Village Council Proceedings

ELSIE – The regular meeting of the Elsie Village Council was held Tuesday, November 9, 2021. The highlight of the evening was introduction of the new Village website.

The elsie.org web site was presented for officials to view and it is expected to go live within the next few days. The new site will be ADA compliant. The site is very complete with forms, bill paying access, ordinances, current events, data and information for the Silversmith program is being entered and will become available. In addition, cemetery information, departments, contact information and resources are available on the website.

The COVID Relief fund check has been received, one half of the total, with the remainder to be received in 2022. Shane Grinnell is currently researching how the funds can be utilized meeting the criteria outlined for compliance.

Shane Grinnell, to village manager, updated officials on the following projects. The park bon fire pit has been placed on hold, still working on getting the enclosure moved from the St. Johns area. The plan is to install the pit soon, but completion will probably be in the spring of 2022. In addition, he is working on getting designs and prints for the proposed Department of Public Works Building. The goal is to have details available at the December meeting.

Grinnell reported that it has been busy at Riverside Cemetery with the installation of foundations, sale of plots and internments. He will be meeting with Link Excavating regarding adding gravel to the cemetery roads. A part time position will be posted for mowing and lawn care at Riverside Cemetery. Contracting services has not been the cost savings expected and more of a headache than anticipated. On a related issue a mower and trimmer will need to be purchased for cemetery use. Finally, the garage door at the cemetery has been replaced on the old shed.

First of all, he illumined the crown of thorns, next, the two wounded hands, then the marks of the spear wound. In the hush that fell, he blew out the candle and left the chancel. There was nothing else to say.

LHS Teenager Bags 225 lb. Black Bear in Michigan UP

LAINGSBURG — You might think bagging a 225 lb. black bear in Michigan's Upper Peninsula would be a really big deal for an inexperienced hunter.

For Laingsburg High School 16-year-old junior Taylor Arthur, however, not so much.

After all, "inexperienced" and "hunter" shouldn't appear in the same sentence when describing Miss Arthur.

"I've been hunting since I was 8 yrs old," Taylor says. "In 2nd grade I had a friend that said he was going hunting that weekend. So, I went home and told my Dad I wanted to go and he said 'OK', and took me out."

Dad is Ron Arthur. Mom is Tammy Arthur. Taylor has a brother, Travis, and 2 sisters, Tiffany and Aleah. "My brother Travis is very active into hunting as well as my Dad," Taylor explains. The Arthur family farms large acreages of land west of Laingsburg in Clinton County, and has for decades.

For the Arthurs, hunting is a family affair. Taylor goes on, "My Dad and brother have really helped teach me how to hunt. My Dad has always been very encouraging and supportive in helping me get the right guns and equipment needed to be successful in my hunts."

In 2014, Taylor made the news when she bagged a Michigan record-book turkey, where she was 1st in Youth Division, 1st in Womens Division and 2nd in the state overall for the biggest turkey.

Deer hunting is one thing. Turkey hunting is one thing. A bear hunt is something altogether different. This was Taylor's first black bear hunt and it carried her to the far reaches of Northern Michigan.

Her hunting tag was for Gogebic County in the U.P. "We did hunt on Public Land and had a hunting guide, Pine Creek Oufitters, helped us get set up," she explains.

The bear she downed was particularly impressive, dressing out at nearly 230 lbs.; an impressive bag for an initial bruin hunt.

Taylor says, "This hunt was such a dream come true for me. I've been wanting a bear for awhile and getting to spend time in the woods with my Dad — and even exploring some falls while we were in the U.P. — was a great bonding experience with him that I'll never forget.

"I feel such gratitude to my parents for allowing me to do

this, Pine Creek Outfitters for putting me on the bear, and Kent Ballard for helping me get the bear tag and most importantly the animal."

This autumn whitetail season, she'll be sticking closer to home. "I love deer hunting, because we can do that on our own land. I like hunting because I love spending time with my Dad and sharing a hobby with him," she says.

When not on the hunt, Taylor enjoys studying science, specifically the Ag science classes at LHS. As of right now, her future plans are to go to college, and she has a great interest in studying law.

What's next for a teenager who's already accomplished what veteran hunters still dream about? They sky's the limit.

Taylor concludes, "I'd really like to get an elk now. I've gotten some pretty nice bucks ..."



New Regulations

by Dan McMaster

All hunters should be aware of new regulations before purchasing licenses this year. For hunters interested in harvesting antlerless deer the rules have been made really simple this year. A hunter can purchase up to 10 antlerless tags that can be used for the most part across the state on both public and private land. For some local hunters this means one antierless tag can be purchased and used to hunt all of Rose Lake and Sleepy Hollow and also private land in both Clinton and Shiawassee counties.

The purchase of one single tag will save the hunter money and open up additional areas to hunt. A single buck tag purchase will let you hunt in all three seasons (archery, firearm, and muzzleloader) and use that tag on an antlerless deer or a deer with 3 inches or more of antler on one side. In other words one tag pretty much lets you hunt anything and anywhere with a single tag. A combo tag will let a hunter harvest an antlerless deer and an antlered deer with 3 inches or more of antler on one side.

For further guidance and information please see the 2021 Michigan Hunting Digest.

Get Your Deer Checked!

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources has reduced the number of deer check stations and hours of operation for 2021. They are beginning a five-year process of strategic, focused chronic wasting disease surveillance by testing deer heads around the state. This year, testing will occur mainly in the southernmost three tiers of Michigan counties. Over the next four years, the remainder of the state will be systematically sampled to determine if CWD is present in other areas where it has not yet been identified.

Locally this means that deer harvested in Gratiot county can be taken to any deer check station or drop box and tested for free of charge. If a deer is harvested in Clinton county it may also be tested for free but only if at a deer check station and the closest are Rose Lake and the Customer Service Center in Lansing. Deer harvested in Shiawassee or Saginaw counties can still be tested but there will be a fee and they will need to be shipped. Further details may be found at michigan.gov/CWD


Officials commented on how the American Rescue funds can be spent. There is a list pro-
