

Corn Poaching

Temperatures are slowly dropping, leaves are turning, fresh local cider is available, and soybeans are being harvested; all signs that Fall is here. Around this time field corn starts to dry down and ears go from sticking straight up to hanging downward. As the kernels start to become hard and their moisture content decreases, many rows next to the roadside start to lose yield. Farmers know that this loss can not be blamed solely on wildlife but also by two legged varmints commonly labeled as country poachers or urban foragers.

The Weekly Sportsman does not condone the poaching or foraging of field corn from local farmers. Even at the end of the day, when it is all said and done, with a few ears missing from here and there across a field, the loss probably pales in comparison to an extra few deer that make it through bow and gun seasons. But stealing is stealing. Sure there is probably some excitement for thrill seekers who sneak into a corn field during the dark of night with a feed bag and snatch a few full bags of ear corn. Maybe they are too cheap to buy shelled corn at the gas station for hunting or feeding squirrels and perhaps it's just an annual part of getting their pet horse, ducks, chickens, and goats through the winter.

The Weekly Sportsman does support asking a farmer if they could have or pay for some corn if they went and picked it. Maybe the farmer would appreciate the gesture of asking permission and the offer of compensation so much that he would say have at it and refuse payment. While corn poaching seems simple and as easy as navigating a corn maze that might not be the case for everyone. It wouldn't be a bad idea to practice corn poaching or foraging, with permission of course, to learn the skills so you can be prepared for a survival situation. You may quickly learn that you have corn allergies or how heavy corn can really be when it fills a few feed bags.

Practice doing it in the dark and try really hard to go undetected by passing cars. Don't just pick along the ditch, hop around so losses are less likely to be detected. More importantly, the final objective should be honing the survival skill of turning poached or foraged field corn into cornmeal for human consumption.

The most common corn you will probably find is field corn but don't neglect a dried down sweetcorn patch, popcorn, and even colored ornamental corn. Make sure the kernels are really dry and start removing them from the cob. Place in a little coffee grinder or food processor and turn the kernels into corn flour and then sift by running through a metal wire mesh strainer and tapping the side. If some chunky pieces are left in the strainer, throw the back in the grinder with some new kernels and repeat. A few ears should provide enough flour for a pan of corn muffins or corn bread.

Grease a 9 inch cake pan and combine 1 cup flour, 1 cup flour,²/₃ cup sugar, 3 ½ teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 cup milk, 1/3 cup vegetable oil, 1 large egg. To increase sweetness and moisture add more sugar, eggs, and possibly sweet corn kernels. When ingredients are done being whisked, pour into a cake pan and bake for 25 minutes at 400 degrees. Use the toothpick method to check readiness.

And yes, the day went well, we were very busy and are looking forward to serving folks of our locale.

Sunday started out with me making a run up to the shop because I had left my purse there. Fortunately I found where I had put it and I was so relieved that I failed to see the new table and chairs in the back room. Sometimes I can be overly focused and fail to see the forest because I'm sitting under a tree. The rest of the day was a day of sad and expensive events. I kept hearing one of the cats meowing and I thought that it was the Tiny Terror, it wasn't her. It was little Lightening who was just turning a year old. On the way home someone dumped off two small dogs on Taft Road between Mason and Woodbridge roads. Karen tried to pick them up but they were very wary and wouldn't let her near them. I went over this morning and had no luck at first. I then zipped down the road to Diane and Brent's home and they grabbed a carrier and some dog food to entice the little critters. Yes, we did catch them after they seemed to understand that we would do no harm. The male was a chunky fellow and the female a tiny little thing the size of a chihuahua. Both had collars. It is sad that we seem to live in a throwaway world. May your days be full of interesting events and much kindness. God bless.

State Rep. Graham Filler and the Michigan House today approved a budget supplemental that will help Michigan communities remain competitive in the modern economy and bring new






