Axmitax.org Petition

Letter to the Editor:

The axmitax.org petition proposes an amendment to the Michigan Constitution to eliminate Property Taxes in Michigan, ensuring homeowners and businesses truly own their property without ongoing taxation, and saving family homes/farms/businesses from tax foreclosure.

To replace the lost revenue from this amendment, we propose an increased portion of state sales tax that is ALREADY BEING COLLECTED be redirected to cities, townships, and villages from 10% to 13.33%, and from 0% to 6.67% for counties. It will also shift 10% of state income, marihuana, alcohol, and tobacco tax revenues to local governments. Finally, it will require 60% voter approval for local tax increases and a 2/3 vote of the Legislature for tax increases greater than 0.1% over 5 years.

Karla's presentation is about 90 minutes long and she will explain our mission and how your taxes get spent along with how much money the state brings in. We still are in search of county co-captains and circulators. We have about three months left to obtain signatures, so any help is welcome! Listening First, Leading Together

One of my first priorities has been listening—to staff, students, families, board members, and community partners. I was able to meet individually with about 90% of our employees before the school year ended, and I will be working with our administrative team to identify the common themes and opportunities that came out of those conversations. That means strong relationships between the Board of Education and administration, collaboration among staff, and genuine connections with families and community members. Building Bridges in the Community

In the coming months, I plan to be visible and accessible—not just in the schools, but throughout the community. I'll be visiting classrooms, attending local events, and holding informal "coffee chats" at locations across the district. In January, we will be starting the process of developing a Strategic Plan. 



Stirm and Latuszek are All-State Softball Honoress for Wolfpack; Five Others LHS Softball Standouts Feted

LAINGSBURG -- The Lady Wolfpack's haul of post-season awards reads like a potential league dominator for the upcoming 2026 softball season.

All but one of Laingsburg's post-season all-stars will return for coach Jeff Cheadle's Wolves. This, from a team that advanced all the way to the MHSAA Quarterfinals for the second time in

Yet, the one graduating senior -- Addyson Buchin -- won't be easily replaced. The four-year pitcher signed with Aquinas College in Grand

Rapids to play softball for the Saints.

The Laingsburg ace as went 18-5 with a 3.18 ERA and 171 strikeouts in 149 and 2/3 innings. She was also dangerous at the plate, smacking four homers and an area-leading 50 RBI with a .440 average. She was the rock for a Laingsburg team that made the Division 3 state quarterfi-

Addy's softball legacy at LHS will be remembered: all-time pitching wins (90), strikeouts (764), 2nd all-time ERA (2.13); and hitting records: doubles (63), RBI (198) and 3rd all-time hits (218).

Buchin was named honored as 1st Team All-CMAC, All-District, All-Region and 2nd Team All-Shiawassee Area.

A pair of Wolfpack underclassmen, Bella Latuszek and Savvy Stirm, received top honors as Jolynn Harris as the next Honorable Mention All-State. They also garnered 1st Team All-Conference, All-District and All-Regional plaudits.

Latuszek, the Wolves' star shortstop, was named to the All-Shiawassee Area for the second consecutive season. She led the Wolfpack with a .463 batting average and recorded two homers athlete at Colorado Mesa and 10 doubles, and also swiped 23 bags.

Stirm was feted as 2nd Team All-Shiawassee Area, after hitting .408 with a homer and 22 RBI as the Wolfpack's leadoff hitter.

Buchin's batterymate, catcher Harper Strouse, was the Wolves' 4th representative on 1st Laingsburg standout Gabby Team All-CMAC. Another of the Wolfpack's All-Area 2nd Team honorees, Strouse hit four home runs with seven doubles and three triples -- and batted .327 overall.

Laingsburg's star 3rd baseman, Peyton Stahr, was voted 1st Team All-Area, 2nd Team All-CMAC, All-District and All-Region as a utility player. Stahr did it all for the Wolfpack this season, leading the team in home runs (5) and was also their No. 2 pitcher behind Buchin. She hit .410 and went 4-6 with a 4.17 ERA and 51 strikeouts in 67 innings pitched.

Wolfpack standout outfielder Makenna Johnston was feted as Honorable Mention All-Conference, 1st Team All-District and All-Region. Makenna went 38-for-114 at the plate for a 13 (.519), Finished with 6 tech falls and 8 falls, Earned 3rd at the .333 average with 29 RBI, 18 runs, and 4 assists from right field with an outstanding .940 field-

LHS 2nd sacker Alayna Merrell, coming off a standout 2024 season, backed that up with 1st Team All-District and All-Region fetes in 2025. She was another top red-and-white offensive threat, with 36 hits for a .305 average, a .410 OBP, with 11 sacrifices (hitting in the second spot), Earned 2nd at the Pointer Open, 2nd at Albion Invitational, 6th 36 runs scored and 15 stolen bases. In the field, Alayna had 43 putouts, 39 assists, and only 5 errors for a .943 fielding average.

Two Marauder Linkster Named to All-Shiawassee Area Golf Team

UM Health-Sparrow Offers Alternate **Routes for** Downtown **Amidst** Michigan Avenue Construction



Starting the week of July 7, the project is expected to extend from Lathrop Street west to the traffic light at Holmes and Michigan Avenue at the east end of the hospital. That impacts several UM Health-Sparrow buildings on Michigan Avenue.

Starting in August, the road work will extend farther west on Michigan Avenue in front of the hospital. But access to UM Health-Sparrow buildings will be maintained throughout construction.

Very soon Deann Smith, a science teacher at Ashley Community Schools will join Center for Great Lakes Literacy (CGLL) staff and Great Lakes scientists to work aboard an EPA research vessel for a week and bring Great Lakes knowledge and information back to her classrooms! The expedition is July 7-13, 2025, and will set sail from Milwaukee, Wis. Smith is one of two Michigan teachers to join the science expedition. Detroit River International Wildlife Refuge Park Ranger Erika Van Kirk (USFWS) was also chosen to attend.

Through a partnership with the EPA Great Lakes National Program Office, NOAA, and with funding from the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative, educators will spend a full week alongside researchers aboard the EPA R/V Lake Guardian. Hosts for the Lake Michigan expedition are CGLL partners Illinois-Indiana Sea Grant and Wisconsin Sea Grant.

Smith, a resident of Elsie, teaches science, biology, chemistry, and physical education. She enjoys learning new information and thought this program would help tie in with what she has already done, including teaching Salmon in the Classroom. "I'm hoping to help my students understand that what we do in middle of Michigan impacts the Great Lakes as well," Smith said. "Gaining the hands-on experience will help with that." Smith has a busy schedule planned for the summer. At the end of July, she will be chaperoning eight high school students on a trip to the Galapagos Islands.
