Elsie Village Council Proceedings n D Levey The regular meeting of the Elsie Village Council was held Tuesd

ELSIE – The regular meeting of the Elsie Village Council was held Tuesday, May 14, 2024. Officials addressed a full house.

Chief Destinee Bryce presented the April 2024 police department report. The Department conducted two traffic stops resulting in two citations and one arrest. Additional police activity for the month included domestics, suspicious situation and civil disputes.

The Elsie Police Department participated in the first annual CORE Training event hosted at the St. Johns Police Department. CORE is training that involves all agencies in Clinton County train together quarterly. The training consisted of Autism Awareness, prosecutor legal update, officer involved shooting debriefing, critical incident investigations and subject/control weapon retention.

In addition, the department participated in training hosted by the Ingham County Sheriff Office and presented by the Attorney General's Office regarding financial planning. The training consisted of many grant opportunities through USDA and several agricultural mini grants. Many resources were provided as well as educational advantages when applying for the grants.

Chief Bryce announced that a part time officer has been hired and will be working a number of weekends per month. It is exciting to have an additional officer on the department.

Shane Grinnell, village manager, presented the monthly report. There are numerous village projects are in progress. The lagoon project is moving forward with many partners supportive of the use of the lagoon for additional waste depositing. The biggest challenge is the road access to the lagoons with the potential of additional truck traffic it needs to be addressed. On solution is to have the drive designated as a road. There is also the potential of adding onto the current pole building for additional storage. Both the village and the investor are looking at potential grant funding opportunities.

The Elsie Junior High building project is moving forward there have been some set backs regarding grant funding. There have also been some improvements made to the car wash. Finally, the lights will be installed at the park soon, Consumer's Energy will complete the installation.

On the Code Enforcement side, a meeting was attended with a focus on documentation. The Village of Elsie is ahead of the game because the records and citations have been tied into the police department reporting system.

Mr. Jim Hyland was thanked personally for the five additional statues for Heroes Park. Without his support the park would not be what it is. Larry Melvin will be planting shrubs prior to the Memorial Day Service. The Memorial Day Service will be held at Heroes Park on S. Ovid Street at 10 am. On a related topic, the bricks are also being installed at Heroes Park

In turn, Jim Hyland, thanked the village for their continued support. There are three more statues on order, the thank-you monument has been installed. In addition, another bench will be installed and provided by Heritage Stone. Again, a huge thank-you.

A written report was provided by the Department of Public Works. It was noted that the new pump received and has been installed and #8 well work has been completed.

Under the topic of public comment Janet and Roger Dennings were present representing Citizens for Open Choice, circulating a petition to restore local control regarding planning and zoning of utility grade solar, wind and battery storage. The petition is available for signatures after the public meeting.

Monthly action was taken to approve the meeting agenda as presented, minutes of the April 9, 2024 meeting and the financial reports. Expenditures totaling \$138,756.98 were also approved by officials.



Kurt Coon

It was late December 1967. The last exams of the day had been completed earlier in the day. That evening many students could be found gathering in the Wilson (dormitory) Grill before leaving the following morning for Christmas break.

In the style of the day I was wearing tight white Levis as I was waiting in line to get a coke. I felt a tap on my left shoulder and turned around to face a GIANT grin beaming from the face of an unfamiliar male student who was standing next to his roommate. "Mr. Grin" blurted out, "He wants to get his hands on your butt." (Exact words) The roommate turned a bright shade of red and looked like he could kill his crazy friend. So begins the story of how Kurt and I met, and then dated throughout our college years, which eventually led to 49 years of a happy marriage before his passing.

Kurt was raised and grew up on a dairy farm in Bannister. He learned to milk cows and drive tractor at an early age. In subsequent years his mornings started in the barn long before the school bell rang. Afterward he drove himself to school in Ashley in the 1946 Chevy even before he was of legal age. In fact, he drove himself to drivers training.

He transferred to Elsie High School in eleventh grade and graduated with the class of 1965. In the fall of that year he entered MSU where he earned a degree in geology.

He then served as a commissioned officer in the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration Corps being assigned to sea duty on the NOAA ship Pathfinder based out of Seattle. With other personnel from the ship, he measured and recorded water depths to document the precise location of hazards to navigation such as rocks, reefs and even shipwrecks on the seafloor. In the close confines of the ship, he made some close and long-lasting friends who have kept in close contact with each other through the years.

In 2018, he was blessed with a new liver through Gift of Life Michigan; he was forever grateful that it afforded him six additional years with his family and friends. Two years ago when he was felled by a stroke in his home, doctors didn't expect him to live. Through determination and goal setting, he advanced from not being able to sit up in bed to driving a combine for the fall baryest



Old Indian Trail

If you are planning to play hookey and head north for the day to the Sleeping Bear Sand Dunes for some hiking you may want to delay that trip for several months. A busy trail inside Michigan's Sleeping

Bear Dunes national lakeshore has been shut down for the summer. The Old Indian Trail and surrounding area has been closed due to the invasive hemlock wooly adelgid. This pest can kill hemlock trees in as little as four years. The insects access the tree's nutrients at the base of the needles, starving the tree. In the fall and winter, the adelgids cover themselves with a white, waxy coating for protection that appears as wool bundles the size of a pinhead at the base of hemlock needles.

