First, the GLR is happy to announce the Grand Opening Celebration of the Greater Laingsburg Community Recycling Center (GLCRC) on Sunday, April 24 (the day after the recycling drive) from 2 to 4 pm. There will be refreshments and a great big thank-you to all the folks who made the new facility possible, with a ribbon-cutting at 3 pm. All are welcome to attend.

The GLCRC (at 7500 Woodbury Rd.) will be open for recycling this month on Tuesday, April 5; Sat., April 9; Tuesday, April 19; and Sat., April 23. Saturday hours are 9 am to 1 pm, Tuesday hours 4 pm to 6 pm. See below for what we accept.

If you are a resident of Clinton County, you may already know that the spring Clean Community Event, which provides for the safe disposal of items like hazardous household waste and bulky waste items and trash, will take place on April 30; an appointment is required to attend. Call 989-224-5186 by April 22 for more info or to sign up. Volunteers are needed!

Below is a list of what we currently take. Please understand that we can only accept materials for which there are markets. Where once we could take all #1 plastics, we must now exclude clamshells and solid colors. When we began taking #5's again just recently, we were given very narrow guidelines, only to be told we can now take all but those little orange and green pill containers. Some vendors will take boxboard from refrigerated products, others won't. It's a constant guessing game as to what's in and what's out, so all we can do is take as many materials as we're allowed and make sure our "product" is as clean and well sorted as possible, since contaminating a load with the wrong materials will send it all to the landfill.

Presently being accepted: Newspaper and phone books; tin and scrap metal; aluminum (separate); corrugated cardboard (include brown paper bags here); boxboard; mixed office paper and junk mail; magazines; books; #1 plastics, clear & transparent green or blue only (bottles and jars—no clamshells, e.g., takeout, berries and salad containers); #2 plastics (milk jugs/cloudy separated from solid colors); #5 "tub" plastics (e.g., yogurt, sour cream, etc.); household batteries (please separate into regular, rechargeable, lithium and button); glass bottles and jars (all colors); electronics (no televisions; there is a \$5 fee for flat screen monitors); and empty inkjets from Canon, Brother and HP. We now also accept dental care products like toothbrushes, spent toothpaste tubes, and floss containers.

The GLR cannot accept plastic bags or polystyrene/Styrofoam. However, the latter is accepted at the St. Johns Lions', Meridian Township and East Lansing sites; stores like Meijer, Kroger and Walmart take the bags.

FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT

It has been determined that such request for release of funds will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment and accordingly the above-named City of Laingsburg, Shiawassee County Michigan has decided not to prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (P.L. 91-190).

The reasons for such decision not to prepare an EIS are as follows: 1.) No significant impact to the human environment

2.) SHPO has determined "no historic properties affected"

3.) No adverse impact to surrounding properties

An Environmental Review Record respecting the proposed project has been made by the above-named City of Laingsburg, Shiawassee County Michigan which documents the environmental review of the project and more fully sets forth the reasons why an EIS is not required. This Environmental Review Record is on file at the above address and is available for public examination and copying upon request at The Laingsburg City Hall between the hours of 8 am- 5 pm.

(If Applicable) No further environmental review of such project is proposed to be conducted prior to the request for release of federal funds.

PUBLIC COMMENTS ON FINDING

All interested agencies, groups, and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the City of Laingsburg, Shiawassee County Michigan to the Laingsburg City Hall on or before April 20, 2022. All such comments so received will be considered and the City of Laingsburg, Shiawassee County Michigan will not request the release of federal funds or take any administrative action on the proposed project prior to the date specified in the preceding sentence.

RELEASE OF FUNDS

City of Laingsburg, Shiawassee County Michigan will undertake the project described above with Community Development Block Grant funds from the Michigan Strategic Fund under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The City of Laingsburg is certifying to the Michigan Strategic Fund that City of Laingsburg and Paula Willoughby in her/his official capacity as Clerk/Treasurer consent to accept the jurisdiction of the federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews decision-making, and action; and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval City of Laingsburg may use the Block Grant funds and the Michigan Strategic Fund will have satisfied its responsibilities under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969.

