Gifts From TOK, Alaska

LAINGSBURG: On a recent trip to Alaska, this writer had the pleasure to meet a new-born generation of Alaskan sled dogs during an auction in Sagway, Alaska. Children and bidders were picking their favorite pups. A sleeklooking dog sled was displayed in a nearby store window with a sign stating, "Sled was built in Laingsburg, Michigan.' This notation on the card, in the middle of Alaska, nearly 4,000 miles away from home prompted an investigation. After set-Mrs. Risdon at the local

library, a story began to unfold. She shared some of her Alaskan experiences and the history of dog sledding

If you have had the good fortune to know or meet the Clyde and Pat Risdon family during the last thirty years as residents of Laingsburg, Michigan, you may have had the opportunity to appreciate the genuine love the people from the Native Alaskan Athabascan Community in Tok, Alaska has for this family. Risdon Rigs, Inc, carries a complete line of Dog Sled Equipment which has helped put the amazing Alaskan Iditarod and Sprint Races in the spotlight since it began in 1973

Clyde and Pat Risdon were first introduced to Sled dog racing in the early 1970's on a family vacation to Florence, Wisconsin, as spectators. The family fell in love with the sled dogs and developed a life-long relationship with many "friendly" mushers over the years. Within 2 years the family owned seven sled dogs, a beagle and a three-wheel cart for racing.

The Risdon family moved from Perry, MI to Hermansville in the Upper Peninsula of Michigan before moving to Iron River to compete in local and national dogsled racing. Their passion grew into an unexpected family adventure, a career and business building dog sleds for mushers. The family moved to Laingsburg in 1983 when their son Wally, and daughter Ann, were in high school. During this time Risdon learned the craft with modifications and feedback from mushers which was crucial to creating a better sled. Eventually, his son-

in-law, Bob Whitaker joined the family business.
In 1979 Clyde Risdon designed and built a winner. In 1980 the sled was sent to Alaska and used by Harris Dunlap, professional mushers of dogsled racing in the 1960's with Siberian Huskies. Dunlap later switched to Alaskan Huskies and for many years would breed the best for open-class speed racing teams. When Dunlap placed his next order from Risdon, it was for six more dogsleds. (Risdonrigs.com)

Over time, the sleds have evolved at the skilled hands of Clyde Risdon, who has built

thousands of sleds. Risdon, Inc. have shipped dog sleds and supplies 'North to Alaska' for years, also to Poland, Iceland, Scotland, Russia, China, and Northern Canada. Risdon's wife, Pat said, "When my husband retired from dog sled racing, he put his competitive spirit into building better and safer sleds." In 1993 Risdon donated a sled to Tok, Alaska for their Dog Mushers Association Annual Fundraiser, which he continues to do each year.

Since 1999 the Tok, Alaska Dog Mushers Association and friends from the region have sent many beautiful gifts of gratitude to the Risdon family. This year the Risdon's were invited to display their decades of collectible and Native Alaskan Athabascan treasures at the Dennos Museum Center of Fine Arts and Cultural Center located in Traverse City,

The Risdon collection of Native Alaskan gifts are on display and currently set up for public viewing through Sept. 5th, 2021. The family is excited for this opportunity to share over 50 items designed by the Athabascan Natives of Tok, AK featuring authentic handwo-

The Greater Laingsburg Recyclers are back to stay, so don't resident, Bud Casler will be miss our next recycling drive on Saturday, July 10, from 9 am to 1 pm in the usual location on Roosevelt Row downtown. Recycling is changing all the time, a challenge we hope to overcome with our plans for a permanent facility (coming soon!), so please note the altered list of acceptable items below.

Because we can only accept what waste haulers can find Society. It will be onJuly 6th markets for, and because plastics were not being recycled as widely as we were all once led to believe, we will no longer be able to accept plastics #3-7, glass, or electronics. We will continue to accept CLEAN #1 & #2 plastics; note, however, that "clamshell" #1's—used for packaging fruit, salad greens, pastry, and more—are no longer considered regular #1 PETE (so why are they numbered as such? Who knows?) Cardboard and boxboard (but not refrigerated/freezer or juice boxes); metals; mixed office paper, junk mail, & magazines; newspaper and phone books; and household batteries (separated into alkaline, lithium and rechargeable) are also still accepted. And we've added empty inkjets from Canon, Brother and HP to the list, which you can pick up at the drive. Someday we hope to recycle so much more.

