He is retiring from policing after over 40 years of service to the Ovid and Elsie communities. Ron Gwizdala was hired on November 30, 2021to replace Goodrich. The new chief will fill a part-time position for the City of Ovid. His duties will focus on administration, oversight, training and patrol.

Gwizdala was born and raised in Bay City and started his career in policing in Iosco County as a Deputy with the Sheriff's Department. In 2004, he retired as Detective from the City of Saginaw's Police Department. After retirement, he entered the private sector for the next 15 years with Consumers Energy where he managed their Corporate Security Theft & Fraud Division. "Having worked in both the public and private sector has been beneficial. The things I have learned over the years will be helpful as I begin my new journey here in Ovid. I have met some very nice people in the community and I look forward to serving the residents and working with the City Council as their new chief," explained Ron.

### Ovid-Elsie Area Schools

ELSIE – Ovid-Elsie Area Schools Board of Education wrapped up 2021 Monday, December 13, 2021. Officials took action to set the reorganizational meeting of the board for January, 24, 2022.

Josh Miller, board president, took the opportunity to recognize the girl's cross country team and the varsity football team. Both teams won all conference the first time in ten years for the football team and first time for girl's cross country. Members of each team were present and were recognized by the board of education.

Brief building reports were given beginning with EE Knight Elementary the annual holiday shop was very successful and amazing. In addition, Miss Gavenda hosted a gingerbread house contest that was very well received and science club has been taking place two days per week, also very successful.

Mr. Powell, OE Middle School principle, spotlighted a number of the school's employees Karle Delo for all her supports, great activities for staff, tech coaching, assisting with individualized instruction. Also, Jillian Buchard and Trina Pontack who created a spectacular winter land created for the staff and students.

Ovid-Elsie Alternative High School staff reported that the program received two grants from the Ovid-Elsie Community Foundation Grant. One grant was for \$400 and will be used to purchase two pottery wheels for the art department and \$1,000 for field trips. In addition, the new trimester is underway and the program has seen an increase in students.

Mr. Cory Gavenda, high school assistant principal, reported that the welding instructor has resigned and will be effective at the end of the semester. The Clinton County RESA and Mid-Michigan Community College are looking for a replacement. Next, the Juniors won the canned food drive; there are holiday festivities going on and the student council and honor society have adopted families for Christmas.

Officials took action to update the District Calendar. Originally Friday the 17th was scheduled for a half day professional development and half day for students. It was determined to reschedule the PD for a full day of PD February 16, 2022 all staff.

Mr. Randy Barton, assistant superintendent, reported on NWA, I an adaptive achievement and growth, testing will wrap up and will give the district an opportunity to evaluate the academic growth in OE students. It will also help access the needs for second semester.

Melissa Jones, school nurse, reported that testing is decreasing and in the future a report will be written for the district. Currently Jones is working on a webpage – the OE Nurses page; and possibly developing a daily screening process.

Under the agenda topic of public comment Mr. Charlie Green presented each member of the board the inspirational novel Grateful. Green gave a brief history of his family's business, Green Meadow Farms and now he is retired. He further commented that, "my garden is small but there is still work to do."

Next, Kelly Nethaway, took the opportunity to thank the board for listening and addressing the recent situations regarding school safety. She still wishes the district would reconsider the time out of school for COVID contact quarantine, which could be up to ten days without testing and masking.

Finally, officials took action to approve an employee contact for Zachary Loynes, high school paraprofessional.

Officials took monthly action to approve the consent agenda with the addition of field trip request to Zender's by the art program that included approval of the agenda, the minutes of the regular board meeting November 15, 2021, payment of expenditures and the monthly financial reports.





# **Charles Arthur Wadell**

Charles Arthur Wadell, born February 15, 1940 in St. John's, Michigan went to the Lord Thursday, December 16th,

2021. His pain and suffering from cancer has passed. Charles graduated Elsie High School in 1957 while only 17 because he completed two grades together at the local one room schoolhouse. He loved to read and to learn. He was a well-educated man without the benefit of a college degree. Charles lived history; born just after the Great depression and into the time of the Nazi occupation. He experienced rationing during WWII. He remembered his mother taking eggs to market to sell, him churning butter, surviving on potatoes, no indoor plumbing, and their big work horses. As technology advanced to the Elsie area, the Wadell family had a neighborhood phone with which they relayed messages to neighbors. Charles lived when neighbors needed help, help would be there right away. He grew up when handshakes were honored and there was no such thing as boredom.



In his free time, Charles was an avid water skier and snow skier. He could ski off a dock and land gliding onto a beach without his hat flying off or trunks getting wet. Charles shot guns and arrows, though not really for hunting. He loved to go to the Grange Music Hall, taking his sister Janice. Although not a dancer, he loved polka and country music. Charles was active in Future Farmers of America and 4-H programs. He developed his carpentry skills by building his gun cabinet and a full-sized boat.

He would later use these skills as a carpenter in the Army and Air Force Reserves where he had to pick locked doors for military leaders. His favorite military assignment was at Selfridge Air Force base. In Georgia, he witnessed the injustice of separate drinking fountains.

On September 15, 1967 Charles married Gail Harte at St. Joseph Catholic Church in St. Johns, MI. We found out the best conversations with Charles happened in the cab of a tractor. They had to happen there because he worked long hours. He did everything on the farm, milking, treating animals, harvesting crops, planting, cleaning barns, and birthing baby calves that came at any hour and in any weather. Charles was a 50+ year member of the Michigan Milk Producers Association. Charles even had a license to use dynamite and operate his HAM radio. He calmly figured out their first computer in the 1980s and the dreaded "A:" prompt. Charles loved his cows, the fields, the woods, his family, Jesus, and life.


Evidence of this was his staunch support of the Right to Life cause and his membership in the Knights of Columbus. He wanted everyone to have the chance God had given them. Charles loved to travel but especially enjoyed the ocean, alligators, and sunshine in Florida. He was a supporter of MSU, but cheered on whatever school his family was a part of. He loved to watch Michelle's basketball and Jeff's football games at St. Johns. Charles loved life. He rarely used the word "I" or spoke about himself. He gave others the credit and went back to work. He is dearly missed.



The first layer of traditional reindeer stew consists of Almond potatoes. Named after their shape they are very similar to fingerling potatoes and are grown in very cold climates due to their lack of disease resistance. Often produced in white they can also be found in yellow and blue. For Michigan Rudolph Stew simply substitute Michigan grown white potatoes and mash them up and place on a plate. Reindeer are not always processed the way Americans are used to. It is often quartered and stashed in the snow for safe winter keeping. While the meat is still frozen, shavings or very thin slices are made whether they are of tough or fine cuts of meat.

Using butter, onions, and wild mushrooms the frozen meat is sauteed and then placed on top of the potatoes. You can substitute whitetail venison for reindeer and use morels to create a very similar flavoring. Still slice the venison while frozen because it allows thinner pieces compared to thawed out meat. Deglaze the pan for a very light gravy. If you can't find lingonberries and don't want to spend a fortune on those sour berries grown on evergreen bushes in the tundra then

consider a simple cranberry sauce drizzled on top. Probably best to be prepared for questions from inquisitive youth if Santa is coming down your chimney this year and you are serving Michigan Rudolph Stew!
