#### **Put Recycling on Your** Calendar For May

On April 24 the Greater Laingsburg Recyclers finally got to celebrate the opening of their new recycling facility by showing all the guests the in's and out's of their new operations and sharing their hopes for the future. They were especially pleased to recognize the many donors, large and small, who helped turn this new page on recycling not just for Laingsburg but for the entire area.

One of the most important changes to operations has been the ability to offer recycling four times a month instead of once. This month the Community Recycling Center will be open Saturday, May 14; Tuesday, May 17 (it was also open on the 3rd); and Sat., May 28. Saturday hours are 9 am to 1 pm, Tuesday hours 4 pm to 6 pm. Business owners and institutions that want to save money on waste services and protect the environment can, for an annual \$150 fee, obtain 24/7 access to the facility once they've been shown the ropes.

On another front, co-chair Katie Brewer reached out to the Laingsburg schools and, with her husband Todd, ended up providing a fun orientation to recycling for the 6th and 8th graders and then for the Laingsburg Girl Scouts. The GLR would like to extend an invitation to all of the area's teachers who want their students to learn about recycling with us.

We'd like to remind everyone that the market for recycled materials is constantly in flux, forcing us to change with it. So, for example, we regret to say that we can no longer accept TVs of any kind but will continue to take flat screen monitors for a \$5 fee. We were thrilled to be able to add #5 plastics to our collection but have found that there are always exceptions to the rule, so sometimes we must reject items that seem recyclable but aren't, like plastic flower pots. We gladly accept egg cartons (preferably the dozen size) and share them upon request—just ask. And remember that we accept most metal objects, from old chairs to filing cabinets.

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
















#### **MDARD Announces Public Input for 2023 Rural Development Gund Grants Guidelines**

LANSING -Today, the Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (MDARD) announced a public input opportunity for the Rural Development Fund Grants Program.

MDARD is asking for public input to ensure effective program priorities by emailing your comments to mdagrants@michigan.gov by June 3, 2022.

The grant funds, established by Public Act 411 of 2012, are aimed to promote the sustainability of land-based industries (food and agriculture; forestry; mining, oil and gas production; and tourism). Currently established priorities include infrastructure development, workforce training, business development, and rural capacity building that benefits rural communi-

Eligible counties include those with a population no greater than 70,000 residents or micropolitan statistical areas. Preference was given to projects in Marquette County.

All interested parties may visit www.michigan.gov/mdardgrants for more information on Rural Development Fund grants and to review the 2022 guidelines. Please submit all public comments to mda-grants@michigan.gov until June 3, 2022, at 5 p.m. with the subject line of Rural Development Public Comment. The input received will be considered when developing final grant guidelines for 2023.

#### **Household Hazardous Waste** Collection - May 14th

The Shiawassee County Health Department is conducting a Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Collection Saturday, May 14, 2021, from 8 a.m. – Noon at the HHW at Perry City Hall, 203 W. Polly Street, Perry, MI 48872.

HHW program funding is provided by Shiawassee County Waste Management fund. The goal of the program is to keep HHW out of the county rivers, lakes, streams and ditches. The collection is FREE to all Shiawassee County Residents. Past collections have received 310,178 pounds of hazardous waste, which was safely disposed of or recycled. Most of these items would have ended up flushed down the sewer, into a septic system, buried at the local landfill or dumped in rivers and streams. Accepted materials include anything that is toxic, flammable, corrosive or reactive. We do not accept latex paint. Latex paint can be dried out and safely disposed of with house-

No appointment is necessary for the collection; please bring any household hazardous waste materials you have starting at 8 a.m. The HHW collection is on a first come, first serve





Dear Andy,

Why have all of the Box Elder Bugs suddenly invaded our home? They're in the windows and drapes, crawling in the carpet and all over the house. I asked my husband to cut down the Box Elder trees in our yard last summer. He did not. Hundreds of the bugs are driving me crazy. What can I do?

Invaded in my own home!

Dear Invaded,

You're not alone...there are billions of box elder bugs who spend the winters in the walls of our homes in nearly every state and country. They may be annoying little critters but a great source of food for birds. You can sweep them up with your vacuum without smell or guilt, as they are plentiful and will never be on the endangered list. If you cannot bear to be a part of their demise, collect them in a jar and scatter near your bird feeder. Box elders bugs do not bite or carry diseases. A fact to help you sleep better at night, they gather in large clumps primarily for reproduction and survival; there may be thousands more in your walls, especially on the sunny side of your house.