OBJECTIONS TO MICHIGAN STRATEGIC FUND RELEASE OF FUNDS

The Michigan Strategic Fund will accept an objection to its approval only if it is on one of the following bases:

- a) The certification was not in fact executed by the responsible entity's Certifying Officer.
 - b) The responsible entity has failed to make one of the two findings pursuant to 58.40 or to make the written determination required by 58.35, 58.47 or 58.53 for the project, as applicable.
 - c) The responsible entity has omitted one or more of the steps set forth at subpart E of this part for the preparation, publication and completion of an EA.
 - d) The responsible entity has omitted one or more of the steps set forth at subparts F and G of this part for the conduct, preparation, publication and completion of an EIS.
 - e) The recipient or other participants in the development process have committed funds, incurred costs or undertaken activities not authorized by this part before release of funds and approval of the environmental certification by HUD (or the state).
 - f) Another Federal agency acting pursuant to 40 CFR part 1504 has submitted a written finding that the project is unsatisfactory from the standpoint of environmental quality.
- Objections must be prepared and submitted to the Michigan Strategic Fund, c/o Michigan Economic Development Corporation, 300 North Washington Square, 4th Floor, Lansing, Michigan 48913. Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by the Michigan Strategic Fund. No objection received after May 5, 2022 will be considered by the Michigan Strategic Fund.

Founding Father, Farmer, and Conservationist

Recently the Weekly Sportsman traveled to Washington, D.C. and was able to spend a morning walking the gardens and fields at Mt. Vernon. Most Americans probably think of George Washington as a military general or as the first president or maybe even surveyor. Very few would say farmer, but that is what he wanted to be most remembered as, and after visiting Mt. Vernon it quickly became obvious he was a conservationist and over 150 years ahead of his time.

Initially the primary crop Washington grew on his five farms, including Mt. Vernon, was tobacco but he quickly learned it was not a sustainable crop to grow because it was hard on the soil and the market was very fickle. Believing in protecting the soil and water he switched to wheat and other grains along with vegetables. Using a seven year crop rotation, accompanied by applications of compost, Washington was able to have higher yields and not deplete the soil while at the same time providing crops for Mt. Vernons residents, laborers, and livestock.

Pastures, with split rail fencing, were rotated around the estate whereas some animals, like the 450 hogs, were allowed to be free range and roam woodlots along with fallow fields.

Washington did not believe in clearing woodlots for additional cropland and preferred to improve the existing soil if higher yields were desired. Understanding the value provided in wildlife, fuel, and building supplies he insisted that only dead or fallen trees be cut.

It didn't take long walking around to observe Washington's sustainable agrarian practices used at Mt. Vernon in the 1700's. Yes, he may have been a Founding Father of our country but upon closer examination he was also a father to modern day sustainable agriculture and conservation. He believed in permanently taking care of the land, along with other natural resources, with the long term goal of making small tracts of land profitable. It behooves any small scale farmers or homesteaders to take a trip to Mt. Vernon or stay at home and read some writings of Washington or books on Mt. Vernon. While Washington's work certainly isn't a one stop shop conservation solution it certainly is a piece of the puzzle to working with the soil and nature instead of fighting it.

Radon Check is Necessary

Dear Andy,

Getting over the COVID financial hit and now the economic changes due to world circumstances, my sister and her children needed to move into my finished basement. I felt for safety's sake I should get the lead levels in our water and a Radon test ordered. I am glad that I did. Our water was fine. The Radon level was 4 x's above normal. Should I let my neighbors know that we have high levels of Radon in our soil and suggest they test their property.

Dear LeeAnn B.,

In response to both issues you mentioned: 1) Very kind of you to let family in to live with you. It can be difficult or a blessing depending on if it is temporary or long term. Set guidelines and make compromises. Don't let frustration of the little things build up. Some things are just "what it is!" "Let it go." "Don't sweat the small stuff." Children are resilient and flexible but can be affected emotionally by just making the move. They need to nest in their own new space so they can get a feeling of belonging. You are the lucky one to be able to offer the option of their family staying and living together.

Sharing homes and expenses are happening all over the country. It is a necessary transition for many families. Extended families to care about and shared chores are some of the positive rewards. Merge the family with few meals together each week and plan a family night for a movie or games.

2) As for the RADON testing in the neighborhood...I agree that it would be a responsible action to take by letting others know of the likelihood that they also may have high levels of Radon. If you live in a neighborhood that has a Facebook or Web site, post the information immediately. You could make a flyer explaining the process of testing and help educate your neighbors on the dangers of Radon gases.

Radon is a natural build up of radioactive gas from the decay of uranium found in most all soils. According to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the Surgeon General, radon is the second leading cause of lung cancer among non-smokers. The gas is odorless, colorless, and tasteless. Radon typically invade homes over 25 years old or home with cracks, drains or foundation deterioration in their basement walls.

