L&J Turkey Farm in Ovid

There is a Pasture to Plate Turkey Farm located in rural Ovid. Founder and CEO, Paul Williams started his layer farm in his backyard over 30 years ago. In honor of his late brother, Leonard and sister-in-law, June, he named his business L&J Turkey Farm. The couple were his best friends and biggest supporters. "The two of them always had an open door, a helping hand and hearts full of love they shared with everyone," explained Paul.

Paul's passion for the poultry industry has spread to his children, their spouses and children. Today, they have come full circle and care for a farm of their own Ovid,located at 1379 N. ters, Aurora and Lilith. Vincent Road, formerly


On Monday, March 11th, the farm received 1,000 turkey chicks from a hatchery in Canada. The tiny, fuzzy chicks were placed in a climate controlled barn with food, a vegetarian diet consisting of high quality, non-gmo corn and soy bean meal containing minerals and nutrients and water. Paul's, daughter and her husband, Sylvia & Drake Campos, along with their two little girls, help with the overseeing of the little chicks, checking them every two hours, to make sure all is well from hatching and the long trip from Canada. "Once the chicks arrive, the chores at the farm greatly increase, it's all hands on deck," explained Sylvia.

The poult hens are kept in a nice, warm portion of the barn for two to three weeks. Their area to roam is expanded inside the barn until they are released into a prepared forage pasture once they are about 5-6 weeks old. At approximately 13-15 weeks after hatching, the end of May, this

batch will be ready for butchering, which is done onsite.

The pasture to plate turkeys that are raised on the farm offer NON GMO products for sale year round, including, Whole Turkeys, Ground Turkey, Smoked Turkey Breasts, Smoked Half Turkeys, Bacon, Breakfast Sausage and several flavors of Brats. L&J also sell their products at Horrock's, Phillips Orchard and Food For

Elsie Village Council

ELSIE - The regular meeting of the Elsie Village Council was held Tuesday, March 10,

2024. The highlight of the evening was Dr. Brook Wooley, chair of the Elsie Dairy Festival, reported that the festival will be held July 11,12,13, avoiding the Fourth of July weekend. Further updates were given. Vendors will be moved to one space near Hero's Park. 3-on-3 basketball will be returning and will be held at Ovid-Elsie High School; a corn-hole tournament will also be part of the festival. There will be an improved children's day and parade. There are new members added to the Dairy Festival committee with exciting ideas. There will be a carnival with a few changes, there will be a special needs children's event as well.

Officials took formal action to approve the 2024-2025 Budget. A notable change is the water bill will increase from \$70 to \$75 dollars per month for minimal use, there was no change to the trash service. After brief discussion the budget was approved and will take

Elsie Police Chief Bryce presented the monthly report. The department conducted 3 traffic stops, and five citations. In addition, activities for the month of February included suspicious situations, larcenies, agency assists, and missing person. Door hangers were left at several locations throughout the village regarding multiple blight issues and citations will be issued to those who do not comply.

Shane Grinnell, village manager, presented the monthly report. The Village is on track and working with Consumers Energy on the light installation at the village park, at an approximate cost of \$8,000, the deed for the park was found and verified with the Clinton County Register of Deeds. The dangerous structure complaint is still in progress, 101 E Main Street. The Village is working with Clinton County Building officials and the property owner are working towards a resolution.

Ken Harris, the developer working on the former Elsie Junior High building, was not awarded the first round of grants. However, he is moving forward with the project and the deed for the property will be transferred to Mr. Harris soon.

On a related topic, Clinton County Catalyst may have a business owner interested in a downtown store front. They are also working with BNM Trailer sales on an expansion proj-

Grinnell reported that he met with the LEAP representative and found that there is a Small-Town Grant Program with a focus on the downtown areas. The available funding is a minimum of \$10,000 and a maximum of \$25,000. Officials were asked to consider possible downtown improvements to include in the grant.

In addition, asphalt companies have been contacted regarding the work in Elsie this summer. West Main Street from main break, in front of 402 E. Main Street apartment's parking lot from 202 N Park Street, W. Oak to N Knowlton St. from amin break Pine /Str. Between 1st and 2nd Street (repave the entire block).

Grinnell further reported that he had met with Morton Contracting regarding developing a master plan for Hero Park. The first action will be the placing memorial blocks by Memorial Day 2024. The final plan will include renderings of a "future look" at the park that may include lighting and shrubs.

Grinnell attended the Michigan Association of Code Enforcement Officers; it was very beneficial and provided recommendations for streamlining some of the codes and violations. An Ordinance Committee meeting will be set to discuss possible changes.

