Elsie Village Council Proceedings

ELSIE – The last meeting of 2023 of the Elsie Village Council was held Tuesday, December 12. Prior to the meeting a public hearing was held regarding Chapter 36 Article 4, ORV's on village streets. If passed by officials ORVs will be permitted on village street and would be effective January 1, 2024. Noting that the ordinance aligns with the recently passed Clinton County

Monthly action was taken to approve the meeting agenda, the minutes of the November 14, 2023 regular meeting, and the monthly financial statements. Officials approved expenditures totaling \$39,536.51 which reflects current payroll and invoices.

Officials took formal action to approve Ordinance 35 Article 4 regarding ORVs on Village streets. It is noted that the vehicles cannot exceed 25mph and must have headlights and tail lights. Effective January 1, 2024.

Tiffany Frink, village clerk, presented the 2024 Village Council Calendar for annual approval. Regular meetings will be held the second Tuesday of each month. Noting that if an election affects the site the Elsie Public Library will be the alternate meeting site.

Shane Grinnell, village manager, presented his monthly report. It began with an update about the former Elsie High School development project, the total cost approximately 3 million dollars. The asbestos report came back and there is asbestos which was not a surprise. The application was submitted December 11, 2023 for grant funding, \$390,000 for asbestos mitigation. In the spring the property will be deeded to the developer, Ken Harris, noting there are grant opportunities for the Village maintaining ownership at this time.

The Elsie business owners and managers meeting was held to reorganize a business group. It was an opportunity to work on the vision for the downtown area and growth for the businesses. The group would like to meet every six months and keep the momentum going. MEDC representatives were present to inform the public that there are funding opportunities available to revitalize communities and businesses.

Christ Ormes, Department of Public Works, updated officials on the department's activities. A recommendation for updates on the wells was presented to be considered in the 2024 budget. The DPW is currently waiting for a panel for the system that should be delivered soon. An update of the street sign replacements was discussed briefly. Six street lights are being considered for the backside of the Elsie Village Park with an estimated cost of \$5,600 the projected install is after April 15, 2024. Lights will also be installed in the pavilions at the park.

Stay Safe on the Roads During Winter Holidays

Impaired-driving enforcement campaign encourages sober driving

Before and during the Christmas and New Year's holidays, law enforcement officials throughout Michigan are participating in the "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" campaign. To protect lives, there will be increased patrols on roads from December 15, 2023, to January 1, 2024, with zero tolerance for those who drive impaired.

Throughout 2022 in Michigan, there were 9,331 alcohol-involved crashes with 322 fatalities, and 2,452 drug-involved crashes with 249 fatalities statewide, according to the University of Michigan Transportation Research Institute.

That is why, over the 2023 winter holidays, the Michigan State Police, county sheriff offices and municipal police agencies across Michigan are encouraging motorists to celebrate safely and make smart driving decisions. During the nearly three-week period, there will be increased enforcement and messaging about the dangers of driving impaired.

"Driving impaired is deadly and illegal. Getting behind the wheel of a vehicle after you've

"Driving impaired is deadly and illegal. Getting behind the wheel of a vehicle after you've been drinking or using drugs endangers you, your passengers and everyone else on the road," said Katie Bower, Director of the Michigan Office of Highway Safety Planning (OHSP). "The aim of the enforcement campaign is to drastically reduce deaths and serious injuries caused by impaired driving.

"We want all Michiganders to have a great time with friends and family over the holidays, but to keep everyone safe, we are also urging people to be responsible, make smart choices and plan for a sober ride home."

From 2018 to 2022, during the Christmas and New Year's holidays, 66 people were killed in traffic crashes in Michigan, including 17 people who died in alcohol-involved crashes.

Officers will be on the lookout for motorists under the influence of drugs and/or alcohol throughout the "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" enforcement period. In Michigan, it is illegal to drive with a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) of .08 or higher, although motorists can be arrested at any BAC level if an officer thinks they are impaired.

To increase awareness and encourage safe and sober driving, the OHSP is funding a statewide media campaign about the dangers of impaired driving. Also, December has been recognized as National Impaired Driving Prevention Month to remember those who lost their lives due to impaired driving and remind people that helping prevent impaired-driving deaths and injuries is every driver's responsibility.

The "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" campaign is supported with federal traffic safety funds provided by the United States Department of Transportation and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration and coordinated by the OHSP.

Editorial

Reflecting on my work at the State Capitol in 2023

As we bid farewell to 2023, I would like to take a moment to reflect on the strides made in the Legislature and the work I am doing to address the pressing needs of the people I serve. Throughout the year, I championed bills aimed at empowering survivors, improving access to health care, and protecting the vulnerable. I also spoke out against several ill-conceived ideas that are bad for Michigan.