Seventy-five percent of states in the U.S. such as Pennsylvania have a building requirement to have a Radon removal system installed to qualify for an occupancy permit. If you find you have high levels of radon and cannot immediately afford a Mitigation Reduction Unit, make sure you do not smoke in your home and have fans circulate the air you breath. Another precaution can be taken by sealing all cracks in the floors, walls. If you are buying a new house: ask about radon-resistant precautions or installations. It can be expensive to mitigate the gas later.

To pick up a Radon kit go to a hardware store and for about \$25.00 you can purchase one. Or go to your county Health Department - no Charge. Then mail it to State Health Department. Directions are on the box. In most counties there are no charges for testing. More information can be found on www.nrsb.org and www.radongas.org.

If you need a recommendation for a Radon reduction unit to be installed after your testing, email Andy. My team has done some research for our area and we can make some affordable referrals.

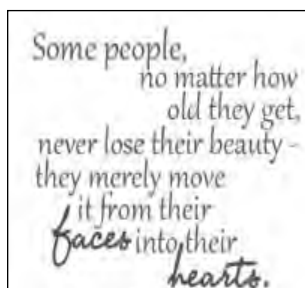

Expanded Schedules for Prep Sports Approved by MHSAA

EAST LANSING — The Michigan High School Athletic Association (MHSAA) has announced they will expand regular season schedules for boys and girls basketball.

And they'll allow baseball and softball teams to play tournament games before Memorial Day.

The announcement comes just days after the MHSAA Representative Council's Winter Meetings in East Lansing.

In a ruling that takes effect next season, boys and girls basketball will now be allowed to play a maximum of 22 regular season games (and increase from the current 20 games), and shorten the amount of preseason practice time from 21 days to 14 days. Many coaches were in favor of this change because it will help allow them to play in more tournaments / jamborees around Christmas / New Year's Day. This rule change covers all levels of high school play (varsity, junior varsity, and freshmen).

Another part of the ruling that takes effect this spring is the change that will allow district games in baseball and softball before Memorial Day. Historically, the state tournament has always started the Tuesday after Memorial Day with pre-district games. This change addresses concerns from baseball coaches regarding the pitch count rule for pitchers and will allow athletes from smaller schools a better chance to play multiple sports in the same spring season (baseball and track, softball and track, etc.).

For the first time, there will be specific events for wheelchair athletes in track and cross country. That ruling takes effect this spring as well.

Beginning this coming fall, high school football teams will be allowed to "opt up" a division and be allowed to play a division above where their enrollment has them currently. Boys and girls basketball teams have been opting up a class / division for years to try to play better competition in the postseason tournaments. Now football teams will be allowed to do the same thing.



Marauder Boys Basketball Team Earns Final Ranking of 6th in Mid-Michigan After 16-4 Finish

OVID-ELSIE — Congratulations to Williamston's Hornets for winning their first state title since 1940 with a thrilling 68-65 victory over defending Division 2 state champion Grand Rapids Catholic Central on March 26 at the Breslin Center.

It capped off an exciting season in the Mid-Michigan area which saw Ovid-Elsie, East Lansing, Williamston, Ionia, Olivet, Pewamo-Westphalia and Webberville win league titles. It also saw East Lansing, Okemos, Williamston, Lansing Catholic, Pewamo-Westphalia, Bath, and Fulton win district titles. While Williamston, Pewamo-Westphalia, Bath, and Fulton won regional titles. Congratulations to all of them.

Coach Josh Latz's O-E Marauders finished a sterling 16-4 season in District action, and earned a 6th-place rating for all of mid-Michigan, as determined by Lansing-area media. The final poll looked like this, from #10 to #1:

10. Lansing Catholic (14-11): The Cougars upset Sexton, Ionia, and Eastern to win the district title. And then knocked off Marshall before losing to eventual state champion Williamston.

9. Webberville (16-6): The Spartans were surprisingly upset in the Division 4 district finals by Fulton, 75-49. A tough way to end the season when they were red-hot coming into the state tournament.

8. Bath (17-7): The Fighting Bees made it all the way to the Division 3 quarterfinals before losing to Ecorse, 80-49.

7. Ionia (16-5): The Bulldogs were upset by Lansing Catholic, 57-55, in their opening district game. A sour end to an excellent season as they won the CAAC White for the second year in a row.

6. Ovid-Elsie (16-4): The Marauders lost to Chesaning in the district semifinals, 51-50. A tough way to end a terrific season for O-E.

