LEAF Donation Earmarks Five-Figure Donation for Laingsburg Robotics Team

LAINGSBURG — The Laingsburg Robotics program received a generous financial gift recently, with \$10,000 of a \$25,971.93 check presented to the Laingsburg Community Schools. A large portion of the five-figure donation, presented by the Laingsburg Education Advancement Foundation (LEAF), was earmarked for robotics.

"LEAF has supported robotics in Laingsburg long before we had a team (they sponsored Brandon Woodworth's Lego Robotics class when he was teaching in LMS)," explains Robotics adult team leader Clint Hawks. "The funding comes at a critical time for our program as in 2022-23, we were able to reach a milestone level of having robotics in every building in Laingsburg schools. We are the only school in Shiawassee County to currently be doing this."

Laingsburg Robotics is under the wider umbrella of "For Inspiration and Recognition of Science and Technology" (FIRST) — an international organization which operates youth robotics competitions and aims to inspire students in the fields of engineering and technology. The school currently offers different levels of education in the field: Lego League for grades K-3, Explore for grades 4-5, First Tech Challenge for middle school, and the Red Thunder Robotics team at the high school level.

Six core values are built upon in the robotics program: six core values: teamwork, inclusion, impact, fun, discovery and innovation.

Explains coach Hawks, "The money allows us the ability to keep planning program expansion for all levels, pays our entry fees for this year's events (upwards of \$7,000) and cover some of state or world championship costs, as our goal is to qualify."

Another Snow Day? Are they kidding? I just do not know what to do with my kids. I feel guilty leaving them on all these snow days. Seems like they could be in school. Safe and learning. My job and most jobs, parents are gone from 7:15 am when the bus picks them up until 5:30 in the afternoon. It's bad enough to have them home 2 hours after school, before I get there. I leave my work and come home to my other job. Last year I think we had 7 snow days. I already take days off when they are sick. I use up my vacation time and personal days so we only end up with long weekends in the summer. Why are there so many snow days and what can I do with them. I do not want the television to be their babysitter.

Frustrated Mom,

Dear Mom.

You do sound frustrated. I understand there is typically several days moms and dads need to take days off to care for their children. It's only a short time during you working career compared to the time when children can take care of themselves. You need to buck up...your week long vacations will come with time as you give more time to your company.

Might I suggest, first find or create a support group within your school of other moms in the same situation. Take turns on the days off. You take her kids along with your own on your day, and then rotate the days. You didn't say how old your children are, but I am assuming old enough to be left alone or they would be in a daycare or childcare after school program on snow days.

You need a solid plan of action by planning ahead for the "snow" days. If your kids are old enough to left at home, do something special for them. For example, order their favorite pizza to be delivered. Let the oldest be responsible to pay and tip. Give them ground rules for safety: No strangers or neighborhood kids in the house. Give them a list of jobs: Load the dishwasher, fold clothes, vacuum the living room, brush the dog, sweep their floors in their rooms. It's good to leave them with responsibilities. Take time to make them a "to do" Leave your phone or a gizmo to contact you for emergencies. Have an emergency

plan. Know who is home in your neighborhood. only 1 movie and/or 2 hours of television. A day can be wasted fast by watching TV all day. High School students are also out of school and love part-time jobs. Find someone you know and trust and have them just be there with your kids on snow days or even the 2 hours after school.

Back in my day, we loved snow days. Even at 9 years old I can remember jumping for joy and running for my ice skates. I am sure we all remember how much fun it was to spend the day at the local ice rink. The fire department would flood the baseball fields or tennis courts. There would be a fire glowing to dry our wet mittens and warm our bottoms. (Thank you to that person(s), back in the 50's and 60's, who always provided wood for the fires). Sometimes we would run home for lunch and come back for the afternoon. We were outside playing on snow days. Let's get our kids to play again. Send them outside to use their imagination. Make a plan: Sleds and hot cocoa with marshmallows, of course.

You would think we would want to be at school to learn but Snow Days and Saturdays were like holidays. Make it fun for your kids: Buy a board game, a puzzle or a color by number workbook – save just for snow days. Leave special notes and treats for each child for them to wake up to if you cannot be there. It's part of our lifestyle to raise self-sufficient, independent children.

Don't feel guilty. You're doing the best you can. Snow days are a fact of life. It may look ok outside for playing or driving to work but safety on the busses is #1 priority. Even with a heavy bus the ice can be slippery. Be a happy mom. It is what it is...sometimes. Andy.

MDHHS Urges Michigan Residents to Get Screened as Part of Cervical Cancer Awareness Month

LANSING – At the start of the New Year, many people make resolutions and begin routines to improve their health. As January is Cervical Cancer Awareness month, the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) is urging Michiganders to make a resolution to be regularly screened for cancer. By staying current on cervical cancer screening, people could improve their health in 2023, and prevent cervical cancer in the future.

In Michigan, the rates of new cervical cancer cases and deaths due to cervical cancer have remained relatively low but steady since 2011. Approximately 75% of cervical cancer diagnoses and 60% of cervical cancer deaths statewide occur among women ages 30-64. Furthermore, Black non-Hispanic residents experience significantly higher rates of late-stage cervical cancers and cervical cancer deaths than white non-Hispanic residents.

"In its early stages, cervical cancer may not cause any symptoms," said Dr. Bagdasarian, MDHHS chief medical executive. "Routine cervical cancer screening is the most effective way to detect cervical cancer early, when it is most treatable, and the first step is talking with your health care provider."

Screening for cervical cancer is recommended to begin at age 21 and as follows:

Women ages 21 to 29:

Pap Smear every three years.

Women ages 30 to 65: (one of the following options)

Pap Smear every three years OR

A laboratory test for high-risk human papillomavirus infection (HPV) every five years OR A Pap Smear and HPV co-test every five

MDHHS has openings for program-eligible individuals to receive free cancer and health screenings through two of its programs.

The Breast and Cervical Cancer Control Navigation Program (BC3NP), available statewide, provides free breast and cervical cancer screening services to low- income women. This may include follow-up care if a screening abnormality is Although the BC3NP does not pay for cancer treatment, women diagnosed with breast or cervical cancer may be eligible for a special Medicaid program that provides cancer treatment.
