents in the area. Corunna senior point guard Cole Mieske, who led the Cavaliers to an area-best1 4-5 record and its first boys district title in nine years, was named The Argus-Press All-Area Boys Basketball Player of the Year for 2020-21.

The 5-foot-10 Mieske is the first Corunna player to win Player of the Year since Josiah Ehrbright in 2003. He's the first Cavalier to win it outright since Kris Krzyminski in 2001 — Ehrbright shared his honor with New Lothrop's Dwight Brace; Corunna's James Kurrle was also a co-Player of the Year in 2002 with Laingsburg's Joe Schramm.

Mieske led Corunna in scoring at 16.8 points per game and set a single-season school record with 80 (4.3 per game) despite playing in a shorter season. He also averaged 4.8 assists.

A four-year varsity player and three-year starter, the cat-quick Mieske shot more than 50 percent from the floor and 75 percent from the free-throw line. Mieske holds the Corunna school record for steals in a career (214) and scored 924 career points. He was named an Associated Press Division 2 All-State honorable mention pick.

Hawes, a 6-foot-3 senior strong forward for coach Daniel Morrill's Wolfpack, led the area in scoring average at 18.7 points per game while being named to the All-Area 1st Team. He added 5.3 rebounds, 3.6 assists and 2.8 steals per contest. He also blocked 1.7 shots per game and drained 21 3-pointers. Hawes was a second-team pick last season.

Ovid-Elsie's Thornton, a 6-foot-5 senior center, was named to the MMAC first team and was solid inside the paint both in scoring and in rebounding. Thornton averaged 8.3 points, 7.8 rebounds and 0.8 blocks per game for coach Josh Latz's Marauders.