The Box Elder population gather in swarms in the late fall to find a safe place for winter hibernation within the warm walls of homes. When the weather warms up mid-winter, they are hoping springtime has arrived early, so they leave the warm slumber and end up in windows sun bathing. However, it can be labor intensive to rid them completely because our homes have gaps and cracks for the small bugs' easy access. An insecticide can be sprayed on the exterior areas of the house; usually sprayed in the early spring and again in the fall. Consult your local Hardware Store or pest Control Company for specific instructions and to select the appropriate pesticide for your area; never use a pesticide indoors. A more inexpensive method is ammonia. Warning: Do NOT use indoors. Only small amounts in an vented outside area along the edge of your foundation. Do not use around pets or children. Do not mix with any other chemicals.

I am happy to hear that your husband did not listen to you this time. Do NOT cut down the Box Elder trees. According to the University of Minnesota Extension the Box Elder bug lays her eggs mid-July primarily on, the seed-baring female box elder trees. However, the bug also especially likes the taste of the Maple and Ash tree branches and leaves, too. You will find them laying eggs and clustering in other trees, as well as our homes in the fall. They eventually dissipate into our woods and become food for critters and birds.

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#### CITY OF LAINGSBURG ORDINANCE NO. 01-2022 CONSUMERS ENERGY COMPANY GAS FRANCHISE ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE, granting to CONSUMERS ENERGY COMPANY, its successors and assigns, the right and authority to lay, maintain and commercially operate gas lines and facilities including but not limited to mains, pipes, services and on, under, along, and across public places including but not limited to highways, streets, alleys, bridges, and waterways, and to conduct a local gas business in the CITY OF LAINGSBURG, SHIAWASSEE COUNTY,

MICHIGAN, for a period of thirty years.

THE CITY OF LAINGSBURG ORDAINS:

SECTION I. <u>GRANT and TERM.</u> The CITY OF LAINGSBURG, SHI-AWASSEE COUNTY, MICHIGAN, hereby grants to Consumers Energy Company, its successors and assigns, hereinafter called "Consumers" the right and authority to lay, maintain and commercially operate gas lines and facilities including but not limited to mains, pipes, services and valves on, under, along, and across public places including but not limited to highways, streets, alleys, bridges, and waterways, and to conduct a local gas business in the CITY OF LAINGSBURG, SHIAWASSEE COUNTY, MICHIGAN, for a period of thirty years.

SECTION 2. <u>CONDITIONS</u>. No public place used by Consumers shall be obstructed longer than necessary during construction or repair, and shall be restored to the same order and condition as when work was commenced. All of Consumers' gas lines and related facilities shall be placed as not to unnecessarily interfere with the public's use of public places. Consumers shall have the right to trim or remove trees, if necessary, in be conducting of such business

SECTION 3. <u>HOLD HARMLESS</u>. Consumers shall save the City free and harmless from all loss, costs and expense to which it may be subject by reason of the negligent construction and maintenance of the lines and related facilities hereby authorized. In case any action is commenced against the City on account of the permission herein given, Consumers shall, upon notice, defend the City and its representatives and hold them harmless from all loss, costs and damage arising out of such negligent construction and maintenance.

SECTION 4. <u>EXTENSIONS</u>. Consumers shall construct and extend its gas distributor system within said City and shall furnish gas service to applicants residing therein in accordance with applicable laws, rules and regulations. SECTION 5. <u>FRANCHISE NOT EXCLUSIVE</u>. The rights, power and authority herein granted, are not exclusive.

SECTION 6. RATES and CONDITIONS. Consumers shall be entitled to provide gas service to the inhabitants of the City at the rates and pursuant to the conditions as approved, by the Michigan Public Service Commission. Such rates and conditions shall be subject to review and change upon petition to the Michigan Public Service Commission.

SECTION 7. <u>REVOCATION</u>. The franchise granted by this ordinance is subject to revocation upon sixty (60) days written notice by either party. Upon revocation this ordinance shall be considered repealed and of no effect past. present or future.

SECTION 8. MICHIGAN PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION JURISDIC-TION. Consumers remains subject to the reasonable rules and regulations of the Michigan Public Service Commission applicable to gas service in the City and those rules and regulations preempt any term of any ordinance of the City to the contrary.

SECTION 9. <u>REPEALER</u>. This ordinance, when enacted, shall repeal and supersede the provisions of any previous Consumers' gas franchise ordinance adopted by the City including any amendments.

SECTION 10. <u>EFFECTIVE DATE</u>. This ordinance shall take effect on June 1, 2022, more than 10- days after publication in the local newspaper on May 8,2022.





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
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#### **OE Football Program Pitches In**
