Recycling Paused by Ovid City Council

OVID - The monthly meeting of the Ovid City Council was held Monday, February 13, 2023. The meeting was highlighted by the requests made by the Ovid Police Department.

Monthly action was taken to approve the meeting agenda with the addition of appointment of a spokesperson from the city council to contact the city attorney; the minutes of the January 9, 2023 meeting as amended which included the striking of roll call vote for the approval of the January meeting agenda, and financial reports. Officials approved January 11 - February 14, 2023 expenditures totaling \$264,996.67.

Police Chief Lisa Rousseau reported that the department received a \$5,000 grant toward the purchase of tasers; a new electronic report management system is in process of being installed and officers will be trained. In addition, the new vehicle purchased by the department is an asset.

Chief Rousseau presented a list of equipment requests. First, the purchase six Taser 7s at a cost of \$11,000. The cost will be offset by a rebate of \$150 for old models and with the grant. Next the purchase of four body cameras at a cost of approximately \$16,700. The department is seeking a grant to offset the costs of the body cameras. The in-car cameras are up and running however there are issues with the 2020 cameras. She reported that an additional needs for the police department are many.

The chief also requested that city officials consider contracting with Rossow Group to audit the department, the service fee is \$3,500 noting that the regular cost is \$10,000. This audit will bring the department up to the standards necessary to maintain the department up to current police department standards. A template will be developed to be shared with other small departments utilizing Ovid Police Department as the standard.

Chief Rousseau wrapped up her report by discussing the "swatting" calls at individual schools, focusing on active shooter calls that are not true.

Officials took the following action regarding the six Taser #7 purchase at total of \$5,778 after the grant and allocation for turning in the old equipment. Payment for the equipment was discussed in length. The decision was to pay the \$5,000 up front and the balance to be paid over five years from the police department equipment budget.

The second purchase of four body cameras from Taser Axon at a cost of \$16,700, again where will the funds come from was discussed in length. Noting that a grant is going to be applied for to offset the cost of the equipment. There were numerous additional clarifications discussed. Currently Ovid Police Department does not have body cameras, nor do they have a policy to cover body cameras. The city is hoping for a grant however, if that does not happen, then a five-year payment plan could be entered into. City officials approved the purchase to be paid over a five-year period.

The Rossow Group proposal was addressed. The service would provide an audit of the department, policies, retention, privacy, evidence and interrogation, and policies, industry standards. Funding continues to be a concern, where with this funding come from. After discussion officials took action to approve the service and the money will be found. Time frame 90 days for completion. A long term goal of the department is to have their own building.

It was reported that the Department of Public Works is losing three employees and two positions will be posted. It was noted that one employee is on administrative leave and is under investigation for misconduct.

Under the topic of new business officials were presented a request from the Josie Medina, clerk, requested that a committee be established to review all policies and ordinances. The committee would consist of three members that start with an overview and to then determine if a con-

tracted service is necessary. The members of the committee are: Mary Perrin, Eric Starn and Mallory Olger.

Next. addressed the one bid received for citywide garbage pickup. The bid was received from Granger and that the recycling portion could be put on pause. The recycling fees will increase from \$5,000 per year to \$12,000 per year. The major problem is contamination of the recycling contain-Mayor William Lasher recommended that the garbage conaction to approve the service to City of Ovid residents.

Mary Perrien recommended the appointment of council member to speak on behalf of the entire council, currently it is the mayor and the department heads. This request would add someone to speak on behalf of the council itself. The request was approved and Eric Brown was appointment by the council as the liaison to the city attorney.

Officials reviewed the updates to the 9.8-million-dollar project to update the drinking water stem in the City of Ovid. Currently a grant is in progress with the city match being 25% of the total project. On a related topic the lagoon update is in progress, as well.

Officials took action to approve committee recommendations. The police department will change to an 80 hour pay period and the police chief and officers will receive a 4% pay increase.

Officials reviewed and approved the revised city policy regarding credit card purchases. The policy did fall short of stating the consequences for abusing the policy. Finally, officials approved the revised rules and fees for the cemetery. Copies of the policies are available at the ty of Ovid business office.

Eric Starn, councilman, voiced the need for additional members from the community for the Planning Commission. Action was taken to accept the resignations of Noah Boise and Lyle Perrien from the Planning Commission.