That future we're planning is already in the works, with the deposit made on construction of the building. The GLR still needs to raise more funds to cover the equipment that will be needed for expanded operation. Flyers describing the Waste Reduction Center will be available at the drive, and you can contribute to our GoFundMe campaign through the link on our website (https://recyclelaingsburg.wixsite.com/mysite) and Facebook page. We're shooting for a grand opening in late fall.

The building will be sited on Laingsburg Schools' property on Woodbury Rd., with expanded hours and services available to all residents, businesses, schools and offices in the surrounding area. Heads-up: we'll need more volunteers for a variety of tasks to make this project a success and an asset to the entire area. So help us spread the word: This community cares about the environment!



ven and historic anthology. For many centuries there have been Athabaskan Indian settlements in the region of what is now Tok, AK who have passed on their artisan skills.

According to the Craig Hadley, Museum Director, the exhibits on site are one of the largest in the United States. The displays are one of the most historically completed collections of stone sculpture, prints, and drawings by the Inuit artists and indigenous people of northern Canadian Arctic, Greenland, and Alaska.

Golf Outing Fundraiser



All proceeds will be donated to The Connections – Tutoring and Community Center. Hole Sponsors are still available at \$125 each. Private Donations are Welcome.





Teresa Sisson

Teresa Sisson passed away on Saturday morning, June 26, 2021 at the age of 90.

She was born on January 8, 1931, the first of eight children to Italian parents, Vincent and Angela (Scagliarini) Piccinini who were then living on the Greek Isles of Rhodes. As World War II came into their midst, Teresa and her family were forcibly relocated by the occupying German forces from Rhodes to Italy. When Italy fell to the Americans, Teresa met Ronald Sisson while he was serving there in the US Army. They married and she came with him to St. Johns, leaving behind everything to start a new life in Michigan. She and Ronald had two sons, Dennis and Robert Sisson.

Once she became proficient in English, she attended Lansing Business College, where she developed the skills to become employed in public health through the Women, Infant and Children's program. 



Torpedo Float Rig

Have you ever wanted to use hand tied fishing flies with your casting or spinning rod and reel?

Maybe you should consider

a torpedo float rig the next time you are on a river or when lake and pond fish seem to be near the surface during hot summer evenings. Float or bubble fly rigs are nothing new but require a little bit of practice and finesse but can pay big dividends.

There are several common bubble fly rigs but the Weekly Sportsman favors the torpedo float rig because it is simple to tie and operate along with being very sensitive to light strikes. The plastic torpedo floats come in a variety of colors including clear and fluorescent green. Tie your line to the wide end of the plastic float and then tie a 24 to 30 inch leader with a fly on the narrow end. Some reverse the direction of the torpedo float but the Weekly Sportsman prefers the large end tied to the line from the pole. Make sure you grease the leader and the fly with floatant so it won't sink and spook fish. Once it hits the water try different techniques to see what makes the fish strike as sometimes a fly just floating with the current will do the trick or even a jerking twitching like movement.

For those looking to catch some carp consider the same torpedo float set except use a leader with a hook and bread dough or other floatable bait. Start chumming the surface of the water by sling shooting some of the aforementioned floatable bait and then cast your line once the fish seem to be interested.

I recently signed on as a supporter of the Gigabit Opportunity Act, which would create opportunity zones in low-income rural and urban areas that currently lack the federal minimum broadband service. States would designate the opportunity zones in their state and tax incentives would be provided for the companies that build broadband Internet service in those areas.

This legislation complements the BOOST Act, which I introduced earlier this year. The BOOST Act would allow rural homeowners and primary lessees to claim a \$300 tax credit after purchasing a mobile hotspot they can use to connect to the Internet or a signal booster they can use to increase the speed of a slow connection. Both the BOOST Act and the Gigabit Opportunity Act apply only to areas where Internet connection speeds are below the federal minimum standard of service, which is 25 megabits per second for downloads and three megabits per second for uploads.

Finally, we can all agree that the United States must maintain its role as the global leader in research and innovation. To do that, we must support opportunities in STEM education and that's why in May the House passed the Rural STEM Education Research Act which authorizes the National Science Foundation to award grants for research to improve rural students' access to and participation in the STEM fields. I voted for this bill because STEM education is critical to preparing students for future opportunities that include good-paying jobs and roles in scientific research.

These are just a few examples of the many bipartisan bills I have supported in the past few months. While strong disagreements continue in Congress over many of the issues facing our country, I am still working with Republicans and Democrats to support good policies that will help the residents of mid and northern Michigan.
