





Michigan League of **Conservation Voters**

This is the third installment prior to the 2022 General Elections looking at pro-conservation groups and their rankings or grades given to statewide and legislative candidates. The Weekly Sportsman has selected three well known and respected groups to provide a well rounded view for voters; National Rifle Association (NRA), Michigan Farm Bureau (MFB), and Michigan League of Conservation Voters (MLCV).

The MLCV was formed over twenty years ago and uses education, advocacy, and political action to influence protection of Michigan's natural resources. The primary areas of focus include; clean air, good government, healthy great lakes, parks & public lands, and safe drinking water. While the NRA may be considered right of center, and MFB the center, it is very clear that MLCV is left of center. They claim to be non-partisan but the Weekly Sportsman only knows of one republican legislative candidate to ever receive an endorsement and that was for work done on local parks and trails while the candidate served as mayor. Currently all their endorsements for this election cycle statewide are from one party, unlike the other two organizations, but it is important to provide balance and options when considering the bigger picture when looking at conservation. Sometimes this group acts more like preservationists than conservationists but there is often a thin line between what natural and renewable resources should be used and to what extent. However, mining sand and harvesting timber off public land is pretty clear cut. No pun intended. The following candidates have been endorsed and just like the other groups some local legislative races have no endorsements.