Grinnell recently attended Motor Carrier training where he made contact with a community that had purchased a set of scales and decided they did not have a use for them. The Village of Elsie purchased the scales for \$5,000, which was a considerable savings. It should be noted that the cost of scales is usually between \$12,000 to \$14,000.

Next, officials received a proposal from State Bank for Village finances. The Village has had a good relationship with Journey Credit Union however, a larger institution can provide more and expanded services. State Bank is very knowledgeable with BS&A software. The closest branch is Chesaning. Discussion followed. Officials took action to move village funds to State Bank, approved.

New panels for water/sewer are installed and working. Pump one is tripping the breaker and pump two has a leaking seal, both are in service and water service has not been interrupted. Repairs are underway.

Monthly action was taken to approve the meeting agenda with the addition of special reports Dairy Festival, and 2024-2025 budget; and the minutes of the February 13, 2024 regular meeting were approved. Next officials reviewed the financial reports and passed expenditures totaling 97,926.49.

Memorial contributions in Larry's name are encouraged to be made to the Ovid-Middlebury Fire Dept where he served as a volunteer firefighter.





1. It is perfect. As God's creation, the gospel is therefore perfect.

2. It will never fail. Since the gospel is perfect, this means that it will never fail. When you believe in the gospel, God will forgive you of your sins and bring you into a personal relationship with Himself. Always. 100% of the time.

In the Psalms it says, "...you, Lord, have never forsaken those who seek you....Though my father and mother forsake me, the Lord will receive me.... Turn to me and have mercy on me, as you always do to those who love your name."

- Psalm 9:10b, 27:10, 119:132

3. It cannot be improved on. Since the gospel comes from God and so is perfect and will never fail, this also means that it cannot be improved on.

Hence Paul's words in Galatians- "If anybody is preaching to you a gospel other than what you accepted, let them be under God's curse!

Galatians 1:9

People try to improve on the gospel all the time. They may not see it as such, it depends on the person. But through the years there have been many "improvements" made to the gospel, which of course, makes it to be no gospel at all but a false gospel that cannot bring anyone into a relationship with God.

Those "improvements" can take the form of baptism, church membership, doing more good works than your bad, the combination of going to church regularly and not smoking or drinking, and so on.

But God's gospel needs no improvement. No additions are necessary and in fact, they actually destroy the one true gospel. Faith alone is God's gospel. Faith that Jesus is fully human and fully God. That He died on the cross and rose bodily from the dead as the full payment for all of your sins.





West Virginia Rifle

About a month ago, the Weekly Sportsman found himself in Morgantown watching a co-ed collegiate rifle match at West Virginia University before catching a plane ride home. Not knowing what to really expect prior to watching the WVU Mountaineers take on the Kentucky Wildcats, the Weekly Sportsman did some background research. The Weekly Sportsman has heard over the years that WV Rifle, that is what locals call it, is a pretty top notch program and if you are aspiring to be an Olympian or a National Champion then this is where you go to college after high school.

First let's talk about the sport itself; standing position firing 60 shots fired with .177 air rifles and lead pellets at 10 meters and also 60 shots fired with a small bore rifle with .22 LR ammo at 50 feet. There are both individual and team winners with air rifle and small bore rifle along with aggregate champions. Both air rifles and small bore rifles used are usually manufactured by Walther, Anschutz, and Feinwerkbau. The price range of these precision lead throwing instruments is around \$8,000 but require an additional \$2,000 in accessories. From ear protection and glasses to shoes there is an entire outfit that is designed to hold the shooter steady not to mention making the shooter extremely sweaty. Just like regular firearms the barrels on these shootin' irons can be finicky but most shooters use Lapua for .22LR and RWS for pellets.

The match the Weekly Sportsman attended had twenty shooting stations and was positioned inside an indoor track at a field house. The team has a smaller range for practice and the Colosseum next door can be used for very large matches like the NCAA Championships.

Country music was playing on a loudspeaker and some bleachers were set up for those wanting to watch and attendance was very minimal that Saturday morning as most spectators appeared to be parents. The interaction between coaches and athletes and spectators was very interesting. There was no velling or making excuses. The score is the score. A product of -4 hours shooting per day.

Now for the program... What makes WV Rifle the top in the nation? Last weekend they were runner up to a National Title which means they have 19 titles and 11 second place fin-

That means on average every year there is a 67% chance they will be either first or second in the country. They also increased individual championships this last weekend bringing that total to 30. Not to mention that they have produced over 30 Olympians. What is the winning formula? Is it coaching? Their head coach Jon Hammond is an Olympian himself and competed on the WV Rifle when earning his Master's Degree. Îs it recruitment? All WV Rifle shooters are from out of state including Natalie Perrin from Coopersville, Michigan. Is it the culture and pride of the Mountaineer spirit? Whatever it is, it continues



Did You Know?