5. Olivet (19-2): The Eagles got knocked out in their first district game, 59-53, by Battle Creek Harper Creek in an upset.

4. East Lansing (18-5): East Lansing rallied to beat Grand Ledge to win the district. But they lost to Okemos in the regional semifinals, a disappointing end to a really good season.

3. Pewamo-Westphalia (20-5) The Pirates won the Division 3 regional and had the lead on eventual state champ Schoolcraft in the quarterfinals, but eventually lost. Head coach Dominic Schneider has kept going what Luke Pohl started years ago. They'll be a factor again next year with a younger squad.

2. Okemos (19-5): The Chiefs beat East Lansing in the regional semifinals but fell to Kalamazoo Central in the regional final in overtime.

1. Williamston (27-0): The Hornets battled foul trouble, missed free throws, fatigue, and a tremendous 16-point comeback from defending state champ Grand Rapids Catholic Central to win the Division 2 state title, 68-65, in overtime at the Breslin Center.

It's the Hornets' first state title since 1940.

Lady Wolfpack's Strieff Named to Division 3 All-State Cage Team

LAINGSBURG — LHS standout rebounder Lorna Strieff has been named to the Michigan Division 3 All-State girls basketball team.

Strieff joined New Lothrop's Alexis Miller and Durand's Jordyn Lawrence as local players who were selected as All-State honorable mentions in Division 3, by the Associated Press.

Strieff, a senior for coach Doug Hurst's Wolfpack, was the only Shiawassee-area player to average a double-double per contest (10.0 points, 11.2 rebounds). She set the LHS record for most rebounds in a season with 247.

Miller had an excellent sophomore year for New Lothrop, scoring 14.9 points with 4.2 rebounds. Lawrence, a junior from Durand, averaged 14.8 points, 3.8 rebounds and 2.0 assists for the Railroaders.

Sparrow Receives Largest Donation in its History to Expand Precision Medicine Program

LANSING, MI – James and Judith Herbert of Lansing have made a \$5-million donation, the largest in Sparrow's history, to establish an endowment for the advancement of genomics and precision medicine at the Sparrow Herbert-Herman Cancer Center.

The donation to the Sparrow Foundation is earmarked to create The Genomics Endowment for Diagnosis and Treatment of Cancer and provides for a new Director of Cancer Genomics at Sparrow to oversee and grow the program. Growth of the genomics program at the Sparrow Herbert-Herman Cancer Center will profoundly impact people from across Mid-Michigan for decades to come.

The Herberts are both cancer survivors themselves and were among the lead donors to Sparrow's campaign to build a new cancer center in 2014. The Herbert-Herman Cancer Center opened in 2017.

The Herberts made the first of 101 individual gifts to Sparrow in 1995; their commitment to cancer care began in 2008-2009 with the creation of an outdoor terrace for cancer patients and their families.

James Herbert is the founder of Neogen Corp., and has been a national leader in food and animal safety research. He and his wife have long promoted the value of genomics and precision medicine, which involves the use of a patient's genomic information to personalize care. In cancer patients, it means analyzing the specific makeup of a tumor to guide care, rather than applying a one-size-fits-all approach.

Sparrow is Mid-Michigan's leader in precision medicine and was recently selected to participate in a landmark clinical trial using precision medicine techniques on breast cancer patients. The clinical trial also includes such institutions as the Mayo Clinic and Cleveland Clinic.

The Herberts want others to share in their dedication and lend their support to exceptional local cancer care through the endowment. They say they are indebted to Sparrow for the care they've received over the years and for keeping leading-edge medicine and highly skilled physicians close to home so Mid-Michigan residents don't have to travel out of town for exceptional treatment.

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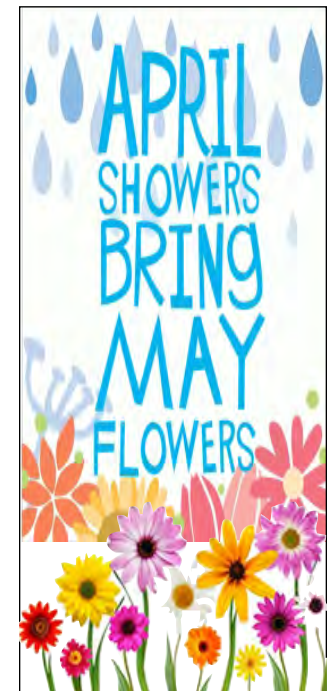



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LAINGSBURG SCHOOLS KINDERGARTEN Round-Up Scheduled
