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# Laingsburg Robotics Team Headed to World Championship

Red Thunder Robotics, Laingsburg High School's FIRST Robotics Competition (FRC) team, has qualified for FRC World Championship for the first time in its seven-year history. At the State Championship, the team finished 12th in their division. The captain of the fourth alliance selected Red Thunder as a member of their team for playoff matches. The alliance of Nerd Spark #9312 (Innovate Albion), The Gearheads #1189 (Grosse Pointe Public Schools), and Red Thunder Robotics #7166 fought hard in the playoffs but fell short of reaching the division championship match. Red Thunder Robotics finished their season ranked 87th out of 513 teams. But it wasn't match play that secured their first trip in team history to the World Championship, it was earning the State Impact Award – the most prestigious level of recognition at the FIRST robotics competition in Michigan.

"FIRST Robotics is different from any other varsity sport in that to win, teams must collaborate with one another. They must share the best attributes of their robot with other teams and strategize how to apply the best combination of talents to the challenge," says mentor Brad Kramer. "There is no other sport in which teams will get together in advance of a competition and openly share their designs, software, and game strategy. Yet, in this process, relationships are built, networks are established, and everyone gets better."

Not only was this team of 24 students competing on the game field with their robot, but they also were competing for one of five State Championship Impact Awards, having won the district title at their first event (Kettering University District Event #1). This award honors the teams that best represent a model for other teams to emulate and best embodies the mission of FIRST. "These students are becoming the leaders of the future," says head mentor, Melissa Kramer. "Not only do they spend 20-plus hours a week for 13 weeks working to build, program, debug, and drive their robot, but they also give back to their community by serving dinners alongside our Laingsburg Lions Club, reading STEM books to kindergarten classes, partnering with our Girl Scout troops to inspire and empower young women, and in their words, 'Be good people.' This team has logged 1,500 volunteer hours in the past year, with several students running their own FIRST robotics teams at the younger grades."

Within the last eight months, this program has flourished in Laingsburg, resulting in the creation of 19 teams K-12, a staggering 1,050% growth rate. Approximately 10% of the greater Laingsburg youth were involved in a Wolfpack Robotics team in the 2023-24 school year.

Red Thunder is not stopping with growing this extracurricular within its own community. They are actively supporting Bath Elementary STEM teacher Tracy Grennell, who will begin a robotics program for 2nd through 5th graders in the fall of 2024. Additionally, when the team learned that another local FRC team lost its head mentor in the middle of its build season, they immediately decided to help Ovid-Elsie's Marauderbots finish a robot which would be ready for their first event, while working to improve their own robot design and debug software.

Wolfpack Robotics, Laingsburg's K-12 robotics program, includes students, mentors, coaches, families, and sponsors. They focus on more than just robotics competition; they focus on developing creative problem-solving skills, leadership, communication, community service, and most importantly a sense of belonging and self-confidence.

In addition to the team's success, sophomore Sophia H. was selected by judges as a Dean's List finalist. The students who earn FIRST Dean's List Awards are exemplary role models for their teams and communities. They spread the importance of STEM education as well as the Core Values and mission of FIRST while also having achieved personal technical expertise. Sophia will advance to the World Championship with 13 other representatives from Michigan and several hundred across the globe to compete for one of ten FIRST Dean's List Winner awards.

### **Elsie Village Council Proceedings**

ELSIE – The regular meeting of the Elsie Village Council was held Tuesday, April 9, 2024. Officials addressed a number of issues. The Elsie Police Department is focusing on school safety and having a presence at E.E. Knight Elementary School.

The Elsie Police Department is focusing on "School Safety" and policing. March 15th the Elsie Police Department attended the annual countywide school safety meeting where the annual school safety information policy agreement was signed and documented. The department will continue to train all school officials on AVI due to a commitment to school safety and Clinton County. In addition, on March 18, 2024 the Department attended the annual career day at EE Knight Elementary. The 5th graders were able to participate in Motor Carrier activities. The students were able to utilize their math skills and learned the proper formulas on how to weigh a motor vehicle. The Elsie DPW participated in the event.

In other actions the Elsie Police Department conducted five traffic stops resulting in two citations, and forty calls for service. Police activity for the month of March included medicals, suspicious situations, trespassing and civil disputes.