The aphid-like insect has been moving north along the Lake Michigan coastline since 2015 and is known to be present in seven Michigan Counties: Allegan, Benzie, Mason, Muskegon, Oceana, Ottawa, and Washtenaw. It spreads by wind, on wildlife, and via humans on clothing, vehicles, and by moving firewood. Clearly the Washtenaw outbreak was caused by visitors to the west side and the adelgids hitching a ride back to Ann

The large infestation was discovered on the southern boundary of the National Lakeshore near and along the Old Indian Trail during inspections in January and February. The plan is for only a temporary closure to slow the spread and allow for treatment with the reopening of the trail in the fall of

It seems like Michigan is under constant attack from invasive species from the Emerald ash borer to Purple loosestrife to zebra mussels and sea lamprey. Not to mention many deer are infected with CWD and TB. The landscape is constantly under attack and great efforts are required to maintain the status quo and it is often very important to do this. With Hemlock trees for example; they provide food, shade, and cover for many species of birds and mammals. They also hold the soil together and prevent soil erosion in the early spring months along with cooling the water temperatures during warmer months to the benefit of aquatic species.

Do your part this summer and help preserve the beautiful landscape we call the Sleeping Bear Dunes. If you happen to go, please avoid the Old Indian Trail and the surrounding area so it may exist tomorrow as we knew it yesterday.

Public Act 233, which was passed into law by Governor Whitmer, will take effect on November 29th. If it is not repealed through the ballot initiative, this law will personally affect me and many other Michigan residents who are facing the infringement of renewable energy projects adjacent to their

Projects such as wind, solar, and battery energy storage systems will be sited and permitted by the Michigan Public Service Commission, and not your local government.

CITY OF LAINGSBURG RESIDENTS NOTICE OF **ORDINANCE CHANGES**

The Laingsburg City Council has approved the following emergency ordinance on May 6th 2024.

Amendments to Chapter 14, State Construction Code, Electrical Code, Mechanical Code, and Plumbing Code

Revisions to the City Charter to adopt the State Construction Code, PA 230 of 1972, by reference and designate the City as the enforcing agency for Building, Electrical, Mechanical, and Plumbing permits. The City of Laingsburg must apply to the Michigan Department of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs (LARA) in order to take back jurisdiction of these permits from Shiawassee County. The City has until May 29, 2024 to have this application approved by LARA.

To ensure that the City of Laingsburg is able to provide Building, Electrical, Mechanical, and Plumbing inspection and permit services to its citizens without any interruption of service, amendments to Chapter 14 were adopted as an emergency ordinance. These amendments were deemed to be immediately necessary for the preservation of public health and safety. These amendments were adopted in accordance with the procedures of Section 8.3 that are applicable to emergency ordinances.

Laingsburg City Hall is barrier free. Individuals needing assistance should contact the City Clerk at (517) 651-5374 at least 24 hours prior to the meeting. Comments can be made in writing and mailed to the City of Laingsburg, Clerk, PO Box 178, Laingsburg, MI 48848 or dropped off at City Hall located at 114 N. Woodhull Street, Laingsburg, MI 48848.

A Copy of the ordinance may be purchased or inspected in the City Clerk's office 114 N. Woodhull Street, Laingsburg, Michigan, during normal business hours, typically 8:30 am until 5:00 pm. Documents will be available on the City of Laingsburg website www.laingsburg.us.

The effective date of the ordinance amendments is May 6, 2024.



EE Knight Students Meet Blanding's Turtle Ambassadors

ELSIE - Consumers Energy representatives Lindsey Johnson and Jessica Tramontara with Herpetological Resource and Management representatives introduced a group of EE Knight students to the world of Michigan turtles and reptiles. Consumers Energy strives to preserve and protect wildlife on construction sites, stepping lightly in sensitive areas. Consumer's Energy uses a proven approach to minimize the pipelines environmental impact.



Blanding's turtle eggs were discovered at the construction site on M21, the Mid-Michigan

Pipeline Replacement project. The eggs were carefully collected to be sent to HRM to be put in the Headstarting program. This program then incubates the eggs, once they have hatched, they are cared for one year and then released back in to the wild. It should be noted that the Blanding's turtle is being evaluated by the Federal government and on track to be added to the

threatened species list.

The EE Knight fourth grades students participated in an informative presentation before they were introduced to two of the Blanding turtle ambassadors. They learned that on average a turtle is fifteen years old before it produces offspring. It was noted that 45 turtle eggs hatched and 40 were cared for in the Headstarting program, Students had an opportunity to touch the turtles. David Mifsud, "Turtle Dave", HRM, educated students on the life of a turtle.

Next, students were able to create a toad abode. A toad abode is a flower pot that was painted by the students and they were able to take them home, and install them in their flower beds creating a safe space for toads. The bottom plate of the flower pot would be used for water for the