Here's a comprehensive look at the year's highlights and ongoing efforts:

Legislative triumphs: Bills signed into law

I took the lead on three measures that were signed into law in 2023:

Public Act 49 of 2023 (House Bill 4123): One of my proudest moments this year was the signing of Public Act 49, a critical component of the bipartisan plan to support survivors of sexual assault. In response to the shortcomings exposed by the Larry Nassar investigation, this bill addresses the misuse of professional authority to silence victims, ensuring justice is served.

PA 177 of 2023 (HB 4422): Contributing to a broader plan aimed at bolstering victims' rights, Public Act 177 broadens the scope of the Crime Victims' Rights Act. This legislation empowers crime victims with enhanced rights, allowing them a stronger voice in the criminal justice process, from consulting with prosecutors to providing impact statements at sentencing

PA 99 of 2023 (HB 4496): In the realm of healthcare, I championed legislation eliminating burdensome mandates for lower-income enrollees of the Healthy Michigan Plan. These changes not only improve access to healthcare but also streamline administration, saving taxpayer dollars.

Driving change: Legislation in the works

I introduced several other measures, still making their way through the process, that hold the promise of positively impacting our communities:

Protecting Vulnerable Adults (HBs 4909-4912, 5047): Through a bipartisan effort, I am working to enhance protections within the guardianship and conservatorship system. These bills, approved by the House, await Senate consideration, aiming to safeguard Michigan seniors and vulnerable adults from exploitation.

Combatting the Opioid Epidemic (HBs 5128-5130): Introduced in October, this bipartisan initiative seeks to impose stricter penalties for the distribution of deadly drugs like heroin and fentanyl, striking a balance between public safety and justice.

Allowing alcohol at university sporting events (HBs 4328): I proposed a bill to permit Michigan universities to sell alcohol at specific on-campus sports gatherings. Although my bill wasn't enacted, a similar one signed by the governor in July now enables Michigan's public universities to seek permits for selling alcohol at athletic events, which discourages binge drinking and has led to a decrease in alcohol-related incidents inside stadiums in other states.

Standing firm: Advocating for your best interests

In the face of policies that could negatively impact our communities, I stood strong against:

Extreme energy mandates: Advocating for reliable power sources, I opposed legislation that is expected to lead to increased electricity costs and additional grid reliability problems

Stripping local control: Opposing HBs 5120-5121, I fought against laws that force large-scale energy projects on local communities that reject them.

Partisan court-packing: Speaking out against a partisan plan to create a new Court of Appeals district, I emphasized the importance of bipartisan, data-driven efforts to ensure access to justice and successfully stalled the controversial bill.

Dangerous criminal justice reforms: Opposing bills that risk public safety, I voiced concerns about measures that could

release dangerous criminals early, sending them back into our communities and retraumatizing victims of crime.

Road brine restrictions: Pushing back against DEGLE's proposed restrictions on road commissions, I advocated for the responsible use of mineral brine on gravel roads to maintain safety and infrastructure.

Higher taxes: Voting against bills that aimed to avoid an income tax cut, I successfully fought for financial relief for working families, seniors, and small businesses.

Looking forward: Shaping Michigan's energy future

Michigan's energy profile is undergoing dramatic changes, as our state seeks affordable and clean energy sources while facing major questions about grid reliability. I believe Michigan must examine nuclear energy as an important piece of our energy future, and I am proud to co-chair a new bipartisan and bicameral caucus in the Michigan Legislature focused on issues related to nuclear energy.

Chilled Pear Soup

This last Thursday evening, the Weekly Sportsman was very fortunate to attend a Savory Soups Culinary Demonstration at the Corunna Branch Library. The presenters were three students from Owosso High School's Culinary Arts program and the Weekly Sportsman would like to share a Chilled Pear Soup recipe from that evening. It would be an excellent choice for a soup or dessert course served during your Christmas family dinner.

Ingredients: 3 pears, 2 tbsp sugar, ½ tsp pure vanilla, ¼ cup heavy whipping cream, dash of cinnamon, dash of nutmeg, and a drop of cranberry sauce.

- 1. Slice pears in half. Peel and deseed.
- 2. Add the sugar and vanilla to a large pot of boiling water
- 3. Poach pears for 15 minutes in the large pot
- 4. Remove pears and place in blender
- 5. Add the nutmeg, whipping cream, and cinnamon and then puree until smooth
 - 6. Place in refrigerator to chill or serve warm


Holly outlasts Marauder Swimmers, 88-84 in non-league action






