# **League Champs**



**OVID-ELSIE** — The year was 1984. Ovid-Elsie's girls basketball team was coached by the legendary Mary Hudecek, and led by all-league standout Mary Perrien.

It was the last time the Marauders would win a conference championship. Until February 18, 2022, that is.

A 67-22 blowout victory over Mt. Morris gave coach Ryan Cunningham's team the outright Mid-Michigan Activities Conference (MMAC) championship, its first league crown

O-E climbed to 17-0 overall, 13-0 in the MMAC, while the visiting Panthers remained winless.

The Marauders jumped out to a 26-3 advantage after one quarter and never looked back. Leading the charge on offense and defense for O-E was sophomore Evalyn Cole, with seven steals and 17 points on 7 of 10 shooting from the field.

"Evalyn did an amazing job at both ends of the floor," coach Cunningham said. "Her energy was contagious and it helped propel us to this monumental win."

Another sophomore, Ava Bates, was the team's secondleading scorer, with 10. Bates also shared the team lead in rebounds with Hailee Campbell at six.

Leading scorer on the year, senior Caitlyn Walter scored nine points.

OVID-ELSIE — Dylan Carmen led the way with 21 points, and eight different Marauders found the scoring column as Ovid-Elsie's varsity boys basketball team dismantled Mt. Morris, 81-63, in Mid-Michigan Activities Conference (MMAC) action here February 18.

Coach Josh Latz's Marauders maintained a one-game lead over Chesaning (13-4, 10-2) in the MMAC race at 11-1, 15-1 overall. The Panthers kept sending O-E to the free throw line - the hosts shot 35 free throws — and that was a big factor, as the Marauders made 22 of them.

Axel Newell with 14 points and Clay Wittbenberg 13, joined Carmen in double-figures scoring for the Marauders. Adam Barton and Wittenberg each pulled down 9 rebounds. The Panthers fell to 6-7 in the MMAC, 709 overall with

### **Ovid-Elsie Area Schools**

ELSIE – The regular meeting of Ovid-Elsie Area Schools was held Monday, February 21, 2022, 6 pm. Officials heard from a number of District residents who oppose the artificial turf football field project.

The focus of public comment was the artificial turf approved for the Ovid-Elsie athletic complex. Kevin Nash, voiced his opposition to the replacement of football field with turf and that he was disappointed in the decision that was made. And that the public should have the final say in the spending of these funds. Jason Wenzlik, also indicated that he is also upset about the board decision. Dwight Nash, again, disagreed the decision as well and indicated that the project should have been publicized more. Approximately twelve others were present to support those who spoke.

Finally, Kelly Nethaway, brought up a couple of things regarding the recent hard lock down, that bullying is an issue in the district, and rules not being followed regarding the high school dress code.

On a related issue, Dr. Ryan Cunningham, Ovid-Elsie superintendent, presented officials with the Resolution for borrowing funds for the approved athletic complex updates. After a brief discussion the resolution was adopted

Michigan International Preparatory School (MIPS) presented their annual report. It has been five years since Ovid-Elsie Area Schools entered into the partnership. MIPS will be requesting reauthorization of the partnership with the charter school. Currently there are 1300 students enrolled, and MIPS has added a recovery program to address the treatment for students with addictions partner-

ing with Well Spring and Holy Cross in this venture.

Building and department updates included reports from the individual buildings. Rachelle Parsons, Leonard Elementary School, reported that the after school program up and running with 60 students participating. The students up and running with 60 students participating. The students and staff will be celebrating 2-22-22 with special reading and math activities. Preparations are underway for kindergarten round-up.

Ms. Ormesbee, EE Knight principle, reported that there are also 60 students in the after school program that provides intervention for students. In addition, 3,166 items were collected for the Elsie Area Food Pantry. The comment was made that the school is a very kind and giving

Mr. Brian Powell, Ovid-Elsie Middle School, updated officials on the exciting activities and creative instruction that is taking place. The students are preparing pod casts to enhance literacy skills and the FFA program has been expanded to the middle school which has been well received by staff, students and parents.

Mr. Jason Tokar, O-E High School, noted that 20 out of the 32 students recommended are participating in the credit

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


# **Sparrow Clinton Hospital Opens New Wound Clinic**

Board members and community members should work TOGETHER on making decisions that impact our children and the future of Ovid-Elsie area

I call upon the board to:

Create a listsery for members of the community to opt into. and any other board business in addition to the post in the Meridian Weekly.

Release the agenda for the upcoming meeting in the Meridian Weekly the week prior, to allow community members to know what will be discussed at the upcoming meeting, and potentially voted on.

Further, I ask that you create an indicator on the agenda for which information presented will be voted on in subsequent meetings or indicate if a vote will be taken that evening.

That all presentations/information/documents from meetings are hyperlinked into the meeting minutes, providing easy ess for all.

Provide a zoom option for all meetings so that the entire bublic is able to hear the issues at hand.

Take the input of the community into account BEFORE making decisions and distribute appropriate information timely

I call upon the community to:

Show up to board meetings

Be move involved

Voice your opinions

Educate yourself about the issues at hand and ask the tough questions

Advocate for our children, the future of this community Share the information we get with others in the community Work on having dialogue with the members of the board

This isn't about the you versus them, or me versus you. This is about our entire community working together to invest in the education and well-being of our kids, the future of this community.

### **Late Season Squirrel Hunting**

Squirrel season has been open since September 15th and believe it or not there is only about a month left to enjoy a late season squirrel hunt. While the weather can vary greatly in March so should the tactics used to bag your daily limit of five bushytails. Don't expect to take a casual stroll in light clothing with a small gauge shotgun or .22 LR and expect easy targets above your normal line of sight.

Winter weather and cold mornings still occur in March so semi-hibernated squirrels tend to emerge from their tree nests and dens from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. and then scurry to the ground looking for food. While the squirrel population has declined by March so has the supply of easily obtainable food. Squirrels can no longer run limbs and easily harvest fresh mast and nuts. This means you can sleep in and not have to travel during early dawn to get into position. Look for a block of woods with squirrel nests in trees that are bordered to the south by corners and edges of crop fields with unharvested corn and beans. Expect squirrels to be foraging for any kind of grain or nuts that can be found on the ground. Bring a cushion or make sure your snow camo pants are waterproof and find a comfortable tree to lean against. Your hunting jacket should be bark patterned to blend with the tree and your hat of course blaze orange. As for firearms, select your most accurate scoped .17 Mach2 or HMR and possibly even

22WRM because shots will start at around 50-75 yards and extend out well beyond 150 yards. While the squirrels you hunt in late season may have food on their minds, never underestimate their skittish behavior because they have been survivors up to this point for a reason.

If you are fortunate to harvest a mess of squirrels the possibilities for making them into a meal are limitless. While there are many traditional Michigan options like a Brunswick Stew or Squirrel & Dumplings, it has become trendy to substitute squirrel for shredded chicken in most Mexican or Asian dishes. By March, even the young and tender squirrels have matured and grown up so skinning will be a challenge no matter what. Plan to get on that task right away with a sharp knife and a squirrel skinning device.



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

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

O-E went one for eight at the charity stripe in the fourth quarter and finished 6 of 14 on the night. Also, the team a dismal 17% from the field on the night.


