





Mircrogreens Revisited

Many readers may remember several articles during the Great Pandemic when the Weekly Sportsman authored numerous columns about growing microgreens for personal consumption. A lot was written about growing on different mediums and with different types of seeds. Since that time, the Weekly Sportsman has continued efforts to find better methods that increase yield along with being a little cleaner and quicker when grown inside. A lot has been learned about different grow lights and deep water hydroponics but such details may appear at a later date. This week's column will focus on a new grow medium along with some new varieties and cultivars to try.

In the past the Weekly Sportsman has preferred to work with grow mediums other than dirt because let's face it...dirt can be very messy indoors and harbor unwanted indoor pests like insects. Paper towel and grow mats made of substances like coconut coir, Biostrate, and burlap work well when small seeds are planted by sprinkling over the surface. For larger seeds like corn, beans, and peas; the Weekly Sportsman has discovered that using Rockwool 10x20 mats formed of 200 one inch cubes with a hole in each wo9rks the best. Designed to be broken apart and used for hydroponic seedlings, the entire mat works well when used as a very nice planting surface for large seeds. Rockwool, also known as stonewool, is a basalt rock melted at a very high temperature and spun into a string like substance similar in texture to cotton candy. The 10x20 mats work well because the size permits placement in standard bedding trays. The substance itself is incredible as a medium because it balances holding a lot of water and providing necessary aeration needed for growth. Reusable for at least 5-6 times, and sometimes even longer, replacement costs are greatly reduced and mats just require sanitation using hydrogen peroxide and crop rotation.

As for new cultivars the Weekly Sportsman has been working with Adzuki and Mung beans along with buckwheat. The Adzuki bean does not require a blackout period for germination and shoot growth and is ready for harvest in about 14-21 days. Highest in protein this bean tastes like a very sweet green bean and is valued for its leaves to replace lettuce and helps fight diabetes by maintaining normal blood sugar. Mung beans and buckwheat require a few days of blackout and can be harvested in two weeks. Expect a buttery bean flavor and a tangy citrus flavor respectively.

In addition, new varieties have been discovered such as Parsley Pea along with a beet that only produces leaves named Fresh Start. The Parsley Pea is ready in about two weeks and does not get leggy or stringy in height like other varieties of peas and tends to bush out with tendril growth. Perfect for salads! Fresh Start is a beet that can be grown for succulent leaves without wasting energy going to a round bulb shaped root as the plants will only have top growth. Expect a sweet and earthy taste but be prepared as some palates will still make it taste like dirt. If two seeds are placed in each hole then Parsley Pea will run about thirty-five cents a flat in seed costs and Fresh Start will be under twenty cents a flat.

Even readers with two black thumbs can grow fresh and healthy microgreens for salads and garnishing entrees. Feel free to use different seeds when experimenting with microgreens but always stay away from tomatoes, potatoes, eggplants, and okra as their leaves are toxic.

Cook Family Foundation UM Scholalrship

The Cook Family Foundation continues to support the best and brightest students to attend the University of Michigan. From eight high schools in the greater Shiawassee area, 22 students have been awarded scholarships to the University of Michigan.