Dr. Mark Holley, assessor, reported that the Board of Review will be held in March 2023. All property assessments increased by 5%, the increase is established by the federal government. The schedule is as follows: Tuesday March 7, organizational 10:30 am. Public meetings March 13, 3-9pm; and March 16 9 am-3pm. All equalizations numbers for the city passed. This year is an audit year, Holley does not anticipate any problems.

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Elsie Village Council Proceedings

ELSIE – The regular meeting of the Elsie Village Council was held Tuesday, February 14, 2023. Prior to the regular meeting the first public hearing regarding the Safety Act, the Motor Carrier Safety Act with a focus on commercial vehicles. Noting that a second public hearing will be held prior to the regular meeting, followed by council action. The earliest the change would go into effect is April 1, 2023.

Officials approved the letter of resignation submitted by Cindy Brzak, village treasurer, effective immediately. The letter was accepted with regrets. The resignation was prompted by a new employment opportunity.

Chief Destinee Bryce presented the January police department highlights. Chief noted the collaboration between departments in Clinton County to assist Ingham County at Michigan State University was phenomenal. There was an incident at EE Knight in January that was handled by the Elsie Police Department appropriately and Ovid-Elsie Area Schools is solid maintaining student and community safety. As a result, there is a healthy police presence at the school that is developing a good relationship with the students and staff. 112 complaints were addressed in January. Also, the department is in the process of establishing a drop box for unneeded and expired medications. Finally, the cat issue in the village is being addressed.

Shane Grinnell, addressed the Department of Public Works report. He reported that samples have been pulled on the test wells and the department is waiting for the results. Also, both dump trucks are back on the road.

Shane Grinnell, village manager, reported on the status of the mower for Riverside Cemetery. The distributor offered an alternative for the Huscavarna mower at a \$1,000 savings. Officials approved the purchase. The Frontier phone system is no longer supported by the provider. Last year the village paid \$10,000 through Frontier. A quote was received from Charter for \$1,800 per year for phone service. The change saves the Village \$8,000 and appears to be better. Grinnell noted that this

Grinnell further reported that Matt Spencer resigned from the Department of Public Works and the position has been filled by Keagan Ormes. The personnel committee noted that Chris Ormes, Department of Works, was not part of the hiring

Next, a hot topic is the former Elsie High School which is up for tax sale, again, taxes owed are \$4,700. If sold grants for raising the building are not available. However, if the property is owned by the Village there could be grants available to raise it. The down side is the liability risk. The topic was informational. "It is a horrible decision to buy it, however it is the best horrible decision we could make. And gives the village control," commented Todd Carroll, trustee. There will be more information to come, for example the ramifications reviewed and officials will error with caution.

Grinnell, presented the first draft of the 2023-2024 budget. The area of discussion the water rates, noting that the village charges 50% less than the state average for a community this size. The committee recommendation is to make 3% increase with the minimum use \$69.75 for water/sewer.

Monthly action was taken to approve the meeting agenda with the addition of a letter of resignation, the minutes of the January 10, 2023 meeting, and the financial reports. Expenditures totaling \$86,261.72 were also approved.



Some tax returns are outside the scope of the Tax-Aide Program. If you have rental property, farmland, run a small business, receive a Schedule K-1, or have multiple transactions on an investment account, Tax-Aide may not be able to assist you with filing your tax return. For those tax situations, it is best to contact an alternative tax service.

Rep. Filler Votes to Repeal Michigan's Pension Tax

State Rep. Graham Filler on Thursday voted for a measure that will cut taxes for Michigan retirees.

Filler, of Clinton County, said providing tax relief for seniors is a priority.

"Many Michigan seniors worked their entire lives with the promise of a tax-free pension, only to have the tables turned on them by the state in 2011," Filler said. "I'm keeping my promise to eliminate that pension tax and reduce taxes for retirees across our state. These cuts will give our seniors some breathing room in their budgets as costs for groceries, gas, and essential medications continue to rise.

The plan approved by the House this week, House Bill 4001, will eliminate the pension tax and cut taxes for seniors with other forms of retirement income.

The measure now advances to the Senate for further consideration. Filler said he will continue working to make the legislation even better by pushing for faster and more expansive relief for all seniors.