Agricultural technology, often referred to as "AgTech," is playing an increasingly bigger role on modern farms, and that role is evident when examining AgTech startups' growing access to venture capital. Data from PitchBook and the National Venture Capital Association's PitchBook-NVCA Venture Monitor, a quarterly report on venture capital activity in the entrepreneurial ecosystem, indicates that AgTech startups

received \$6.1 billion in VC investments in 2020. That reflects a nearly 60 percent increase in investment over 2019. Weaknesses in the agricultural and food supply chain revealed during the pandemic undoubtedly drove some of that investment. Widespread recognition of a need for improvements within the agricultural sector so it can meet the demands of a global population that the United Nations estimates will increase by two billion people by 2050 also likely contributed to the considerable rise in VC investment in AgTech start-

This grant aims to encourage small- to medium-sized dairy farmers, entrepreneurs, and processors in the Midwest to pursue projects such as dairy farm diversification, on-farm processing, value-added product creation, and efforts to market dairy products for export.

"Michigan's dairy industry provides nutritious foods produced and processed locally while making a significant economic impact across our state," said MDARD Director Tim Boring. "The DBIA program will help local businesses within the dairy industry to advance while increasing sustainable practices."

Since the creation of the 2018 U.S. Farm Bill, the DBIA has administered over \$13 million in funding to 129 dairy farms and businesses within the Midwest service area. Reimbursement grants of up to \$100,000 each will be awarded to different dairy businesses after a competitive review process.

During previous rounds of funding, six Michigan companies received \$2.4 million in grants and recently three more Michigan companies were awarded funding including Protein Pints in Grand Rapids, Cream Cup Dairy in Bear Lake, and Semifreddo, LLC in Hart. Previous award recipients can be found here.

Applications for the grant will be accepted until April 3, 2024. Award announcements will be made in late May 2024.

MDARD Provides Funding to MSU Extension

LANSING – The Michigan Department of Agriculture and Rural Development (MDARD) is proud to further its partnership with Michigan State University (MSU) Extension by helping to accelerate the progress being made through the Emergency Response to Accidents Involving Livestock (ERAIL) Program. Over the next three years, through a grant of over \$460,000, MDARD is funding twenty-five ERAIL training sessions, eight new ERAIL trailers, and the purchase of equipment to outfit those trailers—all with the goal of helping local communities better respond to incidents involving livestock.

Every year, millions of animals are on the moo-ve. Over 200,000 trucks transport livestock to Michigan from other states and Canada as well as move animals within the state. Unfortunately, there will likely be an accident involving one of these vehicles at some point in time, and those responding to the incident cannot solely rely on kind-hearted cowboys who are willing to lend a helping hand—or lasso. Responders need to be equipped with the appropriate tools and training to best evaluate the situation, coordinate solutions, and handle the affected animals.

mals.
"When livestock are part of an accident, the situation becomes much more complex," said Brad Deacon, MDARD Emergency Management Coordinator. "This is an important investment for our first responders and the Michigan livestock industry."

The ERAIL Program is a comprehensive training and response program spearheaded by MSU Extension in partnership with MDARD and with additional support from Michigan Pork Producers Association, United Dairy Industry of Michigan, Michigan Commercial Beekeepers Association, and Michigan Beekeepers Association. Through a multi-layered approach including trainings with hands-on learning opportunities, the establishment of a fleet of specialized emergency response trailers, and individual consultations, the program serves to educate and prepare first responders to assist in any emergency involving livestock.

"To best protect animal health and welfare, local responders need the experience and equipment to properly handle the situation and not create further safety risks to the animals, staff, or general public," said State Veterinarian Nora Wineland, DVM, MS, DACVPM. "The trailers and training provided through the ERAIL Program helps build a foundation for preparedness, strengthening an area's capacity for an effective response."

The program trains responders in critical aspects of farm animal behavior and the characteristics of livestock trucks as well as promotes the acquisition of specialized response trailers stocked with portable gates, handling equipment for various types of animals, safety equipment, and other tools to help with livestock in an accident.

and other tools to help with livestock in an accident.

"So far, MSU Extension professionals have taught more than 700 first responders throughout Michigan how to react after a traffic crash that involves animals," said Quentin Tyler, director of MSU Extension. "Proper animal handling—whether it's two horses or 500 pigs—is imperative for keeping both animals and people safe on the roads."

To date, the ERAIL program has placed three fully equipped response trailers in Branch, Jackson, and Otsego counties, with more to come as program continues. In 2023, the current trailers were deployed twice to help manage incidents.


