# **Sheriff BeGole Announces State Representative Candidacy**

(Morrice, MI)- Shiawassee County Sheriff Brian BeGole has filed paperwork today at Michigan's Secretary of State Bureau of Elections to officially become a Republican candidate for State Representative in the 71st State House District. Current State Representative Ben Frederick has served three two year terms and is now term limited.

"I have decided wholeheartedly to run because state and federal government administrations have become out of touch with communities like ours during COVID, social unrest across the country, and most recent past elections," commented Sheriff

A simple campaign platform with a three pronged approach has been created consisting of economic recovery, criminal jus-

tice improvement, and the protection of constitutional rights and restoration of integrity in the electoral process.

"I hear everyday about families being concerned with issues like; rising gas prices, double digit inflation, labor shortages, and a serious disruption in the supply chain of food and other products. Parents want a return to normalcy and understand the necessity of their children back in school and being taught in person. Law enforcement professionals can always do better but defunding and tarnishing the image and reputation of officers is not the solution. Mandates and unnecessary regulations in recent times have ruined our economy and violated constitutional rights. On top of all of this, the public has lost faith and trust in our electoral process. While we can't change the outcome of previous elections, we can learn from the mistakes made and work hard to ensure fair and honest future elections," stated Sheriff BeGole.

Known for his ability to bring people together, always having an open door policy, and running a county department with a budget that continually does more with less he plans to put his knowledge, experience and record of leadership to work for our community in Lansing.

"My open door policy as sheriff will not change when serving as your next state representative in Lansing. I will continue to reach out to members of our community to listen to their thoughts and ideas regardless of political partisanship or beliefs," shared Sheriff BeGole.

Sheriff Brian BeGole has served in law enforcement for 32 years in Shiawassee County with the last 6 being Sheriff, as he was elected countywide in 2016 and 2020. Brian and his wife Tammy, have their roots in Shiawassee County, raising their children on BeGole family land in rural Antrim Township. He is a member of the Shiawassee Valley FOP Lodge #137 and also serves on the Michigan Sheriffs Association's Executive Board.

The newly drawn 71st State House district by the Independent Citizens Redistricting Commission includes all of Shiawassee county (except for the City of Laingsburg, Sciota and Woodhull Townships), parts of Genesee County (Argentine and Gaines Townships along with portions of Mundy Township and Swartz Creek) and Saginaw County (Brady, Chesaning, and Maple Grove Townships, Village of Oakley and the City of Chesaning. The Republican Primary Election will be held on August 2nd and the General Election on November 8th.


# **Laingsburg Schools Wall of Fame Inductees**

## **CREP Is Now Open** for Enrollment

Landowners with cropland in the Lake Macatawa, Saginaw Bay, River Raisin, and the Western Lake Erie Basin can now enroll in the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP). CREP is part of the USDA CRP program, with additional financial incentives to establish practices that improve water quality and enhance wildlife habitat. Many Shiawassee County residents might remember CREP when it was first introduced in 2008. CREP was suspended six years ago when the allocated dollars for the program were spent, but a new signup was just announced on April 4, 2022.

The goals of the Michigan CREP are to significantly reduce sediment, phosphorus, and nitrogen from entering rivers and streams and sequester carbon. This will be accomplished through conservation planning and implementing the following conservation practices: establishing permanent grasses and legumes, field windbreaks, filter strips, riparian buffers, wetland restorations, and sediment retention control structures.

'We have been looking forward to CREP enrollment opening," stated SCD Conservation Specialist Donna Kanan. "We have always offered free technical conservation planning assistance to Shiawassee County residents. The additional advantages that CREP offers is a huge opportunity for participants to put conservation on the land.'

Landowners will work with the Conservation District office throughout the conservation planning process. Their conservation plan will include technical details needed to successfully establish conservation practices that will protect and improve our natural resources including water quality and wildlife habitat. They will work with the Farm Service Agency to manage their contract including their payments. Participants will receive a one-time signing incentive payment, a one-time practice incentive payment, an annual rental payment, and a cost-share payment of up to 50% of the cost to install the practice. In addition, the State of Michigan will provide an additional cost-share payment of up to 50% of the practice installation and offer payments for the enrollment and maintenance and management of land enrolled in the Michigan CREP.

To be eligible, land must be located within one of the identified eligible watersheds in Michigan. In Shiawassee County, those watersheds include the Shiawassee River and Flint River watersheds. The land must also be cropland or marginal pastureland and meet cropping history criteria.



Lansing- The Tri-County Office on Aging (TCOA) is looking for volunteers to be delivery drivers for the Meals on Wheels (MOW) program. Volunteers deliver nutritious meals straight to the doors of participants during the lunch hour, improving access to food and providing a friendly check-in for vulnerable older adults and persons with disabilities. Volunteers have the opportunity to connect with their fellow community members on a schedule that works for them, with a commitment of as little as one hour per week to one per month.

Meals on Wheels is preparing to safely reopen many of the Monday-Friday routes that were converted to once-weekly routes during the pandemic. As more routes reopen, volunteer needs are increasing. MOW can use dozens of new volunteers. More Information about Meals on Wheels Volunteer Role:

Volunteers pick up a box of food from a site near the beginning of their route and deliver to approximately 10-15 participants. Volunteers drive their own vehicles. Mileage reimbursement is available.

Routes take about one hour to complete. Meals may be picked up anytime between approximately 11:00 AM and 12:30

Some volunteers choose consistent days to deliver (i.e. very Tuesday or every other Wednesday) and others are flexible "on call" volunteers so that Meals on Wheels can contact them about their availability when other volunteers cannot ake their shift.

Deliveries occur throughout Clinton, Eaton, and Ingham counties. Volunteer needs are widespread, but the area of greatest need is currently Lansing.