Shane Grinnell, village manager, updated officials on the transition to State Bank. Training will take place prior to the transfer of funds. Code enforcement, still working on the issue at 101 E Main, the building has been sold and the public will see improvements over the next few months. Ken Harris will be in the Village soon to begin the Elsie Junior High School project. Asbestos abatement will begin soon.

Morton Contracting will be installing the memorial bricks at Hero Park, the project will be completed prior to Memorial Day. Three more statues will be installed soon, WWI, and Navy. Officials acknowledged James Hyland for his continued support of this project.

Additional ongoing activities within the Village include the semi-truck scales have been certified, and stamped. Tree removal will soon begin in the downtown area. Benches will replace the trees, red benches that match the current picnic tables.

The proposed sewer processing center proposal is moving forward. Investors will meet with the Village manager April 10, 2024 to do a site visit. Additional information will be available in the near future. There is the possibility the center will be operational the end of the summer of 2024

Paving bids were addressed. Grinnell noted that it is getting harder to get bids for small municipalities. In addition, the Village will also be working with the Clinton County Road Commission on a number of jobs. Three quotes were received and after reviewing the quotes officials opted for Smith's Paving at a cost of \$57,270. The areas include four areas where there were main breaks and Pine Street. Sidewalk quotes will be addressed later.

Riverside Cemetery clean-up was slated for Saturday, April 13, 2024, 9 am.

Chris Ornes, Department of Public Works, is in the process of completing his first discharge, all is going well. The lift station west of the village had issues so a new 7.5 hp pump was purchased, the second may need to be rebuilt or replaced soon. It was recommended that a spare be available onsite. On the average the pumps have been lasting 2.5 years.

Next, the mowers were brought up to the workshop to be prepared for the mowing season. The John Deere is leaking oil, and the tires are not in good repair. It will not hold up for commercial use. It was recommended to replace the mower; the mower is in the 2024-25 budget.

Jason Freeman, presented the Elsie Fire Association insurance proposal for \$18,334. This would be a \$250 deductible; the current deductible is simply too high. The previous deductible was \$5,000. Intense discussion followed. One vote in opposition, Sam Frink.

Val Vail-Shirey, County Commissioner, reported that the commissioners took action to pass the Solar Ordinance, wind will be addressed at the April 23, meeting. The Clinton County Fair Grounds are getting some needed updates, and the prosecutor's office is getting a remodel. Labor issues are being addressed positively with the Sheriff's Department and 9-1-1 dispatch. Millages up this year include the Clinton County Transit and 9-1-1.

Monthly action was taken to approve the meeting agenda with the addition of Elsie Area Fire Department liability insurance proposal and cemetery clean-up, the minutes of the March 12, 2024 minutes, and the monthly financial reports. Officials approved expenditures totaling \$97,161.93.

### Response to Hubbard Letter to the Editor

Letter to the Editor:

Clinton County resident Theresa Hubbard has a biased opinion when it comes to renewable energy in the state of Michigan. Perhaps she has a solar, wind lease or is a relative of one that does. Or, her opinion is based on her affiliation with the Clinton County Democratic party. For her to say farmers do not have rights when it comes to ordinances being placed by local governments on the regulations of zoning for large scale utility renewable energy projects, is incorrect. Ordinances are created to secure proper placement for all types of zoning. They do not prohibit these projects, as suggested by Hubbard.

In response to her recent Letter to the Editor in the Meridian Weekly, Hubbard is warning residents to not sign the petitions being circulated by the Citizens for Local Choice coalition, a non-partisan group of volunteers who are working to restore local control of renewable energy projects back from the state to local government where it belongs

In November 2023, the Michigan legislature passed legislation that strips away local control of wind, solar, and battery energy storage systems (BESS). It was then signed by Governor Whitmer. This law is known as Public Act 233, which allows for the siting and permitting of these renewable energy projects from local communities to the unelected three member bureaucrats on the Michigan Public Service Commission (MPSC).

Hubbard fails to mentions that the MPSC is appointed by the governor and the commission regulates the utility rates by DTE and Consumers Energy. Under the governor's clean energy act, Michigan is projected to be solely dependent on solar energy production by 2040. Renewables are "intermittent" energy sources that rely on current fuel sources such as natural gas and coal which are currently being phased out. Increases in utility bills are expected, with higher costs passed on to you, the

Michigan residents need to decide if this power grab by the state is acceptable or not. PA 233 undermines a cherished Michigan right - local control of land use decisions.



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
